## County Convention.

The Democratic County Convention for New Hanover County met at the Court House in this city yesterday afternoon.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. G. J. Boney, Chairman of the County Executive Committee.

On motion of H. A. Bagg, Esq., Mr. H. McL. Green was called to the chair and on motion of Mr. S. H. Fishplate, Mr. R. H. McKoy was appointed Secretary.

The chairman briefly addressed the Convention.

Maj. J. W. Dunham, at the request of the chairman, explained the object of the meeting.

It was moved and seconded that the chairman of the Convention appoint the delegates to the various bodies, and it was further moved by Mr. Fishplate and duly seconded that the names of the chairman and secretary be added to the list.

The secretary read the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we, the representatives of the Democracy of New Hanover county, have witnessed with profound satisfaction the favorable recognition by our brethren in other parts of the State, of the claims of this section upon the consideration of the party, and have seen with pride and gratification the numerous references to our distinguished friend and fellow-townsmen, Maj. Chas. M. Stedman, as a suitable and prominent candidate for the office of Governor, and we desire to tender our cordial appreciation of these friendly manifestations.

Resolved, however, That inasmuch as Maj. Stedman's name will not be before the Convention for that high office—but because our people and our section greatly desire the benefit of his able and useful services in behalf of the State, we do present him for the office of Lieutenant Governor, and our delegates are hereby requested to urge his nomination as fit and worthy to be made, and to use their best endeavors to effect the same.

Resolved, That having undiminished confidence in the ability, patriotism and integrity of the Hon. Alfred M. Waddell, and believing that in his election as the representative of this District in the lower House of the Congress of the United States, the people of the district would secure the services of a representative, who, by reason of his great experience in public affairs, extensive acquaintance with the public men of the country, intimate knowledge of the method of dispatching public business and great abilities, would reflect credit upon the people of the District and State, greatly aid in the purification of the public service and in return to the practices and principles of the Fathers of the Republic, we do most cordially present his claim to the Democratic Convention of this District and urgently request our delegates to the Convention to use all honorable means to secure his nomination.

Maj. J. W. Dunham said: "Mr. Chairman, in behalf of the united Democracy of New Hanover county I beg to second the resolutions."

The resolutions were put to the meeting and unanimously adopted.

H. A. Bagg, Esq., moved that all further matters pertaining to the county be left to the executive committee, to be hereafter chosen, as is customary.

Capt. W. M. Parker moved that the thanks of the Convention are tendered to the outgoing chairman and members of the County Executive Committee for the zeal and fidelity with which they had executed their trust.

Maj. J. W. Dunham, in response to loud calls, addressed the meeting in a short but thrilling speech. At the mention of the name of Grover Cleveland the meeting applauded enthusiastically. He said a compliment to the "Sage of Gramercy"—Samuel J. Tilden—and was confident that with either Cleveland, Thurman or Bayard, the Democracy of the country would come out of the contest with victory perched upon their banner. He referred briefly to State, District and County affairs, and congratulated the gentlemen of the Convention upon a united Democracy.

Other gentlemen were called upon to address the meeting, including Messrs. Strange and Boney, but they did not respond.

On motion of Maj. Dunham, the Convention unanimously endorsed Col. W. L. Saunders for Secretary of State.

On motion of ex-Mayor Fishplate, the meeting adjourned.

**Democratic Convention in Pender.**  
The delegates appointed by the several townships of Pender to attend the Democratic County Convention, assembled at Burgaw at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon. Mr. T. J. Armstrong was called to the Chair and Dr. W. C. Murphy was requested to act as Secretary.

Maj. C. W. McClammy, Chairman of the committee on Resolutions, reported as follows:

We, the Democrats of Pender county, in convention assembled, renew our allegiance to the time honored principles of Democracy, and

Resolved, That we favor a tariff system which will amply support the government economically administered

Resolved, That we believe that the highest educational interests of both races demand that each should be taxed for the education of its children, and we therefore favor a division of the school fund by the General Assembly in direct proportion to the amount of taxes paid by each; the B. Air bill to the contrary notwithstanding.

Resolved, That we hold the Democratic party to be inalienably committed to a "white man's government," and that, under the leadership of its nominees, at the approaching State convention, the irresistible columns of the "Old North State" will respond to the sentiment by giving to the Democratic nominee, at Chicago, her electoral vote, and to all her people the protection of law and the blessing of liberty.

Resolved, That we are convinced, in this era of shameful political corruption, that great principles, without good men to execute them, are vain, and that we request our delegates to the several conventions to spare no effort to secure leaders whose characters are without stain and above reproach.

Mr. A. H. Paddison offered the following, which was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That while we have viewed with satisfaction the course of our Representative, Hon. Wharton J. Green, in the forty-eighth Congress, yet we believe that our own gallant countyman, Maj. C. W. McClammy, by reason of his long, self-sacrificing party services, his splendid abilities, his record as orator, soldier and statesman, is pre-eminently our choice for Congress, and we commend him to the Convention with pleasure and pride.

Upon the adoption of the above resolution, Maj. C. W. McClammy, who was present, requested that it be withdrawn, and it was so ordered. The voice of the people was then for Col. Wharton J. Green, the present incumbent, and he will receive the unqualified support of Pender before the Convention.

Capt. R. P. Paddison introduced the following:

Resolved, That this Convention cordially endorse Maj. C. M. Stedman as its choice for Lieutenant-Governor; and that the delegates to the State Convention be requested to support him for that position.

Maj. C. W. McClammy moved the adoption of the above resolution in a stirring speech, such as he knows so well how to make, and it was adopted unanimously, with three rousing cheers for Maj. C. M. Stedman.

On motion, the Chairman and Secretary of the Convention, were added to the list of delegates to both State and Congressional Conventions.

Adjourned.

After the Convention had adjourned the Executive Committees of the several townships in the county held a joint meeting and elected a County Democratic Executive Committee, of which Mr. John R. Paddison was elected Chairman.
