IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—The Senate then proceeded to the election of a President pro tempore, and elected Senator Anthony to that office. Mr. Anthony, in a few fitting words and with much feeling, declined the honor, owing to the precarious state of his health.

Mr. Edmunds was then re-elected President pro tempore of the Senate and the oath of office was administered to him by Senator Garland, of Ark., who occupied the chair during the election proceedings.

A petition was introduced by Mr. Vest from pork packers and dealers asking for retaliatory legislative measures to protect them from the unjust prohibition on American meats now being practiced by Germany and France against the people of the United States. The petition says: "It is useless to appeal to those nations in any other way except by such legislation as will teach them to respect the rights of citizens of the United States."

By Mr. Brown, a number of bills for the improvement of rivers and harbors in the State of Georgia.

By Mr. Call, to repeal all laws and parts of laws prohibiting pensions to wounded or disabled soldiers of the United States without proof of loyalty.

Mr. Cockrell offered the following resolution, which was agreed to:

Resolved, That the Secretary of the Treasury be and he is hereby directed to report to the Senate as soon as may be practicable the amounts of gold coin and bullion deposited in the Treasury, sub-treasury, and designated depositories of the United States, in exchange for silver certificates, and for which silver certificates have been issued during the calendar years 1878 to 1883; or, if more convenient, during the fiscal years 1879 to 1884; and during the first six months of 1884; and also, whether there has been any refusal to receive such gold coin or bullion or silver certificates, and if so the reasons therefor.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Under the call of States the following bills, etc., were introduced and referred:

By Mr. Oates, of Ala., to require circuit courts and the United States Supreme Court to decide all cases predicated on contracts or breaches thereof, according to the law of the State or place where the contract was made or to be performed.

By Mr. Reese, of Ga., for the erection of a public building in Augusta, Ga.

By Mr. Barksdale, of Miss., regulating inter-State commerce.

By Mr. King, of Ia., providing for closing gaps in levees of the Mississippi river and for the improvement of the navigation of said river.

By Mr. Cox, of New York, to repeal the law prohibiting ex-Confederate officers from serving in the United States army.

By Mr. York, of N. C., for a public building at Winston, N. C.

By Mr. Warner, of Ohio, for the redemption of trade dollars.

By Mr. Mackey, of S. C., to simplify criminal proceedings in the U. S. courts.

By Mr. Young, of Tenn., to improve the navigation of the lower Mississippi river and incidentally to protect and reclaim the valley lands of the Mississippi river.

By Mr. Throckmorton, of Texas, for the appointment of a delegate to the House of Representatives by a council of the Indian tribes in Indian territory.

By Mr. Shaw, of Ill., to repeal the civil service act.

STATE NEWS.

Newbern Journal: Amos Starkey, colored, of James City, aged about 50, while crossing the railroad bridge yesterday morning, when near 2d pier from this side, fell dead across the ties.

Highlands Enterprise: Last Friday morning the most destructive fire which Highlands has yet known visited our place, when Mr. E. E. Ewing's residence was burned to the ground. What was one of the neatest and most attractive houses in town in less than two hours time was a mass of black, smouldering ruins. The fire broke out at about seven o'clock in the morning, in the third story, and was doubtless caused by a defective chimney.

Hickory Press: Capt. Waddill has received notice that the first mail and passenger train on the Narrow Gauge will reach Hickory to-night. On Thursday last Mr. John Martin, of Hickory, Hill & Hill's champion clothing seller, went out bird hunting. He flushed a covey of partridges, nine in number, and brought down with two shots of his double barrel, seven of the nine. —It is a very high compliment to our townsman, Capt. A. C. Gunter, manager of the Singer Sewing Machine office, who has just received a prize offered for the largest receipts shown by any office in the State. He also received the prize—\$20 in cash—which was offered at large in both North Carolina and Virginia.

Goldsboro Messenger: The condition of Mr. W. H. Williams, of Duplin, who has for some weeks been in this city, at the residence of Henry Lee, Esq., a sufferer of Bright's disease, shows but little improvement. We regret to learn.—Mr. J. P. Caddagan, quartermaster of the Midland N. C. Railway, passed through this city last week returning from a trip through the far Western States, en route for New York. He is now traveling with a first class minstrel company. Wonder where W. J. Best is? —Mr. Mordecai Peel, of this county, left for Florida last week. His aged father, Mr. Willie Peel, 83 years old, accompanied him. We regret to hear that others of our citizens contemplate emigrating to the land of orange groves. Dr. G. M. Roberts and family have also gone back there.

Charlotte Observer: The Masonic Temple Association of this city have finally closed negotiations with the Merchants and Farmers Bank for the purchase of that valuable city property located on Tryon street, adjoining the Second Presbyterian Church, upon which Mr. Allen resides. The sum paid for sixty feet front of the property

was \$2,727.24. It is the intention of the new owners to begin the erection upon the lot some time shortly, of an elegant three story building, the first floor to be divided into two store-rooms. The second story may be arranged for an opera house and the third story will be used for the Masonic bodies in Charlotte. The lot is one of the finest pieces of property in the city and the building which the Masons will erect will be an imposing structure.
