Col. J. N. Bonaparte, who arrived on Sunday by the *Arctica* from Europe, said to an interviewer: "As to French politics, it seems to me that the Imperial sentiment is growing and the Republican forces will be compelled to unite in order to fight the Royalists and Imperialists. The supporter of the present form of government are in a majority, of course, and if they avoid quarrels among themselves they will remain so."
Oliver Wendell Holmes recalls the fact that sixty years ago three little Boston boys used to dress up in patchwork costumes of melo-dramatic heroes and perform in a garret before an audience of their young playmates. As Mr. Holmes remembers them, they had a remarkable aptitude for acting. They did not stick to the stage, for they grew up to be Wendell Phillips, Thomas G. Appleton and John Lathrop Motley.
A Washington special to the New York *Herald* says: "The report comes from New York, and was repeated on the floor of the House to-day, among the Republicans as well as Democrat members, that Mr. Tilden says he will unconditionally accept the nomination of the Democrat Convention. Fully conscious of his infirmity, he says that he is willing to die as its nominee."
A Cincinnati jury will be called on in September to decide a curious question of survivorship. William H. Woods and his wife perished in the wreck of the steamer *Asia* on Lake Huron in 1862, and the disposition of a large sum of money depends on which of the two died first. All on board were drowned except two persons, and the survivors are unable to throw any light upon the question.

Lost at Sea.

It is with the deepest sorrow that we are called upon to announce the death of Capt. Frederick Small, of the schooner *Mary E. Van Cleef*, of Camden Me. The vessel was about 40 miles from our coast on Monday night last when she struck some object which caused her to spring leak and founder. Capt. Small and crew took to a hastily constructed raft upon which he died from exhaustion. The mate and two seamen were also lost, and the cook and two seamen were saved, having been picked up by the schooner *Annie Jordan*, Capt. Harriman, on Wednesday last and carried into Brunswick, Ga., where they arrived last Saturday. Capt. Small married about four years ago the daughter of Capt. W. J. Potter, of Smithville, where his family remained until last Fall when he removed them to Rockport, Me., where his wife with two children, both boys, now reside.

Steamboat Disaster and Loss of Lives.

The steamer *Wave*, Capt. Robinson, capsized in the Cape Fear at Wanet's Landing, at 5 o'clock yesterday morning, while on her way from Fayetteville to this city, and three of those on board were drowned. The circumstances were as follows:
In coming round a curve in the river, near that place, the speed of the boat caused her to career so that her outside guard was under the water. This caused the cargo, which consisted of between 400 and 500 barrels of rosin and spirits of turpentine, to shift to that side, the weight of which capsized the boat. Those drowned were Emile Hill, a passenger, Eliza Brewington, colored, a passenger, and Ned Beebe, colored, cook. The accident happened at an hour when all the passengers and those of the crew not employed were asleep in their berths, and all those came very near being lost. The other passengers were Messrs. Edward Lilly and E. D. Burkholder of this city, Mr. Buchanan, of Charleston, S. C., and Miss Shepherd, aged about 14 years. Mr. Lilly was badly bruised and was saved with considerable difficulty. Messrs Buchanan and Burkholder came very near drowning and were saved only by superhuman efforts. Miss Shepherd was in eminent peril, but she maintained the most perfect composure and coolness throughout the trying ordeal through which she was compelled to pass with an almost inevitable death staring her in the face. The door of her stateroom was locked and it was some time, and not until the water had reached above her waist, before she was rescued by the determined efforts of Capt. Robinson. After the accident Capt. Robinson started and walked to this city, reaching here at about 1 o'clock yesterday afternoon, and gave the first intelligence of the disaster. The steamer *Wm. Nyce* was immediately sent to the scene and returned about 10 o'clock last night with the passengers. The dredging boat was sent up this morning to render such assistance in raising the *Wave* and securing the cargo as may be necessary.

Hilton Park.

EDITOR REVIEW:—
I see with great pleasure some talk of a public park at Hilton in your paper of yesterday.
Hilton could be made one of the prettiest parks in the South for a very small outlay, as the pump works are so near, and the fountain pipes would have to be but a few yards long, which would send its waters twenty feet in the air. The moss of the shade trees are already there, and the green lawn could be easily had with the ash banks and city water works so near at hand, and the reservoir could easily supply a lake in the centre of the park, which, with a few swan, gold fishes and some gentle squirrels on the trees, would please the hearts of the pretty little children that would gather there by the hundreds.
Down on the river-side could be made two nice public bath houses for the health of our citizens and handsome sail and row boats could be had in the evenings for a small price per hour, for exercise and pleasure. With a good fence the children would be perfectly safe from danger, while their fathers and mothers are resting under the shade of the trees and the young men and young ladies are talking of present and future joys but a few yards distant.
Wilmington should not be without a park for the health and pleasure of the young and the old when Hilton is so near and nature has done so much for the work.
When passing through the city in 1877, when I little expected ever to be a citizen of Wilmington, I wrote to the *Star* of this beautiful place for a park, which I now hope to see and enjoy at no distant day, and which would be one of the greatest blessings possible to every citizen and visitor to the place.
I hope our philanthropic, enterprising and far-sighted Mayor, who is encouraged will make Wilmington a great city yet, will turn his eyes in the direction of Hilton and secure the city a blessing it has needed for the last fifty years.
