Speaker Keifer's Committee on Agriculture was composed of ten Northern members and six Southern members, and among the latter were the same "Hatch, of Missouri," and "Aiken, of South Carolina," whom the farmers of the Northwest will now have to address.

The New York Tribune gets off a lot of senseless twaddle about "the South" in the formation of the committees in the House, and intimates that the members from that section will control the legislation in Congress this Winter. Would that they could, for in that case the Democratic party would live up to its promises and its hopes.

It claims first that twenty-five States only out of the thirty-eight have Chairmanships of committees, and thirteen are left without such representation. It also complains that fourteen Southern States are represented in "the first and second places on these committees."

There are thirty-eight States in the Union, sixteen of which are so-called Southern States. They have equal rights in Congress, according to their representation, with the twenty-two Northern States. Yet Speaker Keifer gave seventeen out of the twenty-two Northern States Chairmanships, while he extended to the sixteen Southern States only three Chairmanships.

Speaker Keifer grabbed six Chairmanships for his own State, Ohio, and seven for Illinois, while he gave New York only three. Speaker Carlisle takes only two Chairmanships for his own State, in addition to the Committee on Rules, of which he is himself ex officio Chairman, and recognizes the importance of the Empire State by giving six to New York.

on Pensions is composed of six Northern members—Robinson, of New York; Leteure, of Ohio; Stockslager, of Indiana; Steele, of Indiana; Laird, of Nevada, and Struble, of Iowa—and five Southern members—Hewitt, of Alabama; Tillman of South Carolina; Jones, of Texas; Wolford, of Kentucky, and York, of North Carolina. The latter is an Independent, elected by Republican votes.

Speaker Keifer's Committee on Pensions was composed of six Northern members—Marsh, of Illinois; Hepburn, of Iowa; Stone, of Massachusetts; Steele, of Indiana; Webber, of Michigan, and Robinson, of New York—and five Southern members—Rice, of Missouri; Fulkerson, of Virginia; Hewitt, of Alabama; Cox, of North Carolina, and Burrows, of Missouri.

So the same number of Southern members were on Keifer's Pension Committee as are on Carlisle's, and the "loyal soldiers" had in the last Congress, as in this, to "go before" Hewitt, of Alabama!

Even the Tribune is driven to say, in relation to Mr. Carlisle's selection: "He sought for men of brains and experience for important places he had to take most of them from the South." What qualifications are needed for good committeemen whose labors will benefit the country but "brains and experience" are they to be ignored and rejected because they happen to come from a particular section? A way with such mischievous balderdash! It is unworthy intelligent journalism. It is disgusting to intelligent people.
