IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE. WASHINGTON, March 4. Mr. Cook, rel. from the committee on Military Affairs, reported adversely, and had indefinitely postponed, all bills providing for the distribution of condemned cannon to cities or associations.

On the conclusion of the morning business, the Military Academy Appropriation bill was placed before the Senate.

Mr. Logan said he had been authorized by the committee on Appropriations to offer an amendment to the bill, providing that hereafter any cadet dismissed for hazing should not be eligible to appointment.

The amendment was agreed to, and the bill so amended was passed.

Bills were introduced and referred. By Mr. Sherman, granting copyright to newspapers.

By Mr. Call, to improve the entrance and channels of Pensacola harbor, Fla., including both the inner and outer bars.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. Mr. Randall, from the committee on Appropriations, reported a resolution authorizing the employment of a small additional force under the clerk and doorkeeper of the House.

After debate the resolution was adopted.

Mr. Hewitt, of New York, from the committee on Ways and Means, reported a bill to prevent the adulteration of teas. The bill is based upon the recommendations of the Secretary of the Treasury. It prohibits the importation of tea dust, and gives importers an opportunity to export from the United States, within six months after the bill becomes a law, any adulterated tea they may have received.

The House went into committee of the Whole on the Naval Appropriation bill. An amendment was adopted, the substance of which is that after July 1st, 1884, the number of medical directors on the active list shall be reduced from fifteen to five; medical inspectors from fifteen to five; and pay inspectors from thirteen to five; and placing the officials thus removed from the active list on the retired list. Without further action the committee rose and the House adjourned.

THE SOUDAN.

A "Times" Canard that England was About to Evacuate Egypt.

LONDON, March 3, 1884.—The Times says:—"We understand that orders have been sent to General Graham to retreat forthwith from Tokar and to arrange for the immediate return of the troops to England and Egypt."

General Graham will send the Egyptian troops found at Tokar to join the garrison at Suakim. The English troops will be withdrawn to Teb, whence, after receiving supplies of water, provisions and munitions, they will advance to Tanagerie, before the British renew the attack upon the rebels Osman Digna will be offered a conference. The 5,000 rebels who fled from Tokar when the British entered the town on Saturday joined Osman Digna. Only 1,000 of them are Soudanese, being fanatics sent from Kordofan and Darfour. If Osman Digna refuses to surrender it is expected that the rest of the tribes under his influence will express their desire to come to terms.

Two thousand irregular troops have proceeded from Khartoum toward Kenaleen to act against the enemy in that direction. The situation in Khartoum is growing less and less favorable.

Captain Speedy has started from Cairo for Abyssinia with a letter from Queen Victoria to King John. Captain Speedy will probably remain in Abyssinia as British Resident.

Colonel Stewart's second mission up the White Nile met with a better reception than the first.

The ambassadors of all the Powers have been instructed to compliment the government upon General Graham's victory.

STATE NEWS.

Raleigh Visitor: The congregation of the First Baptist Church worshiped in their church room yesterday for the first time in about eight months. The church has been repaired and presents a beautiful appearance.

Newton Enterprise: Mr. R. P. Reinhardt's big Durham bull was missed on the streets this week, but he was as much admired in the beef market as he ever was in life. He was killed Monday, and netted 1,458 pounds of the finest beef ever seen in this market. We doubt whether a heavier beef has ever been killed in North Carolina. It averaged 364 pounds to the quarter, each quarter being about the weight of a good, ordinary beef.

Greensboro Workman: The new railroad spent yesterday at Pleasant Garden, rested well, and continued its overland journey this way. It is within less than eight miles of this evening.

The called session of Orange Presbytery, which met here last week to consider the dismissal of Rev. George Sumner from the church to the church in Chester, S. C., failed to act on account of some informality below, and the case will be considered in a special meeting to be held at the office of Mr. Sloan on Wednesday next, at 12 o'clock.

Statesville Landmark: Among the good sales of tobacco made here this week was one by Mr. G. A. Horton, of Amity Hill, of seven lots at an average of \$13.50. The whole number of pounds was 1,139 and the seven lots brought \$15.28. The best lot brought 49 and cost 74.—One of the best signs for the prosperity of this county is the subdivision of farms which is constantly going on. Two lots of land in the county which were formerly owned by two men, are now owned by forty or fifty. Our landowners are taking in their horns. The old system of scratching over three or four hundred acres of land and getting nothing of it, is playing out. The people are cultivating it

better. It is better for them, and when we have twice the number of farms and twice the number of farm owners in the country we will be better off still.

Goldsboro Messenger: The Norfolk & Southern Telegraph Company, having reached Snow Hill with their wires on their way to this city, en route through the South, have leased the line of the Snow Hill Telegraph Company running into this city, and will begin to build from this place. At a regular meeting of the Goldsboro Rifles, held at the armory on Friday night, Feb. 28, the following gentlemen were elected officers for the ensuing year: W. T. Hollowell, Captain; F. H. Bain, 1st Lieutenant; W. P. Granger, Ensign.

Edenton Enquirer: Excellent authority states that during one of the gales last week, at night, the residence of Mr. John Sauerlin, near Guinea Mills, Currituck county, N. C., was blown completely to pieces. Mrs. S. and her six children were asleep at the time, two of them upstairs, but singular to state, neither of them was hurt. The escape was a miraculous one. On Saturday evening last, Jere Gibson and 1-1/2 Jones, colored, were in town. They got to boxing, and grew angry. They left town about eleven o'clock, and upon getting about a mile from town, the quarrel was renewed, when Jones stabbed Gibson in the back and neck with a pocket knife, from the effects of which he died in a few hours. Jones made his escape. He was taken in Elizabeth City Monday, and the blood was still on his clothing; yet, strange to say, the officers there let him go.
