We think there is danger of some confusion in the action of the Democratic County Conventions throughout the State in regard to the election of delegates to the National Convention at Chicago, and we call attention to the fact in order that the danger may be avoided. The State Executive Committee recommended that each county should send delegates to meet at Raleigh at the same time with the meeting of the State Convention, for the purpose of electing delegates to the Chicago Convention, instead of waiting for the regular district nominating conventions to do so—because some of these district nominating conventions will not be held until after the Chicago Convention. The recommendation of the State Executive Committee has been adopted by some counties and not by others. The Executive Committee of the Third District have refused to adopt it. We see that Mecklenburg and perhaps other counties of the Sixth District propose to adopt it, and we call attention to the matter in order that these counties which have not yet acted may know what other counties in the same Congressional District are doing. If the Congressional Convention in the Sixth or any other District is not to be held until after July 8th, (the date of the Chicago Democratic Convention) then of course these district conventions cannot elect the delegates and the recommendation of the State Executive Committee must be adopted by them.

Prof. John M. Langston, Minister to Haiti, is a quadron. Frederick Douglass is a mulatto. They have locked horns in angry controversy. Langston makes numerous charges of bad faith against Douglass, who retorts vigorously upon "the shameless liar" and hopes that his specific denial may "settle like a mantle of fire on the head of the heartless maligner."

Grand Lodge I. O. O. F.

The delegates from this city to the meeting of the grand lodge of this order at Winston have returned. They report that the meeting was an agreeable one, that much business was transacted, and that their reception and entertainment were hearty in the extreme. The following officers were chosen: Grand Master, John E. Woodward, of Wilson; Deputy Grand Master, J. H. Masten, of Winston; Grand Warden, C. B. Edwards, of Raleigh; Grand Secretary, J. J. Litchford, of Raleigh; Grand Treasurer, R. J. Jones, of Wilmington; representative to the Sovereign Grand Lodge, J. F. Payne, of Monroe.
It being announced that Rev. C. C. Dodson, grand chaplain, was seriously sick, the following resolution was unanimously adopted by a rising vote: Whereas, we learn with profound sorrow of the extreme illness of our worthy brother, C. C. Dodson, grand chaplain of this body. Therefore be it resolved that our worthy master be requested to appoint three members from this lodge to bear its consolation and sympathy to the family of the afflicted brother.
An elaborate and able report upon the subject of dues and benefits was made by past grand master C. M. Basbee, chairman of the committee on the subject, appointed at the last session, and the following were among the resolutions reported and adopted: Resolved, That from and after July 1st, 1884, no subordinate lodge shall pay as weekly benefits more than one-half the sum collected as annual dues from each member, except that any lodge receiving an income from any other source than dues, initiation and degrees, may provide for an increase of weekly benefits, to be paid out of such income.
Resolved, That from and after July 1st, 1884, all funeral benefits shall be paid by an assessment levied pro rata upon each member of the Lodge; provided, that the same may be paid out of the receipts by any Lodge from sources other than dues, degrees and initiations, if such Lodge shall so determine.
On Thursday evening a banquet, an elegant affair in every particular, was given by the Lodges in Winston, and it was a happy close to a pleasant and harmonious session.

Medical Convention.

The North Carolina Medical Society will convene at Raleigh to-morrow morning. Dr. Thos. F. Wood left here this morning to be in attendance, and Drs. Bellamy, Thomas, (G. G.) Macomber, Smith and Pritchard will leave for the same purpose to-night. We learn that the last three named gentlemen will go before the Board of Medical Examiners to be examined for a license to practice medicine in this State in accordance with the law.

Young Cranes.

A gentleman from this city happened to find the nest of a crane a few miles below the city on the 10th inst., and he took a couple of the eggs which it contained and brought them home and placed them under a hen that was setting. Yesterday two lively young cranes burst from their shells and at last accounts were doing well. The managers of the North Carolina State Exposition are about to issue a pamphlet regarding its interests, objects, aims and expected results, and as the funds in their hands are somewhat limited, they would be glad of some advertising patronage. Brutal Assault.

On Saturday night, between the hours of 10 and 11 o'clock, Mr. Willie Dahmer, who lives on the corner of Third and Brunswick streets, on the North side of the Railroad, was assaulted by Daniel Leak, colored, and others and seriously injured. Dahmer's sister had started to a neighboring store to make some purchases and while on her way was met and insulted by the colored men which caused her to scream for assistance. Willie hearing the cry started to his sister's assistance and protection and when he approached the scene, the ruffians attacked him, and Leak struck him upon the head and arms which knocked him down and inflicted wounds which are of a serious and dangerous nature. Leak, who is a train hand on the local freight of the Carolina Central Railroad, was arrested by officer Statcher yesterday afternoon and lodged in jail to await an examination, which will take place this evening before Justice Strauss. We learn that it is the opinion of the physician who was called to the wounded man, that his wounds are very serious and may result fatally.

On to Onslow!

It is full time, we think, that some organized movement should be made by our people looking to the construction of a railroad to Onslow county. We believe that the road can be built, that it will be built and that it can be made to pay and believing this we can but urge upon our people the necessity of action, and prompt action at that. While we are wasting time in talking others have taken the bull by the horns and have organized a movement to secure the trade along the coast for Newbern, Norfolk and Baltimore.
There seems to be a growing sentiment in the city in favor of the plan proposed by us, that a substantial municipal subscription be made to the enterprise, and we believe, if the matter was properly presented to our people, that a majority would vote in favor of it. We understand that the people of Onslow county are very anxious to trade here, preferring Wilmington to any other place, and we think that handsome subscriptions might be had there in aid of the enterprise. If we remember correctly, it was said some years ago that the county would subscribe \$50,000 in aid of the road, as projected then, and it may be that the same amount may be secured there now.
But, with this or without it, the people of Wilmington should look the fact squarely in the face that this road must be built, and that at an early day. It is essential to the financial health and prosperity of the place that it should be done. We want to see the ball put in motion at once.
