## IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

### SENATE.

WASHINGTON, May 20.—After the transaction of the routine morning business the Agricultural Appropriation bill was taken up and proceeded with by sections. One of the amendments added to the bill by the Senate committee appropriates \$20,000 for continuing the location and sinking of artesian wells on the plains, with a view to reclaiming arid and waste public lands. A good deal of objection was raised to this provision. Finally, this appropriation was limited to the construction of two wells and the amendment was agreed to—yeas 28, nays 22.

Another addition made to the bill by the Senate committee was \$15,000 for the encouragement of silk culture. Mr. George moved to amend by making the amount \$30,000. The amendment was defeated by a vote of 22 yeas to 29 nays, and the amount was allowed to stand at \$15,000. At the close of the debate the bill was passed without division. The only changes of importance made by the Senate are an increase in the amount of the appropriation for laboratory from \$16,000 to \$50,000, the addition of the item of \$20,000 for sinking artesian wells on arid lands, and the item of \$15,000 for the encouragement and development of silk culture.

### HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. Ellis, of La., from the committee on Appropriations, asked leave to report a joint resolution making an additional appropriation of \$100,000 for the relief of the sufferers from the overflow of the Mississippi river and its tributaries.

Mr. Connelly, of Penn., objected to the consideration of the resolution. The Speaker announced the appointment of Messrs. Ellis, Holman and Ryan as conferees on the Indian Appropriation bill. On motion of Mr. Slocum, of N. Y., the Senate amendments to the Dingley Shipping bill were non-concurred in. A number of reports were submitted by various committees and placed upon appropriate calendars, and then at 12:30 the House proceeded to the consideration of the Indiana contested election case of English vs. Peelle.

The majority resolution declares that William E. English was duly elected a member of the 48th Congress. Mr. Converse, of Ohio, made the opening speech in support of the claimant. He asserted that the constitution of Indiana had been violated by the Republican managers by the printing of tickets which could be easily distinguished; that counterfeited Democratic tickets were circulated; that fraud and coercion were practiced upon paupers from poor houses, and that the votes of naturalized citizens and others were frequently rejected.

Mr. Hurd, of O., presented the grounds on which the contestee, Peelle, loses his claim to the seat and controverted assertions made by the majority, contending that they had no foundation on which to rest. Advancing the claims of the contestant, Mr. Lowry, of Ind., referred to Thos. A. Hendricks. Perhaps some of his Republican friends had heard of that gentleman as having been the successful candidate for the Vice Presidency in 1876.

Mr. Reid, of Me., disclaimed any knowledge of the gentleman in that connection. Mr. Lowry retorted by intimating that Hendricks might be heard of as elected to the same office in 1881, in connection with the great heart of the Democratic party—Samuel J. Tilden. Pending further debate, the House adjourned.

## STATE NEWS.

*News and Observer:* Yesterday the State board of medical examiners, of which Dr. P. E. Hines is president, met at the Yarboro to examine applicants for license to practice medicine. Other members of the board present were Drs. Haigh, of Fayetteville; Wood, of Wilmington; Lewis of Raleigh; Bahnsen, of Salem. About fifty applicants were examined. The result of the examination will be announced to-day.

*Newborn Journal:* Our new mayor, E. H. Meadows, Esq., took the oath of office before W. M. Watson, Esq., on yesterday and entered upon the duties of his office. —Rev. Dr. Whitfield, of Goldsboro, is assisting Rev. C. A. Jenkins in a series of meetings at the Baptist Church this week. Preaching every night and prayer meeting in the evening. —Dr. House, of this city, tells of a pigkilled by him a few days ago. He was seven months old when killed, and always athearty and kept fat every day of his life and when dressed weighed just eighteen pounds. —The Superior Court of this county will assemble next Tuesday with Judge Avery presiding. There are now near one hundred cases on the criminal docket, and of these fourteen are jail cases or defendants in jail awaiting trial.

*Danbury Reporter:* The crop prospects in Stokes are very flattering indeed. Abundance of fruit, corn is coming up well, wheat never looked more promising, nobody complains of the want of tobacco plants, and the grasses are pushing ahead to make feed for the poor stock. — It is true the iron of the county has not been developed to any great extent, but enough to satisfy any one that we have it in inexhaustible quantities. There are two or three mines just around Danbury from which one hundred cars per day could be loaded. There are 25 square miles of iron in the immediate vicinity of Danbury. Yes, it is a fact that there is a scope of country just across the river north of this place, on every square mile of which may be found valuable deposits of excellent magnetic iron ore. It is strange that capitalists, contemplating investing their money in railroads, do not look at this.

*Fayetteville Sun:* Mr. A. J. Hollingsworth, of east side of Cape Fear

River, has sent us an egg, of immense size, laid by a pullet. There is enough of food in this one egg to keep life in a human being for 12 days. A dozen of these eggs would be worth quite a neat little sum. —We were shown by Mr. Peterson, of this town, some crystals of sugar made in Duplin county, on Rockfish. These crystals were taken from the bottom of a barrel, where they had formed, from the syrup which filled the barrel. They constitute a right good quality of rock candy, and on being pulverized, produce a sugar as white as snow. Mr. Peterson says the farmers through Duplin are well pleased with their success in growing cane and making sugar, and that the area of land set apart for that purpose is being considerably broadened.

## The Medical Society.

The North Carolina Medical Society met in the hall of the House of Representatives at 11 o'clock this morning, and was called to order by the President, Dr. A. W. Pierce, of Weldon. The President returned the thanks of the Society for the hospitality extended by the medical profession of the city to the members of the Society. He also extended a cordial invitation to the citizens of Raleigh to come in and witness the deliberations of the Society. The chair announced as the committee on credentials—Drs. Knox, Wood and Jones.

Dr. Bahnsen, of Salem, read a letter from Dr. O. F. Manson, of Richmond, Va., an honorary member of this Society, who is prevented from attending the meeting on account of the prevalence of typhoid fever in that city. Drs. W. C. Langford, of Wake Forest, Dr. F. T. Fuller, of Raleigh, and Dr. Leroy Chapell, of Forestville, were presented by the committee on credentials and received into the Society.

The Society accepted invitations to visit the Insane Asylum at 4 p. m.; Peace Institute at 6:30 p. m., and St. Mary's at 8:30 p. m. to-day. Dr. Lewis stated that tickets would be distributed to-morrow to all the members of the Society to attend the Operetta at Tucker Hall to-morrow night.

Dr. Wood moved that 12 m. to-morrow be set apart for the election of a new Board of Medical Examiners. Motion prevailed. On motion of Dr. Picot, Chief Justice W. N. H. Smith and Associate Justice A. S. Merrimon were invited and took seats on the platform by the President. Dr. Staton moved that a committee of five be appointed to revise the by-laws and report at the next meeting of the Society, twelve months hence. The motion prevailed.

Dr. Knox, Chairman Committee on Credentials, submitted a report which was adopted. Dr. Weaver offered the following resolution: Resolved, That there be appointed by the President a committee of seven—two from the Eastern, three from the central and two from the Western portion of the State, whose duty it shall be to memorialize our next Legislature by petition or otherwise, urging upon that body in as strong terms as possible the justice and necessity for an amendment of the present law relating to the practice of medicine and surgery found in sections 3123 and 3132, chapter 34 of "The Code," so that it shall be taken and accepted that any person who shall practice medicine or surgery or any branches thereof unless he shall have been first licensed so to do by the Board of Medical Examiners of the State of North Carolina shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

## The Farmer Still Tills the Soil.

A sudden change from poverty to wealth is apt to turn men's heads, but it has not proved to be so with Mr. Floet S. Montgomery, of Mt. Olive, Ky., who last week received here, through the First National Bank, \$15,000, as the holder of one-fifth of ticket No. 86,800, which drew the capital prize in the April drawing of the Louisiana State Lottery, costing him but one dollar. He is at home pursuing the even tenor of his way as a farmer, and shows a disposition to use wisely the money dame Fortune has bestowed upon him. When the public was inclined to doubt if he would receive the money, he was effaced, by responsible parties, the amount called for, less two per cent, but knowing the integrity of the Louisiana State Lottery management, he declined the offer, and has received \$15,000 in full. It was his first lottery ticket he ever held in his life, and he paid for it the sum of one dollar. —Maysville (Ky.) Bulletin, April 29.
