IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, January 29.—In the Senate this morning, Mr. Vest, from the committee on Public Lands, reported favorably a bill repealing the timber culture laws. Placed on the calendar.

Mr. Cameron, of Wis., introduced a bill to establish the territory of North Dakota.

Mr. Platt offered a resolution, for which he asked immediate consideration, directing the Committee on Postoffices and Postroads to inquire whether telegraphic charges have been injuriously affected by the large stock dividends of the Western Union Company, on consolidation or other contracts with competing or other companies, and whether through the Gold Stock Telegraph Company it has prescribed rules or regulations for the transmission of press news.

Mr. Sherman objected, and it went over till to-morrow. Mr. Voorhees offered the following resolution which was agreed to.

Resolved, That the committee on Postoffices and Postroads be instructed to inquire into the propriety and expediency of admitting all newspapers, periodicals and other printed reading matter to the United States mail free of postage.

The preamble and resolution of Mr. Sherman, relating to the election in Virginia, were then laid before the Senate and Mr. Sherman spoke in their support.

Mr. Mahone followed Mr. Sherman in support of the resolution. On the conclusion of Mr. Mahone's remarks, calls of "vote" were heard, and the chair announced the question to be on agreeing to the resolution.

A demand for the yeas and nays was made and without remark from any Democratic Senator, the matter was brought to a vote and the resolution was passed by 33 yeas to 29 nays.

Mr. Allison called up the House bill making appropriations for the payment of the rebate on the tobacco tax and providing for the expenses of the Legislature of the territory of New Mexico.

Mr. Pettibone, of Penn., offered a resolution, which was adopted unanimously, providing that the financial economies of the late E. W. V. Mendenhall, of South Carolina, should be read in this hall to-morrow and directing the clerk to invite the members of the Senate to be present.

Mr. Broadhead, of Miss., presented a petition, signed by 2,335 citizens of St. Louis, asking for the improvement of an Mississippi river. Reported.

Mr. H. H. Hilditch, of Ala., granting a right-of-way through the public lands in Alabama and Florida, to the Alabama & Florida Railroad Company.

By Mr. Buchanan of Georgia, for the erection of a public building at Columbus, Ga., at a cost not to exceed \$100,000.

By Mr. Ward, of Indiana, reducing the tariff on sugar and woolen goods.

By Mr. Van Eaton, of Miss., granting lands to the State of Mississippi to aid in the construction of a railroad from Brandon to the Gulf of Mexico.

By Mr. Mayo, of Virginia, for the erection of a public building at Fredericksburg, Va.

Mr. Randall, of Penn., submitted the conference report on the Greeley relief bill, and it was adopted. The result of the conference is the striking out of the Senate amendment requiring the crews of the relief ships to be volunteers.
