For Vienua and surroundings this deposit is fixed at \$9,000; for towns of 60 000 inhabitants, at \$3,000; for towns of 30 000 inhabitants, at \$2,000, and for all other places at \$1,000; but papers only appearing three times a week need only pay halt the amount. By infringement of the press laws the caution money may be partially or wholly forfeited, and all fines are levied on the amount, which has again to be made up to the original sum its the papers are to go

Gubernatorial salaries are not particularly attractive or tempting to successful business or professional men. New York and Pennsylvania pay their Governors the largest salaries-\$10,000 -and the amount in other States ranges from that figure down to \$1,500. Illinois and California \$6,000; Colorado, Kentucky, Nevada and New Jersey, \$5,000; Louisiana, Massachusetts Missississippi, Tennessee and Texas, \$4,000; North Carolina, Kansas, Iowa, Georgia and Arkansas, \$3,000; Connecticut, Delaware and Maine, \$2,000; New Hampshire, Michigan and Vermont, \$4,000; Oregon, \$1,500.

Speaker Carlisle has just made a great mistake by which he has se iously injured his political prospects for the future and put the hopes and fervent as pirations of the Democratic party in extreme jeapordy. As Speaker of the House of Representatives, he occupies the highest position in the gift of the party, and as such it has been hoped that he would labor with all the powers of his brill ant mind to ensure its success and final ascendancy in the control of the government. But he did no such thing. On the contrary he advanced opinions which but a very few Democrats fully endorse, and such as are opposed by a majority of them. On the important question of the tariff there are great differences of opinion among leading Democrats. The same differences exist among Republicans, but not to such a great extent. There is hardly a Democrat of intelligence in the country who does not see the necessity of a reform in our tariff system, but there are but comparatively few who would be willing to adopt the radical changes advocated by the tree trade clubs and deed! 
