Gen. Sam. Houston's library, about 100 volumes, has been presented to the town of Huntsville, Texas.

It is reported that Miss Georgia Cayman, a popular actress, is to be married soon to Manager Frohman.

Ex-Senator McDonald makes about \$20,000 a year, and gives liberally but quietly to charities and the church.

Prof. C. F. Dunbar, of Harvard College, is spoken of as likely to become the new editor of the Boston Advertiser.

Mr. Arthur R. Gladstone, a nephew of the English premier, arrived at New York from Liverpool in the Pavonia Thursday.

Abraham Pratt has just driven in a wagon from Herkimer county, New York, to Morehead, in Dakota. It is 2,000 miles.

Ex-Representative John Reding, of New Hampshire, is said to be the only surviving New England member of the 47th Congress, 1841-'43.

Colonel W. R. Butler, who commanded the Eighteenth Tennessee (Confederate) regiment during the late war, died at Murfreesboro' last week.

Bishop Keane, of Richmond, reports His Holiness as having said: "There is no place in the world where I am so much Pope as in the United States."

The popular "Crickets on the Hearth" as played by Joe Jefferson in the country, proved a dead failure on its first night recently in the new Deutsches Theatre, Berlin.

Ex-Governor Holliday, of Virginia, who has been making a tour of Europe, was a passenger on the Pavonia, which arrived at New York from Liverpool on Thursday.

Mr. Gladstone seems to bear no political grudges. He gives no seceder from his government the vicerealty of Canada, and the other, the Duke of Argyll, the Garter.

Lillian Spencer, the actress, is seriously ill at the Leland House, Spring field, Ill. She has cancelled all engagements. The physician recommends her removal to the hospital as soon as her condition will permit.

The pool known as the Consolidated Paper Company, comprising fifty miles throughout the northwest, manufacturing wrapping paper, met in Chicago Wednesday and resolved, in view of the overstocked market, to shut down from December 1 to February 4. This will throw 2,000 men out.

A Virginia Republican who certainly should know about the matter, states that Lieut. Governor Lewis attributes the recent defeat of his party, not to bulldozing and intimidating, but to the refusal of the Republicans of the State to support the Mahone candidates.

The Philadelphia Record is of this opinion: Mr. William P. Snyder of Allentown, Pa., finds the lumber business in South Carolina more agreeable and profitable than the prosecution of alleged election frauds in that State, and has resigned the office of Deputy United States attorney. CAROLINA CENTRAL OFFICES.

A Peep at the Officials in Their New Quarters—Cozy, Comfortable and Convenient Rooms—Improvements Proposed, Commenced and Completed.

We paid a visit, or, rather made a tour of exploration, this morning in the building recently purchased and fitted up for offices for the several officials of the Carolina Central Railroad, for the purpose of noting how they were situated in their new quarters, and were agreeably surprised at the air of comfort combined with the convenient dispatch of business, which everywhere prevailed. Upon entering the building the first room on the left hand side is the office of the Superintendent, where we found him busy with the affairs pertaining to his position. The office is fitted up with an eye to comfort, convenience and economy of time rather than for luxury and ostentation. Telegraphic wires lead to instruments in his room and a telegraphist is always in attendance to send dispatches to the outside world or secure messages therefrom. Immediately in rear of the Superintendent's office is that of the Secretary and Treasurer, which is a model of convenience combined with safety and security in the preservation of the important papers of the company. A fireproof vault has been constructed at the rear of the building, which is connected with the Treasurer's room and in this there are the Company's safe, pigeon holes and shelving for holding the cash, books, bonds, deeds and other papers, while in an adjoining apartment there is shelving for the storing of necessary blanks, &c., &c. On the same floor, in the Northeast corner of the building, is the general freight and ticket office and in the rear of that, separated by a passage, is the private office of the General Passenger Agent. In the wing, in the Northwest corner of the building, is the Auditor's room. These constitute the offices on the ground floor and all are as comfortable as they well can be. The improvements are not all completed, but work has so far progressed that there is no delay or hindrance in the dispatch of business.

On the second floor, immediately over the Superintendent's office, is the President's room. The other rooms on the second floor are not yet completed, but will be in a short time, when they will be utilized as offices, bath and store rooms, all of which are necessary in such an establishment, transacting a business of such magnitude. The building is being supplied with water closets and the whole is connected with a system of sewerage which leads to the river, so that the atmosphere about the premises is perfectly pure and healthy.

In making all these improvements, the work was done under the supervision of Mr. George M. Summerell; the masonry work by Mr. Robert B. Wood; the painting by Mr. C. C. Parker; the tinning by Mr. E. Polley; and the plumbing by Messrs. R. H. Grant & Co., and all is of the most thorough workmanship.

A Peculiar Fact.

Upon the farm, near Burgaw, of G. F. Walker, Esq., exists a striking peculiarity of the power of the periodical ravages of lightning. But a short distance from his residence, and upon the brow of a hill, is growing a cluster of tall trees, mostly pine, that are being gradually reduced in number, owing to the annual attacks of lightning. Every Summer some of these trees are struck by lightning and destroyed. This work of destruction has been going on for over twenty years successively. The area of this cluster, thus sought out, in preference, by the electric fluid, is confined to a small spot, not more than an eighth of an acre. Other trees, standing near by, have never been injured. That there is some material upon the surface of, or imbedded in, this fated spot that attracts the lightning, while all the surrounding trees and objects escape, seems a legitimate conclusion. Scientists ought to, and probably will, investigate the cause as pertaining to this particular cluster of trees and spot of land. In this remarkable age of progress, when investigation is more on the search than ever before, new discoveries are the order of the day. As a consequence, new departures are constantly being made in every branch of knowledge and department of life. Will not something yet more be added to the lightning-rod to avert the shock and death blows of lightning?

A Mysterious Robbery.

This morning, when Mr. N. Jacobi's hardware store was opened, the iron shutters of a door opening upon an alley at the side were found unfastened and an inspection of the premises soon revealed the fact that a robber had been present during the night. The supposition is that he concealed himself in the premises before the doors were closed last evening and worked at his leisure during the night. But little has been missed, however, and so far as is now known the depredations of the rogue were confined to carrying off a gun, two fine pistols, and a box of pocket knives and a package of papers. These papers are utterly valueless to any one besides Mr. Jacobi, as they are merely memoranda of such transactions as were not carried to the books. Why the thief should have taken these at all is very mysterious, but why he should have taken these papers and left behind them an amount of money in the drawer is harder still to understand. In this drawer there was left last night about \$5 in change and there was also a smaller amount in another drawer but although both of these receptacles were overhauled yet the money remained apparently untouched. Mr. Jacobi will be reconciled to his loss provided the purloined papers are returned to him. They are absolutely worthless to any one else yet they represent a certain value to the owner and we hope that they may be recovered.
