IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.

Washington, March 31-The Public Buildings committee reported favorably a bill providing for the erection of a public building at Chattanooga. Placed on the calendar.

Mr. Butler presented a memorial from the Chamber of Commerce of Charleston, S. C. relating to silver coinage, the revenue marine service and

light-ships. Mr. Platt called up, for the purpose of speaking upon it, his bill providing for the organization of the patent office

nto a separate department. At the conclusion of his remarks, the senate went into executive session, and when the doors were reopened adjourned HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. Beach, of N. Y., from the committee on Pub ic Health, reported back a resolution directing that the committee investigate the question of the adulteration of food and drugs.

Mr. Cox, of N. Y., called attention to the fact that while before the war about five hundred bills would be presented to Congress in a year, at this seven thousand bills had been already introduced. Congress was getting omnivorous. It was taking in everything. There would be a committee pretty soon to investigate how much sand a grocer put in his sugar and how much water in his milk. In fact, the pending resotion would reach that question. Congress had no right to be perpetually interfering with local matters, and he objected to these microscopic bills brought in for the purpose of getting the surplus out of the Treasury. He moved to lay the resolution on the table. Lost, and then the resolution was recommitted.

Under the call of States, Mr. Nichols of Ga , introduced a resolution reciting the fact that for several days the city of Cincinnati has been menaced by a mob ot vigilance committees and and ku klux organizations which have subverted the law of the land and disturbed public tranquility in repeated efforts to lynch certain persons confined in the jail at Clucinnati charged with crime, resulting in the loss of many lives and requesting the Sherman Committee of the Senate to inquire into the circumstances connected with these outrages and report by bill or otherwise.

The bill for redemption of the trade dollar came up as the regular order. Without action the matter went over. It will be probably antagonized by the ville, Master Indian appropriation bill to-morrow.

Robert Smalls, of South Carolina, took the oath of office as Representa tive to succeed the late E. W. Mackey.
