Personal.

Miss Amy M. Bradley, Principal of the Tileston Normal School, will close the scholastic year on the 30th inst and will soon after that go North to spend the Summer with friends in New England.

Mr. A. S. Heide, who left here about two years ago for a residence in Savannah, has returned to Wilmington and hopes to remain here in future. He thinks there is no place to equal the old sand hills.

For Convention.

We are requested by Mr. John F. Shackelford, agent at Tarboro for the line of steamers running between that place and Washington, to state that the steamer Greenville will be held over at Tarboro until 3 o'clock on Tuesday next, the 13th inst., to connect with the train arriving there on that day. This will, we think, make it but a day's trip between Wilmington and Washington and is the most expeditious, if not the most pleasant, route.

A Modest Thief.

We learn that a party resident on Howard street, which is in the extreme Northwestern section of the city, had his hen coop raided last night and six chickens stolen therefrom. The thief was very ceremonious in the transaction and left a note in which he stated that he had never expected to be reduced to such a strait, but that he must eat. He also pledged himself, when fortune should smile upon him, to return the pay for the chickens stolen with interest. Several names were signed to the note.

City Court.

The first case for the Mayor's consideration this morning was that of James Brown, colored, who was charged with disorderly conduct last night at the corner of Seventh and Nun streets. He was sent below for 5 days. It was very evident from his conduct in the court room as well as by his actions when arrested that he was insane and the confinement was a wise precaution.

The Concord Register, in speaking of Rev. C. M. Payne, late pastor of the Second Presbyterian Church in this city, says:

The Rev. Mr. Payne preached his first sermons as pastor of the Presbyterian church last Sunday morning and night. Our people were highly gratified with the fervent, earnest and interesting preaching of the pastor on that occasion - his entry upon his pastoral mission. Mr. Payne went for his family (wife and daughter) on Wednesday, and will return with them to-morrow. He will occupy his pulpit on Sunday. His household effects are here and the Pastor and family will be established in the Parsonage next week.

Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows.

The Grand Lodge I. O. O. F. of North Carolina, organized in this city January 6th, 1843, will meet in annual session this year at Winston, on the 14th inst.

The representatives from the Lodges in this place are, from Cape Fear, No. 2, Oscar Pearsall, Esq., and from Orion No. 67, H. O. Craig, Esq. Past Grand W. J. Penny, and Grand Treasurer, R. J. Jones, will also attend.

Mr. Jones was first elected Treasurer of the Grand Lodge at the session held in this city in November, 1855, and has the longest official record of any officer of the Grand Lodge in this State, and probably, of this Order, in the United States.

ANNUAL PARADE.

The White Fire Companies - Their Appearance Yesterday - Floral Decorations - Music by the Cornet Concert Club - Collation.

The white companies of the city fire department held their annual parade yesterday afternoon and marched in the following order, the starting point being the Hook & Ladder Hall, on Dock street, near Fourth street, at a little after 5 o'clock, where the parade line was formed: A platoon of police under Sergeant Robert Green followed by Assistant Marshal Herbert Latimer, of the Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Company, No. 1, who conducted the parade. The Cornet Concert Club with full ranks came next and furnished the music for the occasion. Then came Capt. C. D. Myers, Chief, and Mr. J. G. Oldenbittel, Assistant, followed by the Howard Relief Steam Fire Engine Company, No. 1, with their engine, the A. Adrian, and hose reel, both elegantly and lavishly decorated with flowers and evergreens. The engine was drawn by four horses and the reel by one. Next came the Wilmington Hook & Ladder Company, No. 1, with their truck, which was drawn by four horses and was profusely decorated with flowers. Then came the Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Company, No. 1, with their engine, the Little Giant, drawn by four horses and also elegantly decorated with flowers and evergreens.

The members of the Howard Relief Company wore the new uniforms, which we have recently described in the REVIEW. The Hook and Ladder Company wore red shirts, red helmets and black trousers, and the W. S. F. E. Co. wore gray suits trimmed with red and black helmets; and all presented a fine and imposing appearance.

The line of march was up Fourth, to Princess, down Princess to Third, up Third to Chestnut, where the procession was joined by a carriage containing His Honor, Mayor Hall, Aldermen G. J. Boney and S. H. Fishblade, Chairman of the Committee on Fire Department and Public Buildings, and Alderman Bear, of the Committee on Fire Department. Thence the procession moved down Chestnut to Front, down Front to Nun, up Nun to Third, up Third to Dock up Dock to Fourth, and up Fourth to the Little Giant Engine House, in the Hall of which a bountiful collation under the direction of the three companies had been prepared for the tired and, by this time, hungry firemen. The Hall was beautifully decorated for the occasion, and after the demands of the inner man had been satisfied toasts and speeches became in order. Interesting remarks were made by Capt. C. D. Myers, and Aldermen Fishblade, Boney and Bear.

The weather was all that could be desired; there was no dust, and the parade was one of the prettiest and most imposing we have seen. There was nothing to mar the pleasure and elegance of the parade, and our firemen are to be congratulated upon their appearance yesterday as reflecting honor upon our city, their organization as firemen and upon themselves as fellow citizens.

In closing this report, we would be unjust to ourselves, to the city and to the Cornet Concert Club did we fail to commend the excellent music furnished for the occasion by the Club. There were quite a number in the Club who have had but a brief time for practice, and we had no reason to expect such fine music as they discoursed yesterday. They did well, and their efforts showed that they had been faithful and earnest pupils under most thorough and efficient teaching.

We neglected to state in the appropriate place that before the parade the members of the Howard Relief and Wilmington Steam Fire Engine Companies accepted of an invitation and proceeded to the Hall of the Hook & Ladder Company where they partook of a bountiful collation that had been prepared for them by the members of the last named company.

On account of the absence of Rev. Dr. Pritchard at Baltimore, where he is in attendance upon the Southern Baptist Convention now in session in that city, there will probably be no preaching at the First Baptist Church to-morrow.

Episcopal Convention.

The first annual Convention of the Diocese of East Carolina will be held at Washington, Beaufort county, commencing on Wednesday, the 14th inst., at 10 o'clock a. m. There are three routes by which the delegates from this portion of the Diocese may reach Washington, as follows:

1st - Leave Wilmington on the 9 a. m. train, and take the train at Rocky Mount, for Tarboro, where it makes connection with the steamer Greenville, which arrives at Washington the same night.

Beaten by Wind and Rain.

SAILORS ON THE SEA AND LABORERS ON THE LAND - HELP FOR THE LABOARD WATCH. "There is no telling the force of the wind; and the height and rush of the sea was simply appalling. When Cornish, the boatswain, and myself came down aloft, after furling the main royal we were wet through and half dead from the hard toll and the exposure."
