LOCAL NEWS.

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The receipts of cotton at this port today foot up 43 bales.

The measles appear to be raging in the city about as badly as they have at any time since they first made their appearance.

Capt. E. W. Manning brought into the city this morning an onion, which was grown this year at Piney Grove, on the Sound, which measured four-and-a-half inches across.

The preparations for the Hibernian Ball which is to take place on Wednesday evening are about complete and those who are to attend may assure themselves beforehand of an enjoyable evening.

Sol. Nash, colored, who was declared insane a short time since and has been at the County Poor House awaiting an opportunity for admission to the State Insane Asylum at Goldsboro, will leave for that institution to-morrow morning.

Yesterday was very warm, and some of the horses showed signs of hard driving last night. Men should be careful of themselves during the hot weather and they should also be careful of the animals of which they have control for the time being.

Rev. Dr. Bobbitt, Presiding Elder of the Wilmington District, M. E. Church, preached twice at the Front Street Church yesterday—in the morning and again at night. There were large congregations on both occasions, and much religious fervor was manifested.

There were three cases of disorderly conduct, all by colored men, for the Mayor's consideration this morning. Two of the parties were fined \$5 each and the other was fined \$3. They all paid the fines and made a special request that their names should not be published.

Population in 1880. The following statistics, gathered from the Census Report of 1880, are of interest and importance to the people of this county and city: Population of New Hanover county—whites, 8,159, colored, 13,217; total, 21,376; colored majority, 5,058. Population of Wilmington—whites, 6,888, colored, 10,462; total in the city, 17,350; colored majority in the city, 3,574. Population in the county, outside of the city—whites, 1,271, colored, 2,755; total, 4,026; colored majority outside of the city, 1,484.

The lad stated that he had been driven from home by his parents, but a colored man came along and said that the boy had run away from home, instead of being driven away. He took charge of the boy and said that he would see him properly cared for.

The Seaside. Messrs. Scoville & Co. have made arrangements for the temporary accommodation of such guests at the Seaside Park Hotel, as may visit them in quest of oysters and the accompanying documents. The Hotel will be opened for transient and permanent guests by the 1st of June, and possibly before that time, as the proprietors are working hard to be ready for the regular Summer business at as early a day as possible.

Memorial Day. The Ladies Memorial Association will meet this afternoon to act on the suggestion made in the REVIEW a few days since, that the Memorial Services be held this year either on Friday or on Monday, as the 10th falls on Saturday. There is no doubt, we think, that they will agree upon Monday as the day as there are some important reasons why Friday should not be selected.

The Government Wharf. On Thursday last the U. S. Senate passed the bill to authorize the purchase of a wharf for the use of the government in this city. It proposes to direct the Secretary of the Treasury to cause an examination to be made of the wharf in front of the custom house and other property at the port of Wilmington, N. C., offered by Mr. E. E. Burruss, President of the First National Bank, of Wilmington, and on inquiry as to the necessity of the use of the property described for the revenue marine service and other custom purposes at that port, and if it shall be found advantageous and necessary for such purposes, to purchase the same at a reasonable price, not exceeding \$30,000.

Wilmington Gas Light Co. The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Wilmington Gas Light Company was held at the company's office, in this city, to-day. Mr. E. T. Hancock was called to the Chair and Mr. George R. French, Jr., acted as Secretary. An election of Directors for the ensuing year was held when the following Board were reelected, to wit: Edward Kidder, Donald MacRae, Wm. H. McRary, E. S. Martin, George R. French, Sr., Dr. A. J. DeRosset and Richard J. Jones. After the meeting had adjourned the newly elected Board met and elected Mr. Edward Kidder, President, Mr. Richard J. Jones, Secretary and Treasurer and Mr. Geo. W. Reilly, Superintendent. All reelected.

Literary. We have received from a friend in this city a romance entitled "A Daughter of the Gods; and How She Came Into Her Kingdom." By Charles M. Clay New York: White, Stokes & Allen. This is a romance in the truest sense of the word, as the writer has indulged his imagination almost without restraint. It is a weird tale, founded upon happenings in these prosaic days of facts, and yet the author does not hesitate to blend in with his narrative of events the magic of the Arabian Nights. His extremes meet with a vengeance when a British war steamer is made to anchor within a cable's length of a cave wherein lies the fabled Fountain of Youth, in which the heroine has actually bathed and been gifted thereby with lost youth and beauty. It may be that an allegory is intended, but if so we fail to see it. Still, there are evidences of great power—repressed powers it may be said—in the author and the interest of the reader is readily enlisted and held throughout the work.
