Small-pox is almost epidemic at Salisbury, O.

The Lorillard Fire insurance company, of New York, closed its books Friday and discontinued business, and its risks will be reinsured in the Guardian of London.

It is asserted in Boston that some members of the city council during the past year have eaten and drunk more at the city's expense than they ever did at their own cost in ten years.

At Cambridge, Ohio, Thursday, Judge Frazier sentenced twelve saloon-keepers to pay fines aggregating \$4,400 and to imprisonment in the county jail for a total of 400 days for violation of the "Scott" law.

Barbara Freitlieb's clock is said to be in existence yet, with its hands fixed at 10 o'clock, the hour at which its pendulum was shot away by a soldier's bullet. Its final destination will be the Smithsonian Institution.

While the ship Dashing Wave was being repaired at Tacoma, W. T., a short time since, a six pound cannon ball was found firmly imbedded in the wood. It was shot into the vessel as she was leaving Galveston harbor with a cargo of cotton during the war.

In the window of a jewelry store in New York, dressed up for the holidays, there sparkle precious stones valued at \$350,000. Their beauties are enhanced by three powerful reflectors, and their safety guaranteed by half a dozen watchmen and detectives.

A strike of the coal miners in the third pool of Pennsylvania, Monongahela river, has been ordered for December 20. The men have been working at a reduction of one-quarter of a cent a bushel, and the strike is to get the district price, which is 34 cents a bushel. About 1,000 miners are affected.

Mrs. Sedonia P. Wagner, who died a few days ago in her native city, New Orleans, at the age of 85, was for years a reigning belle in Louisiana. Aaron Burr was a frequent guest at her father's table, and she knew the distinguished men of this century's early decade. She danced with Lafayette in 1825.

Col. Boudinot, of the Cherokee nation intends to petition the house of representatives for an investigation of the disappearance of a portion of the Cherokee fund. He says also that he will institute suit against ex-Congressman Phillips for the balance that he is alleged to be short.

General "Bob" Toombs, of Georgia, lives in a big two-story frame house, into the hall of which a wagon load of hay could almost be driven. He is rich, having received for years a handsome income from his law practice. When he was young he bought large tracts of land in Texas, and it is said that he has cleared \$100,000 on portions thereof that he has sold, while he still owns enough to turn him two or three times as much more.

A New Boat.

The steam propeller Louise, came into this port a week ago enroute from Maine, to Savannah, Ga., where it was proposed that she should run between the latter city and Beaufort, S. C. While here Capt. He will command her and will run her between this city and Smithville as a freight and passenger boat, leaving the latter place in the morning and returning there at night. The Louise is a new boat, having been launched in August last; is a neat, snug little craft of 28 tons burthen, and it is claimed that she is capable of making 12 knots an hour. She is well constructed and has a very roomy and commodious cabin for a craft of her size.

To Leave Us.

We regret to learn that Mr. Thomas E. Bond has resigned his position as agent of the New York and Wilmington Steamship line, to take effect in a few days. As a business man he has been prompt, energetic and of unquestioned integrity, while as a citizen he has taken an active part in the social and political affairs of our city and has manifested a deep interest in our material growth and prosperity. He has formed friendly ties here which he will dislike to surrender, and which will be mutually painful. He will leave here some time during next week, and will go hence to Baltimore, where he proposes to engage in business. It is not yet definitely known who will be his successor as agent of the steamship line, but that will probably be determined within the week. He has our heartfelt wishes for his prosperity in his new field of labor.

Board of Audit and Finance.

A meeting of the Board of Audit and Finance and the Committee on Streets and Wharves of the Board of Aldermen was held at the City Hall yesterday afternoon. The contracts entered into by the Board of Aldermen for paving Water street were duly approved by the Board of Audit and Finance.

The Board of Audit and Finance approved of the action of the Board of Aldermen in its agreement to pay Mr. O. G. Parsley \$345.61, in full of all damages to his property on the corner of Ann and Third streets, caused by the heavy rain of June 3rd, 1883.

The matter of dredging the docks at the foot of Mulberry, Princess, Dock, Orange and Ann streets, was deferred, with a request that the committee on Streets and Wharves furnish an estimate of the probable cost of the work proposed by the beginning of the next fiscal year.

In relation to the action of the Board of Aldermen, that the Board of Audit and Finance be requested to allow an appropriation of \$13 to purchase an overcoat for the night janitor, the Board held that, as from the nature of the duties performed by this officer, his work being entirely in doors, the late Board of Aldermen had purposely not included or asked for any appropriation of this character, the same be not approved.

The matter of repairing the floor of the Cape Fear S. F. Engine House was referred to Mr. R. J. Jones, with power to act.
