Board of Aldermen.

The Board met in adjourned meeting last night at 8 p. m. Present His Honor E. D. Hall, Mayor, and Aldermen DeRosset, Boney, Bear, Dudley, Fishblate, Chadbourn, Sweet, Howe, and Geyer.

The proceedings of last meeting read and approved. Aldermen Boney was excused from the meeting of the Board.

Committee on Finance made the following report:

Table with financial data: Current expenses 75 cents, producing \$37,500; Interest on Debt 80 cents, producing \$41,000; Sinking Fund 6 cents, producing \$3,000.

Making a total of \$123,500. It is necessary, therefore, that the appropriations shall be reduced to not exceeding this amount, and as the only item upon which any reduction can be made is that of current expenses of the city.

Table with financial data: Making a total reduction of \$4,950; Increasing the item of \$1,224.00; Wharf Department from \$900 to \$1,500.

Leaving a net reduction of \$4,250, and making the aggregate of appropriations, with the above amendments, \$71,513.33. Taking this item and the amounts necessary for other purposes, the appropriation will stand.

Alderman DeRosset moved a reconsideration of the vote adopting the amended report of the Finance Committee at last meeting. Adopted.

Alderman Fishblate moved that the report, as made by the Finance Committee, be adopted, except the reduction from the amount provided for additions to the house of Howard Relief Fire Engine Co.

Alderman DeRosset called for a division of the report of the Committee, which was ordered. The question being on the adoption of the tax levy, Alderman Dudley moved to amend by striking out \$1.50 from the poll tax and inserting \$1.

Petition of R. R. Taylor and others to erect a building on the wharf at the foot of Red Cross street, was reported to Sanitary Committee, with power to act.

Communication from Wilmington Cotton Mills relating to the accumulation of rain water at Front and Queen streets, was referred to Committee on Streets and Wharves.

Petition of R. E. Heide and others for improvement of South Water street was referred to Committee on Streets and Wharves, with instruction to get information and report as to probable cost of work.

Petition of George R. Bats for lamps on Fourth street, between Bladen and Harnett, was referred to Committee on Lights with power to act.

Communication from J. E. Lippitt to insure the city horses, was referred to Finance Committee.

Petition of W. H. Strauss and others for increase of policemen, was referred to Police Committee.

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Petition of James Bland and others for use of City Hall, was granted.

Alderman DeRosset offered the following: The Committee on Streets and Wharves have agreed to give the contract for furnishing drivers and feeding caring for city mules and horses to T. J. Southerland, at his bid.
