Born to Suffer.

John Stevenson, of Westville, has a son about 2 years of age suffering from hydrocephalus, or dropsy of the brain. Shortly after birth the child's head began to expand, and the bones of the skull separated until only a thin tissue remained as a covering. This tissue is covered with thin hair. The skull is now nearly three times as large as the head should be. The eyeballs protrude from the head. Several physicians, called to attend the child would not run the risk of performing an operation. Dr. E. L. R. Thompson was called and performed two operations successfully. The doctor first found a thin part in the skull where there were no large blood vessels, and then pierced the skull for about an inch with a sharp needle-like instrument, after which he inserted a small tube and, with the aid of another instrument, drew a half-pint of water from the child's head. He repeated the operation a few days after and at that time drew nearly a quart of water from the child's head. He then covered the head with bandages. The swelling is gradually subsiding. The doctor will perform another operation soon, and expects to then draw off all the water. He did not draw all the water off at first, as the head would have been liable to collapse and convulsions would probably have ensued. Dr. Thomas has treated two cases of hydrocephalus with success, and as the child is doing well he expects it will pull through, although the brain of such a person will not be as strong as it otherwise would. The child is liable to be weak mentally, but better results are looked for. This disease is one of very rare occurrence, and the operation is a very delicate one.—New Haven Palladium.
