**Has Arrived.**  
Rev. Dr. Yates, the recently appointed pastor to Front Street M. E. Church, and family, arrived last night on the 9:40 train and were received by a large number of people, who had not failed to have a warm snipper for their benefit. Dr. Yates is no stranger in our city, having served the charge for four years under a previous appointment. He was first sent here from the Salisbury Conference, which convened in the year 1879. He will preach at the Front Street Church to-morrow at 11 a m and 7 1/2 p m.

## Cotton.

The receipts of cotton at this port for the week ending with to-day foot up 3471 bales as against 6,769 bales for the corresponding week of last year, a decrease this week of 3,298 bales. The receipts of the crop year to date foot up 74,708 bales, as against 87,703 bales to same date last year, a decrease this year of 12,995 bales.

## Adjourned.

Pender County Superior Court concluded the labors of the term and adjourned last evening. There were no penitentiary offences, and the grand jury made but very few presentments. The report of the grand jury was very complimentary to the County Commissioners, and among other things the immediate construction of a suitable jail for county purposes was strongly urged.
