IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

WASHINGTON, June 9.—Mr. Vance submitted the views of the minority of the committee on Privileges and Elections, regarding the Danville investigation, and asked that it be printed with the extra copies of the majority report. It was so ordered.

Bills were reported favorably from the committee on the Judiciary for the relief of the political disabilities of J. R. Waddy, of Va.; W. A. S. Parker, of Va.; R. D. Thorburn, of Va.; Jas. D. Johnson, of Ga.; Duncan L. Clinch, of Ga.; and others.

Mr. Garland asked and obtained unanimous consent to put these bills at once on their passage, and they were passed.

Mr. Beck had no objection to their immediate consideration, but inquired of Mr. Garland why a general bill could not be reported covering all cases of political disabilities. The Vice President of the Southern Confederacy, Mr. Beck said, had sat at the other end of the capitol, and many other persons, distinguished in the Confederacy, had had their disabilities removed. It was twenty years since the war closed, and here we are peddling out removals of disabilities to persons who were boys when they entered the Confederate army.

Mr. Garland said the only reason why a general bill was not reported was because a majority of the committee was opposed to such a measure.

Mr. Beck ironically replied that that was a very good reason. Mr. Beck then submitted a resolution directing the Judiciary committee to report back, with its opinion thereon, a bill referred to that committee in December, 1883, providing for the general removal of political disabilities.

On Mr. Ingalls' objection, the resolution went over one day.

The Mexican Soldiers' Pension bill was taken up, and the pending amendment was laid on the table, being Mr. Riddleberger's amendment to strike out the phrase, "for the suppression of the rebellion," from Mr. Hoar's amendment providing pensions for soldiers who fought "in the late war for the suppression of the rebellion."

Mr. Williams then moved to lay Mr. Hoar's amendment on the table.

Mr. Van Wyck called for the yeas and nays on the motion to lay Mr. Hoar's amendment on the table. The result showed that a quorum was not present, and the roll was called. Forty-eight Senators being found now present, and resulted—yeas 25, nays 15. So the amendment was laid on the table.

Those voting in the affirmative are—Messrs. Bayard, Beck, Brown, Butler, Call, Cochran, Coke, Colquitt, Fair, Farley, Garland, George, Hampton, Harris, Hawley, Jonas, Miller, of Cal., Morgan, Pendleton, Platt, Pugh, Slater, Vance, Vest and Williams—25. Those voting in the negative are—Messrs. Allison, Blair, Cameron, of Wis., Conger, Dawes, Dolphin, Frye, Ingalls, Mitchell, Morrill, Pike, Sherman, Van Wyck, Voorhees and Wilson—15. Those present and not voting were paired with absent Senators—Logan being paired with Ransom.

Mr. Van Wyck offered an amendment giving pension of \$8 a month provided by the bill to officers and enlisted men or their widows, who are dependent on labor or on the assistance of others for support.

Mr. Wilson offered an amendment providing that no person should be entitled to the benefit of the act who is not 64 years of age, or not subject to some physical, mental or pecuniary disability equal to some cause known to the pension laws of the United States.

Both of these amendments were voted down.

The further consideration of the bill went over till to-morrow, and the Senate at 3 40 p. m. went into executive session, and when the doors were reopened adjourned.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

The Republican side of the House, which for the past week has been very nearly deserted, was reinforced this morning by the return of a number of the members who had been absent in Chicago.

Under the call of States a number of bills were introduced and referred.

The House then, at 12 20 o'clock, went into committee of the Whole. Mr. Wellborn of Texas, in the chair, on the River and Harbor Appropriation bill. General debate upon the bill followed, but no action was reached, when the committee rose.

The House then took a recess until 8 o'clock.

STATE NEWS.

Newbern Journal: Rev. Dr. Burkhead left for Trinity College yesterday morning, where he is to deliver the theological address this week.

Mr. James Thomas, son of our townsman, ex-Judge Thomas, arrived from Chapel Hill on Friday evening, and we are pleased to learn brought off the Declaimer's gold medal, and the scholarship gold medal of the Sophomore class.

A. W. Wood, Worshipful Master of St. John's Lodge, No. 3, has received a dispensation from Grand Master Bingham to call the Grand Lodge of A. F. and A. M. together in special session for the purpose of laying the corner stone of the graded school building, which will probably be done while the Wilmington and Goldsboro fire companies are on a visit to this city.

Goldsboro Messenger: The Midland Railroad litigation was settled at Newborn last week by compromise.

Beans from this place sold in New York one day last week for \$4 per box—one bushel and a-half boxes.—Wayne county Normal school opens to-day. Prof. Moses and Noble will have other competent assistants if the attendance will justify.

The Rt. Rev. H. P. Northrop, Bishop of Carolina and Vicar Apostolic of North Carolina, was in the city on Friday and Saturday last. He held service and administered confirmation Saturday morning.

Messrs. R. P. Paddison, president, and S. Otho Wilson, secretary, of the State Fruit Growers Association, were in this city on Thursday, to arrange the premium lists for the approaching State Fruit Fair, to be held in Goldsboro the 30th and 31st of July. They anticipate the most successful Fair ever held in the State.

The Executive Committee of the State Fruit Growers Association have decided to invite Senators Ransom and Vance to be present at the State Fruit Fair. The annual address is to be delivered by Senator Ransom and a lecture for the benefit of the Fruit Growers Association by Senator Vance. We hope both gentlemen will accept.
