IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, March 19.—Mr Miller, of Cal., from the committee on Foreign Relations, in compliance with the resolution instructing the committee to inquire and report what legislation, if any, was necessary to protect the interests of the United States against those governments which have excluded the importation of American meats, reported that they had agreed to a bill providing for the inspection of meats for exportation, and prohibiting the importation of adulterated articles of food and drink and authorizing the President to make proclamation in certain cases and for other purposes. The bill was placed on the calendar.

Mr Vance stated that the minority of the committee would at some future day present their views on the same subject.

Mr Hoar called up the bill introduced by him and reported favorably from the committee on the Judiciary fixing the salaries of United States District Judges at \$5,000. A long debate followed.

The bill finally went over and after several efforts to take up other measures, the Senate continued the discussion of the bill to aid in the establishment of common schools.

In the progress of the debate, a few amendments of detail were made in the bill.

At 5 p m the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

The Speaker laid before the House a message from the President, transmitting a communication from the Secretary of War concerning the expediency of offering rewards for the rescue of Lieut. Greely and party by the independent efforts of private vessels, in addition to the sending of three ships composing the National Relief Expedition. Referred.

On motion of Mr. Eaton, of Connecticut, April 2nd was set apart for the consideration of the Presidential succession bill.

Mr. Curtin, of Pennsylvania, chairman of the committee on Foreign Affairs, reported, as a privileged question, the following resolutions:

Resolved That the resolutions referring to the death of Dr. Edward Lasker, adopted by this House on January 9th last, were intended as a tribute of respect to the memory of an eminent foreign statesman, who had died with the United States, and as an expression of sympathy with the German people for whom he had been an honorable representative.

Resolved, That the House, having no official concern with the relations between the executive and legislative branches of the German Government, does not deem it requisite to its dignity to criticize the manner of the reception of the resolutions or the circumstances which prevented their reaching their destination, after they had been communicated through the proper channels to the German Government.

The resolutions were adopted without division, although an unsuccessful effort was made to have the yeas and nays ordered.

Mr Curtin submitted the following further report relative to the memorial of the Liberal Union of the German Parliament:

"The resolution contained in this memorial expresses so just an appreciation of the action of this House, and so cordial a wish for the prosperity of our country and of the two nations, that it is deemed proper to make fitting acknowledgment. The committee therefore recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the House cordially reciprocates the wishes of the Liberal Union of members of the German Parliament for a closer union of the two nations, and recognizes their graceful appreciation of its sympathies with those who mourn the death of Edward Lasker.

Resolved, That the House accepts these resolutions, and directs that they be spread on the journal."

After a repetition of the debate which had just ended upon the former resolution, the latter resolutions were adopted without division.

Mr Turner, of Ga., chairman of the committee on Elections, reported a resolution in the contested election case of Garrison vs Mayo, from the First Congressional District of Virginia, declaring the contestant, Garrison, entitled to the seat. He asked for its immediate consideration; but the sitting member, Mayo, desiring to make a speech in his own behalf, the matter was postponed until to-morrow.

The committee on Appropriations reported the Indian Appropriation bill, and it was referred to the committee of the Whole.

The long expected struggle over the Whiskey bill began, and when the House adjourned it was with the understanding that the discussion would be resumed to-morrow.

STATE NEWS.

Farmer and Mechanic: Senator Ransom was absent when the vote on Fitz John Porter's case came up. He arrived in Raleigh on Saturday last.

Newbern Journal: About thirty of the young ladies and gentlemen of Newbern have organized a Lawn Tennis Association, and have prepared some beautiful grounds on the Academy Green.

Raleigh Visitor: Mr J F Jordan, of Asheville, and a friend yesterday near this city killed 55 partridges and 4 rabbits, only being in the field eight hours. Mr J. is considered one of the best shots in the State, if not in the South.

Greensboro Bugle: The track will be laid on the C F & Y V road to South Buffalo by Friday night. The bridge is ready to be put in place, but it may take ten days to get from this point to Greensboro—a distance of two and a half miles.

Newton Enterprise: Peach trees are beginning to bloom. In town the peaches have not yet been hurt by the cold, and we have not heard any damage to them in the county. The prospect of a full crop is now good; but a heavy frost within the next four weeks would play havoc with it.

Elizabeth City Falcon: The catch of herrings at our fisheries down the sound has so far been unusually small. This is attributed to bad weather, and now that that cause is removed we look for better reports. The shad fishermen have done well.

Shoe Heel Print: The Methodists of our town have the deed for the land upon which the church is to be erected, and have also purchased and paid for the greater portion of the lumber, and now in a few days the foundation will be laid, and the work upon it will then commence. It is thought by a great many that the church will be completed by the 1st of September next.

Hickory Press: A shingle manufacturer of Burke estimates that there are on an average 250,000 sawed heart pine shingles turned out daily at the several mills in the eastern portion of that county. With about the same number of factories in operation in this county and the lower edge of Caldwell, the quantity of shingles manufactured within a radius of a few miles is simply immense, and they are shipped in every direction.

Charlotte Observer: A young lady was attacked by a muskrat in broad daylight yesterday, on Tryon street, near the Methodist church. With remarkable presence of mind, she screamed loud enough to frighten the rat away, but not before her ankles had suffered slightly. The affair raised a big excitement in that end of town for the time being. —We are informed upon what is generally termed "good authority," that an Atlanta man has rented a house in Charlotte and will open a female barber shop here on April 1st. Not a shop where females get shaved, but where females shave the customers. The proprietor will have five female barbers in his shop and thinks that will be sufficient to accommodate the rush.

Wadesboro Times: The Rt. Rev., the Bishop of North Carolina, Theo. B. Lymon, will make his annual Episcopal visitation to Calvary Church in this town on Palm Sunday—which falls this year on the 6th of April—when the rite of confirmation will be administered.

A large white bird, supposed to be an eagle, was shot near the Pee Dee river last Monday by Mr. Marshall Liles, son of Mr. Eli Liles. The bird has some of the "features" of a fish hawk and possibly is as much hawk as it is eagle. It was shot with a rifle while flying, at about 100 yards distant, and measured 4 feet 6 inches from tip to tip. The bird was first seen in the neighborhood in which it was shot, about twelve months ago.
