Switzerland and Russia have no rail way trains that run faster than twenty-

seven miles per hour. The Shore Line express from Boston

via Springfield, takes, including stops, three hours and three minutes to run the 234 miles, the running time being

forty-two and five tenths miles per On the Berlin-Potsdam-Madgeburg railroad, part of the through line between Berlin and Paris, twenty four and three-quarter miles have been run in thirty minutes, and fifty miles in one

hour and nine minutes. In Italy the only fast train is the mail train which goes from Bologna to Brindisi, 472 miles, in fourteen hours, fifty-six minutes, which, including three

stops, is at the rate of thirty one fivetenths miles per hour. In Germany the fastest train is from Berlin to Hanover on the Magdeburg-Halberstadt railroad. It makes 1584 miles in three hours forty, eight minutes including three stops. The actual run-ning time is torty-four two-tenths miles

per hour. Some miles are run at the rate of fitty two miles an hour. Bordeaux, 359 miles are run in nine cal prostration. It acts on the Liver, On the Orleans line, from Paris to hours and ten minutes, including seventeen stops, being an average of over thirty-nine wiles per hour. From Paris to Marseilles, the distance of 536 miles is covered in fifteen hours. From Calais to Paris. on the Northern railroad, trains run at over thirty-nine

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
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
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
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
