We import more than \$70,000,000 of Cuban products annually, and less than \$10,000,000 of Mexican, and yet our trade with Mexico ought greatly to exceed that with Cuba. The foreign trade ot Mexico was not quite \$36,500,000 in 1880, but the natural resources of the republic and a population of more than \$10,000,000 ought to soon render each thousand of trade a million. Already the hope of better means of communication with the United States has awakened a spirit of enterprise among the Mexicans, and every increase of transit facilities between the two countries will be hailed with joy in each republic.




