STATE NEWS

Raleigh Visitor: At his residence in Louisburg, on Thursday last, after a brief illness of pneumonia, Mr. James C. Wynne, aged about 55 years. The deceased occupied the office of Sheriff of Franklin county for several years. He was also brother of our townsman, Mr. George W. Wynne.
Newton Enterprise: Col. P. M. Hildebrand has three Cotswold sheep that are hard to get ahead of in wool bearing. One is a buck, and two are ewes. Last week he clipped from the three 37 pounds of wool, the buck's coat weighing 17 pounds, and that of each of the ewes 10 pounds. The wool measured from nine to eleven inches in length.
Charlotte Observer: A splendid shower, that seemed to have been general all over the country, came upon the city yesterday afternoon. The rain was accompanied by a good deal of lightning, but no damage has been reported. The Chester & Lenoir Railroad track has now been completed to the depot in Lenoir, to which point regular trains will begin running on June 2nd. The big celebration occurs on June 5th.

Newbern Journal: Felix Pittman, a little son of Mr. F. M. Pittman, at Bell's Ferry, had the misfortune to get his right hand cut off in a planing machine on Wednesday last. Dr. Wood attended and dressed the wound, and at last report he was doing well. Some thirty registered letters were received at our postoffice Thursday night, addressed to dealers and manufacturers of tobacco, containing sums of from five to two hundred dollars, being the amount of rebate allowed by the last Congress incidental to the reduction of the tax on tobacco and cigars.

Lincolnton Press: Capt. P. Z. Baxter, an old and highly respected citizen of this county, died at his residence in North Brook township last Tuesday, May 20th, aged 63 years, 6 months and 17 days. Capt. Baxter has suffered for several years from paralysis. He was Captain of Co. K, 4th Regiment N. C. troops during the late war. A terrible epidemic of pneumonia is prevailing in Jacob's Fork township just over the line in Catawba township. Dr. A. P. Keever, the talented local physician, is down with the disease, and although Drs. Crowell and Ford of this county are riding day and night ministering to the sick they are unable to attend many who are suffering for medical attention.

Statesville Landmark: Wheat and oats between Statesville and Charlotte hardly look as well as we had expected to see them, though the farmers seem to be satisfied with the prospect. Still we think these crops look a little better North and West of Statesville than South of it. —Silas Harkness, of Gwaltney's township, Alexander county, died suddenly on the 14th inst., aged 82 or 83 years. He and a boy had been at work in a field. Moving from that to another, the boy proceeding the man, the former heard a noise behind and turning saw Harkness lying on the ground. His chin quivered and he died before the boy could do anything for him. —In the election which was held in Wilkes county last week upon the question of voting \$50,000 in bonds in aid of the extension of the Atlantic, Tennessee & Ohio Railroad from Statesville to Wilkesboro by way of Taylorsville, the proposition was carried by a decided majority. It begins to be tolerably certain now that not only Taylorsville but Wilkesboro will have a railroad before a great while.

Beaufort Telephone: Capt. Raiford Pigott was taken very sick on the schooner Myer at Bear Inlet, last week, and had to leave the vessel. He was carried home yesterday, but is quite unwell yet. Capt. John Bloodgood will take the schooner to Wilmington. A lot of magnificent sheephead, numbering 144 and weighing from three to eight pounds each, was brought into market on Monday last. The bidding on them was spirited, but they were finally taken in by Messrs. Dill & Avery and C. L. Dickinson, at 31 cents apiece for all weighing six pounds or over, and four cents each for the smaller ones. —Mr. L. Howland brought into our office one day this week a most wonderful freak of nature. It was an Irish potato vine with half a dozen or more perfect tubers at the base, from each of which leaves were putting forth although said potatoes were under the ground. Above the ground the vine grew straight to a height of about fifteen inches and at nearly every branch was a potato, some of them being more than a half inch in diameter and all growing finely. He says the potato is called the "Hebron."

News and Observer: Gov Jarvis and Col A B Andrews returned to the city early yesterday morning, on a special train, from Warm Springs. The board of commissioners for the Western North Carolina Railroad on the part of the State, composed of Gov Jarvis, Hon Z B Vance and State Treasurer Worth, accompanied by Col A B Andrews, president; Capt V E McBea, superintendent, and W A Turk, general freight and passenger agent; Mr Scott of New York, president of the Richmond and Danville Railroad Company; Sol Haas and others, passed up the road to and beyond Waynesville on an inspection tour Thursday. The road has been completed over the Balsam Mountain, ten miles beyond Waynesville, and the Nantahala will be reached by the first of September, in accordance with the contract. The trip was very enjoyable. Returning to Asheville the party went to Warm Springs. —The authorities of the Raleigh & Gaston Road say the peach crop on their line will be exceptionally large and that the shipments of the delicious fruit North are expected to be larger than ever before. —We had the pleasure of a visit yesterday from Capt. J. R. Thigpen, of Edgecombe, who brings good news of the crops there and says the people are in good heart. Last year he had 700 acres in cotton; this year he has only 450 yet expects to make fully as many bales as he did last year.


