The Hon. F. A. K. Bennett, younger son of Lord Tankerville, says the London Truth, is about to take up his residence permanently in America.

Senator George H. Pendleton, of Ohio, is to deliver the oration at the Mecklenburg celebration in Charlotte on Tuesday, May 20, and Speaker Carlisle is to be present and make a brief address.

Mr. Rodney Wallace, of Fitchburg, Mass., has given that city a lot of land on Monument square valued at \$20,000, and will build upon it at his own expense a free public library, reading-room and art gallery, to cost \$40,000.

Gas has been successfully manufactured from sawdust in Canada. Deseronto, a lumbering town, is now illuminated with this gas, and a material heretofore considered worthless is utilized. The light obtained is said to be equal to that from the best coal gas.

Australian mutton is sold in England at about two-thirds the price received for English, Scotch, or Irish-grown mutton. Still the demand for it is on the increase. In fact, it is now predicted that the time will come when cargo loads of frozen sheep carcasses will arrive daily at the large English seaports.

A resident of Macon, Ga., has purchased from a local confectioner for \$12 the right to eat as much candy as he wishes in one month. The side wheel steamer *John Sylvester* bound from Jacksonville, Fla., to New York, put in at Smithville at 9 o'clock this morning. We failed to learn whether she will come up to the city or not.

The Jewish Feast of the Passover will begin to-morrow afternoon at sunset and continue seven days. During that period all leavened bread will be banished from the presence of the orthodox Jews.

The ordinance of baptism by immersion was administered to three colored persons—one male, two females—in the dock at the foot of Princess street on Sunday afternoon. Rev. A. M. Conway, colored, officiating.

The Young Men's Hebrew Association will have a rehearsal at Germania Hall, on Wednesday night, for an entertainment to be given in a short time. The "Great Umbrella Case" will be the principal piece rehearsed.

T. Toomer, colored, was before the Mayor this morning for disorderly conduct, for which he was sentenced to confinement for five days in the city prison. James Cutler, also colored, charged with the same offence, was discharged.

The *Goldboro Messenger* says: Quite a large party of Goldboro ladies, members of the Episcopal church, is being made up to attend the consecration of Rev. Dr. Watson, as Bishop of the Diocese of East Carolina, to take place at Wilmington, on the 17th inst.

Declared Insane.

Sol. W. Nash, a well-known colored man of this city, who for several years was keeper of the county jail, has for several months manifested a loss of control of his mental powers. He has not been seriously affected until within a comparatively short time, since when he has shown unmistakable evidence of mental aberration, and the disorder became so pronounced that a commission *lunatico de inquirendo* was held in regard to him and he was pronounced insane and placed in jail for safe keeping. It is thought that with proper treatment in hospital, his reason may be restored. The cause of his affliction is supposed to be the results of a sunstroke which he received in the Summer of '82, from the effects of which he has never fully recovered.
