Harbor Master's Report.

The following are the number and tonnage of vessels arriving at this port during the month ended May 31st, 1884:

American—6 steamers, 5,018 tons; 1 barque, 312 tons; 1 brig, 309 tons; 20 schooners, 3,058; making a total American of 28 vessels and 10,697 tons.
Foreign—10 barques, 3,744 tons; 4 brigs, 1,186 tons; total 14 foreign vessels and 4,930 tons, making a grand total of 42 vessels, aggregating 15,627 tons.

Mr. J. D. Sublett, of the Hotel Brunswick, was in the city to-day. He informs us that a family from St. Louis Mo., and another from New Orleans La., will arrive here to-morrow night, who have engaged board with him for the season.

The New Hotel.

We stated some weeks ago that there would be a new hotel built in the city before long, and we knew what we were talking about. It will be seen by reference to the proceedings of the Board of Aldermen last night, that the matter has reached a point where but little is left in uncertainty concerning it, save the time when it will be constructed and the style, size and appearance of the building when completed. The site selected is a good one, and we expect that the hotel will be pushed rapidly forward to completion, and will be such as to be an honor and an ornament to our city, as well as a source of profit to the capitalists by whose energy and means it will be erected.

Narrow Escape.

At about noon to-day a close carriage to which two horses were attached, belonging to Messrs. Hollingsworth & Co., and in which Mrs. Hollingsworth was riding, was coming down Princess street, the king-pin was jolted out in crossing Second street, which threw the whiffletrees against the legs of the horses. This frightened them and they started to run, when the driver, Antony Foster, colored, managed to turn them round, which threw the body of the carriage clear off the forward wheels and turned it over, by which Mrs. Hollingsworth received a few severe bruises. The driver stuck to the horses until the reins broke, when they rushed through Second to Market street, and finally brought up in front of Mr. A. D. West's store by one of them being thrown down on the sidewalk. Fortunately, no one was seriously injured, although it was a narrow escape for Mrs. Hollingsworth, as well as for the driver.

The Caucasian Candidate.

The Clinton *Caucasian* nominates Mr. E. T. Boykin, of Sampson county, for nomination for Congress from the Third District, and pays a glowing and deserved tribute to his sterling worth and abilities. It says:

Mr. Boykin, although a very young man, has established a reputation for political integrity, which is a great gratification to his friends. He has twice represented his county in the General Assembly with fidelity and credit. He has organized the county for three elections, and each time the majority has been largely increased. In the Senate, in 1883, he was second on the judiciary committee; chairman of the committee on asylums; on the committee from the old 3d Congressional District to re-district the State, and on the railroad commission committee. He possesses the entire confidence of his people; is a native of Sampson county, and has labored unceasingly for the success of his party in Sampson and the adjoining counties. He is not a candidate for this or any other nomination, but the party will do well to consider the propriety of nominating him at the convention at Burgaw on 2d July. His record is unassailable; his ability unquestioned; and his success, if the nominee, certain.

The Tax Levy.

The following is the statement of the amounts required for the tax levy for the year, as made by Mr. H. A. Bagg, Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, at the joint meeting of the Board of Magistrates and Board of County Commissioners, held yesterday:

Estimated.—For Criminal Court, \$8,250; Superior Court, \$1,500; Commissioners, \$800; Coroner, \$200; Justices of the Peace, \$400; Constables, \$300; Register, \$600; Advertising, \$130; Incidental, \$1,300; Roads and bridges, \$500; Superintendent of Health, \$900; Poor House, \$2,800; Out door poor, \$2,500; Hospital, \$1,800; Jail, \$1,500; Public buildings, \$600; Printing and stationery, \$400; Tax listing, \$1,050; Attorney, \$500; Elections, \$750; Tax on property purchased by county and paid to State, \$1,300. Total \$37,880.

To meet this, it is recommended that the following levy be made on property: Real and personal—For general expenses, on \$100, 204 cents; for Criminal Court on \$100, 15 cents; for hospital, on \$100, 2 cents. Total on property, 374 cents.

And on the poll—For general expenses, 614 cents; for Criminal Court 45 cents; for hospital, 6 cents. Total on poll, \$1,124. It is estimated that this levy on property and on income and franchise will realize net \$21,000; from Schedule B and C, \$4,800; 25 per cent of poll tax \$1,000. Total, 26,800. With this levy the whole tax will be as follows: For county on property 374 cents; for school tax, 124 cents. Total, 50 cents. On poll for county, \$1,124 cents; on poll for school and poor, \$1,124 cents. Total, \$2,255.

Justice Jno. D. Taylor moved that the report be accepted and the levy made in accordance with the statement and the same was unanimously received.

Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in regular monthly session at the City Hall last night.

The Mayor, on the part of the committee on Streets and Wharves, reported that the net cost of North Water street improvement was \$10,887.21, an average of the block pavement of \$2.33 per square yard. The amount appropriated was \$11,000.

A communication from Mr. O. G. Parsley, in the matter of the wall on Ann street, was referred to a Committee. J. R. Turrentine's claim for damages to his office was referred to a special committee and the city attorney.

Alderman Boney offered a resolution, which was finally adopted, that the Chairman of the Board of Audit and Finance, R. J. Jones, be appointed on the part of the city to arrange a compromise between Mrs. Dawson and the city as to the removal of the bank portico, on Front street; provided the city is in no event to pay more than one-half the cost of the removal and the construction of a new entrance off the street; the amount not to exceed \$250.

Recommendation of the committee on Fire Department was adopted, that hydrants be placed at Market and Twelfth streets. Also, that one of the old hose reels be repaired and furnished to the Banica Hose Reel Co.

Several petitions for permission to erect wooden buildings were granted.

Petition of J. W. Telfair for use of City Hall was granted. And petition of J. C. Hill and others, to be relieved of the payment of rent for the same last Monday night, was granted.

D. W. Chadwick was elected a member of the police force in place of T. E. Myers, relieved.

The Police Committee reported that they had contracted for uniforms for the force, and were corresponding about hats.

A communication from Mr. Wm. Latimer recited that, with a view to the erection of a first-class hotel, he had secured until Wednesday, the 4th inst., the refusal of the vacant lot, corner of Third and Dock streets, and as the lot itself may not prove sufficiently large for hotel purposes, asking if the city would grant the lots on Dock street next adjoining the above mentioned lot, and, if so, upon what terms.

On motion of Alderman DeRosset, a committee was appointed to act with a committee from the Board of Audit and Finance, and to have full power in the sale of said lots to the parties who propose to erect a hotel. Aldermen DeRosset, Chadbourne and Fishblate were appointed as said committee; and on motion, the Mayor was added to the committee.

Alderman DeRosset offered a preamble and resolution, which were adopted, referring to the obstruction of sidewalks and street crossings, and making it "unlawful for any person with an infant carriage to roll the same along any sidewalk or street crossing except in single file," under a penalty of not exceeding \$10 or ten days' imprisonment.

An amendment to the tax ordinance was adopted, that stevedores be taxed \$30 per annum, or \$2 for each vessel of 300 tons or over, and \$1 for vessels under 100 tons.

The old Board of Navigation was re-elected, viz: J. H. Chadbourne, D. McRae, James Sprunt, D. G. Worth and R. E. Heide.

A resolution, that the Little Giant Company be allowed to take their engine, reel and horses to the celebration of the Newbern Fire Department, was adopted.

A motion was adopted that the Board hereafter meet at 4 p. m.

City Court.

The only case for the Mayor's consideration this morning was that of Walter Williams, colored, for disorderly conduct. It appeared from the testimony that the defendant, with others, was playing ball in the street near the corner of Sixth and Chestnut, and as a carriage was passing he threw his bat at one of the wheels. He was given 48 hours in the City Prison for the offense.

Ladies' Memorial Association.

The regular annual meeting of the Oakdale Ladies' Memorial Association was held last Saturday afternoon. After calling the meeting to order, the Treasurer read her report, balancing her account for the preceding year.

The President's report was then read by the Secretary. In it she reported that the number of stones added this year to those of previous years made in all 124 that have been placed by the Association to mark the graves of Confederate soldiers sleeping in Oakdale Cemetery. She earnestly urged the continuance of this work for "each brave Confederate as he passes over the river," even though the number increase to such an extent that it be impossible to place the floral decorations upon all, for in years to come, this simple stone will tell the stranger who pauses to read that, "here lies the ashes of one who fought to defend the home and property of his ancestors, even though the mound which now covers him be leveled with the surrounding earth."

An amendment to a previous motion was offered and adopted as follows:

That, as the number of soldiers who have died since the war, has increased to such an extent and the membership and interest in the Association decreased so greatly, as well as the small contribution of flowers for that purpose, that the Association continue to erect the memorial stone over those who pass away, but the decorations be confined, according to the original design of the Association, to those who lost their lives during, or at the close of the war, together with the usual mound decorations for those whose ashes mingle with other soil.

A motion offered, and called that the Association devise a plan to raise an amount of money to assist in establishing a Confederate Home, said amount to be given to that now being erected at Richmond, upon which the majority of this body think it would be best to centre the energies of the South, and make that Home sufficient for all the states. If, however, North Carolina determined to have one of its own, the proceeds to be reserved for our own State. A lawn party for the purpose was proposed and decided upon to be held at an early date.

A motion was offered and accepted, to the effect that Mrs. James H. Hill, who is necessarily removed from our midst, but whose interest in the Association continues unabating, be made an honorary member.

The Board met in regular monthly session at 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon. The Treasurer submitted his report for May, as follows:

General Fund, showing balance on hand, \$16,508.38.
Educational Fund, balance on hand, 14,623.80.

Of the former, the sum of \$6,666 is in the form of a certificate of deposit in the First National Bank.

The Register of Deeds submitted his report for May of fees received for marriage licenses, amounting to \$13.20, and exhibited the Treasurer's receipt for the same. Received and ordered on file.

On motion, the petition of F. H. Darby, J. D. Bellamy, Jr., and other members of the Bar, in reference to the General Index, in the Register's office, was ordered laid over for a subsequent meeting of the Board.

The Board adjourned to meet Wednesday night, at 7 1/2 o'clock.
