The case decided was that of William Astor against Collector Merrit, of New York, and was published at the time it was rendered, but, for the benefit of those who may have overlooked it, it may not be inopportune to repeat the gist of the decision. The court held that to constitute wearing apparel in the meaning of the section which exempts wearing apparel from duty, it must be in a condition to be worn with out further manufacture by the passenger returning from abroad; must be intended for his own use or that of his family who accompany him as passengers, and not to be given away; must be suitable for the season of the year. and must not exceed in quantity or quality the ordinary character of his apparel, or what is reasonable in view of his means and station. The trade of Mexico and of Central and South American nations goes across the Atlantic instead of coming to New Orleans, Norfolk, New York or Boston. Its appropriation will show to the people of neighboring nations that these United States are anxious to form close commercial, alliances with them, and the moment they are convinced of this they will respond in a manner which must be beneficial to us. It is to be regretted that a wise policy of non-inerference with the affairs of f-reign nations, adopted with excellent reason by the founders of this govern ment, has in later years been so per, verted as to become a practical bar to intimate trade intercourse with the pcople of nations close by us-an intercourse which could but have been beneficial to all concerned. A hundred 'years ago we were three millions of people, just forming a government of a new kind for ourselves, and threatened on all sides. To-day we are fifty-five millions, our system of government is really adopted by almost the whole continent, and no foreigh power would for a moment on high, its king cometh out of the dream of interference with us. Yet the chambers of eternity. non-action which was formerly the dictate of self-interest-and application of the law of self-preservation-has become a settled principle of government; even more-we carry the idea beyond any point which the carlier statesmen thought of. Happily the accumulated capital of the country seeks outlets, and the spirit of adventure and enterprise and common sense is abroad in the land; and the theorist who fails to find in the constitution any warrant for the expenditure of this million of dollars is unheeded when he protests.




