## Convention of East Carolina.

The first Annual Convention of East Carolina convened in St. Peter's Church, in this town, on Wednesday, the 14th of May. No deliberative assembly has ever met in Washington that presented a finer appearance or contained more intellectual culture. The Rt. Rev. A. A. Watson, Bishop of the Diocese, offered prayers and called the convention to order.

The Secretary, Rev. N. Harding, called the roll and the following clergy members responded to their names: Rt. Rev. A. A. Watson, D.D., Rev. N. Collin Hughes, Revs. Jos. C. Huske, D. D., Israel Harding, Luther Eborn, John Kierman, N. Harding, Robert B. Drane, Samuel S. Barber, Thomas B. Haughton, Charles O. Brady, N. E. Price, Robert B. Windley, N. Collin Hughes, Jr., Henry S. McDuffie.

A quorum being present, the Bishop declared the convention open for business.

On motion the convention took a recess for the purpose of divine services.

Morning prayer was said by Rev. R. B. Drane, the Rev. N. C. Hughes, Jr., and Rev. Dr. Carmichael reading the Litany and prayers.

The sermon before the convention was preached by Rev. N. C. Hughes. The Bishop pronounced the benediction.

After the conclusion of the services the convention reassembled. On motion Rev. E. M. Forbes was unanimously elected President, Rev. N. Harding was unanimously elected Secretary.

A discussion arose upon a motion to change one of the canons of the church. Dr. Huske, chairman of the committee of canons, suggested delays for report of committee and the resolution was withdrawn.

Col. J. W. Atkinson offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That all clergymen, rectors or assistant clergymen of parishes within the limits of the Diocese of East Carolina, who were so resident at the time of the organization of said Diocese are entitled to seats in this convention as members thereof.

This resolution was discussed by several members. Subsequently Mr. Wm. Calder obtained leave and offered the following resolution:

That the Secretary be instructed to send the following by telegraph to the Secretary of the Convention of North Carolina: "The Diocese of East Carolina in Convention assembled send fraternal greeting to their brethren of North Carolina, praying that the Holy Ghost may direct, sanctify and govern them and us in our present work."

The Bishop handed the following telegram to Secretary Harding:

CHARLESTON, S. C., May 14, '84. Rt. Rev. A. A. Watson, Bishop Diocese of East Carolina:

The 9th Annual Convention of the Diocese of South Carolina sends fraternal greeting to the first Convention of East Carolina.

B. W. HOWE, President.

On motion of Mr. Winston, the following dispatch was sent in reply:

The first Annual Convention of the Diocese of East Carolina reciprocates the fraternal greeting of the Annual Convention of the Diocese of South Carolina, and prays that a wise Providence will guide, direct and bless them and us in our work.

A. A. WATSON, Bishop.

To Bishop Howe, Charleston, S. C.:

Dr. Huske of the Finance Committee reported the books, accounts and vouchers to the Treasurer all correct.

On motion of F. D. Wilson, Dr. DeRosset of Wilmington, was unanimously re-elected Treasurer.

Dr. Huske reported at length as Chairman of the Standing Committee, detailing the reception of the consent of the Forty-eight Dioceses to Dr. Watson's election as Bishop of the Diocese of East Carolina, and giving an account of the consecration.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Forbes, all visiting clergy and candidates for orders were invited to seats in the Convention.

On motion of Rev. Mr. Drane, the Secretary was directed to call on the Treasurer for funds to meet the current expenses of the Secretary's office.

Dr. Huske, of the Committee on Canons, reported at length and the report, making some important changes, was adopted.

### SECOND DAY.

The Secretary read a telegram from the Diocese of North Carolina as follows:

OXFORD, N. C., May 14, '84. Rev. N. Harding, Secretary:

The Convention of North Carolina

sends its cordial greetings and best wishes to the Convention of East Carolina.

The Bishop announced standing committees, as follows:

Committee on Canons—Rev. J. C. Huske, D. D., V. W. Shields, T. M. Ambler, Messrs. John Hughes and A. J. DeRosset.

State of Church—Revs. R. B. Drane, J. Eborn, N. C. Hughes, Jr., Messrs. F. D. Winston and J. G. Brazag.

Finance—Revs. N. C. Hughes, Sr., I. Harding, Messrs. Geo. S. Miller, Geo. H. Roberts, Wm. Calder.

Elections—Revs. N. C. Hughes, Jr., Messrs. O. P. Meares and E. S. Hoyt.

New Parishes—Rev. T. B. Haughton, Messrs. F. A. Boyle and R. H. Everett.

Unfinished Business—Rev. N. E. Price, Messrs. C. L. Pettigrew and R. R. Cotten.

The Bishop then delivered his annual address.

Rev. J. C. Huske, chairman of the Committee on Canons, submitted report and a resolution as follows:

Resolved, That where the word North Carolina occurs in the title page or Canons of the Diocese that the words "East Carolina" be substituted.

Resolved, That in Canon 17th, Section 1, the word "six" be stricken out and the word "three" be inserted; and that in the same Canon the words "of Raleigh, of Charlotte and of Morganton" be stricken out.

Resolutions adopted.

Rev. T. M. Ambler offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That the second section of Canon XIX be amended by striking out in the second line the clause, "The clerical members of the Diocesan Convention" and also the last sentence of the said Canon.

Referred to Committee on Finance on motion of Dr. DeRosset.

Col. Atkinson offered following resolution:

Resolved, That a committee of three, of which the Bishop of the Diocese shall be chairman, shall be appointed to inquire and report to the Convention of this Diocese, at its next session, a plan for the formation of a league or brotherhood to aid the families of the deceased clergymen in this Diocese.

Carried.

Col. DeRosset introduced the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Constitution of this Diocese be amended by omitting the word "convention" and inserting "council" wherever the former occurs as referring to the representative body of the church in this Diocese.

Referred to Committee on Canons.

Dr. DeRosset offered certain amendments to the Canons of the church. Referred to Committee on Canons.

Mr. F. H. Boyle introduced the following resolution: That the 1st Article of the Constitution be amended so as to read "The Church in the Diocese of East Carolina," instead of "The Church in this Diocese." Referred to Committee on Canons.

Mr. John S. Long introduced a resolution as follows: That the Church Messenger, published in Charlotte and edited by Rev. E. N. Joyner, is a religious journal of high character and effective influence, that it has rendered good service to the cause of religion in North Carolina, and that we recommend it to the support of all the clergy and laity within the bounds of this Diocese.

Carried.

Dr. DeRosset moved that all clergymen who are accorded a seat in this convention be entitled to take part in the discussion. Carried.

Mr. O. P. Meares, Jr., offered the following resolution: That the word twelve in Section 3, Article III, be stricken out and the word six inserted, so as to read: As well as having been a resident therein for six calendar months, &c. Referred.

The Committee on New Parishes, through Rev. T. B. Haughton, reported that they have examined the papers relating to the formation of St. Cyprian's Mission, of New Berne, and find them in due form and correct, and do therefore recommend the admission of said Parish, and that the delegates therefrom be admitted to seats. Adopted.

Rev. R. B. Drane introduced the following: Whereas, the resolution adopted by the convention in St. Peter's, Charlotte, with reference to a division of the permanent funds of the Diocese of North Carolina, did not name the North Carolina Scholarship Fund in the General Theological Seminary, Therefore,

Resolved, That the attention of the joint committee be called to this fund and it be authorized to take final action for this Diocese.

Dr. DeRosset introduced this resolution: That the Treasurer be authorized to pay the expenses of such clergy as are in attendance upon this convention being in charge of parishes but not entitled to seats. Adopted.

The Secretary, Rev. N. Harding, under instructions from the Primary Convention, reported that he had prepared a history of the movement looking to the division of the Diocese and a complete record of the proceedings of the primary convention. The historical preface was written by Rev. R. B. Drane.

On motion of Dr. DeRosset the communication was referred to a committee of three for revision and correction. The committee to report to-morrow.

The Bishop constituted the committee as follows:

Rev. R. B. Drane, Col. W. L. DeRosset, and Major John Hughes.

The following telegram was received and read:

"The Convention of the Diocese of Georgia send fraternal greetings to the Bishop and Diocese of East Carolina on their first meeting in convention.

REX. W. C. HUNT, SAMUEL HALL.

On motion, Rev. V. W. Shields and Mr. F. A. Boyle were appointed to respond to the Georgia Convention's telegram.

On motion of Dr. DeRosset, the Convention went into the election of committees. The following were elected:

Standing Committee—Revs. J. C. Huske, D. D., T. M. Ambler, N. C. Hughes, Jr., and Messrs. John Hughes and A. J. DeRosset.

Missionary Committee—The Bishop ex officio, Revs. I. Harding, T. M. Ambler, and Messrs. J. W. Atkinson and H. G. Smallbones.

Educational Committee—Rev. N. C. Hughes, Sr., and Messrs. J. S. Long and Wm. Calder.

Church Building Committee—The

Bishop ex officio, Revs. R. B. Drane, N. Harding, T. B. Haughton and Messrs. F. A. Boyle and W. G. Lamb.

For behalf of St. James' Parish, Wilmington, Col. DeRosset tendered the Diocese of East Carolina its one-fourth undivided interest in the church property at Wilmington.

On motion of F. D. Winston, it was accepted with the conditions imposed by the terms of the gift.

The Secretary read a communication from the Secretary of the House of Lay Deputies of the United States, in regard to proposed changes and amendments in the constitution of the church. Concurred in.

Col. Atkinson reported for the committee in relation to the Ravenscroft Mission and Training School at Asheville. Referred to the joint committee on the Division of the Property of the Old Diocese.
