Appeal for Aid. Mayor Hall has received a very earnest appeal for aid for the sufferers by the great floods in the West. It is in the shape of a circular letter from Mr. T. P. Makibben, Judge of the County Court at Newport, Ky., and is properly attested. The Mayor thinks, and we think, too, that some response should be made by our people to this call from the distressed, and he would be glad to receive some suggestions in the matter as to calling a public meeting of the citizens, from some of our leading men. The following is the appeal alluded to: NEWPORT, Ky., Feb. 13, 1884. To Hon. E. D. Hall, Mayor of the City of Wilmington: DEAR SIR:—Over 11,000 of our citizens are now homeless from the ravages of our greatest flood. The utter destitution is alarming. All mills and factories are closed by the flood and the day-laborers, who are the homeless ones now, have neither homes nor provisions. Most absolute want, in all its horrid forms, prevails and local aid is exhausted. We appeal to you and your generous friends for assistance, or starvation will be added to desolation. Tongue cannot describe the reality of the horror by which we are surrounded, sickness and death, hunger and nakedness. Come, we beseech you, and with such donations as your friends can give us and for suffering humanity's sake send quickly. Contributions may be safely forwarded to the undersigned, or to W.
