SENATE.

WASHINGTON, July 1.—Mr. Harrison, from the committee on Military Affairs, reported House bill providing for the establishment of a branch soldier's home west of the Mississippi. It was at once amended by substituting Senate bill for the same purpose already passed, and as so amended was read a third time and passed.

Mr. Cockrell, from the committee on Military Affairs, reported favorably with amendments, House bill relieving from the charge of desertion soldiers who served until the expiration of their term, and are improperly charged with desertion, or who for any other cause are improperly so charged. The bill, after amendment, was passed. As passed it requires that application for the relief provided for shall be made within five years from the passage of this act.

Mr. Logan reported from the committee on Military Affairs, and the Senate, after amendment, read a third time and passed, House bill amending the 72d Article of War. It provides that any general officer, commanding an army, a territorial division or department, or a colonel commanding a separate department, may appoint general courts-martial whenever necessary; but where any such commander is the accuser or prosecutor of any officer under his command, the court shall be appointed by the President.

The joint resolution, introduced yesterday by Mr. Cameron, of Pa., directing the Secretary of the Treasury to redeem \$10,000,000 worth of trade dollars at their face value, was laid before the Senate and referred to the committee on Finance.

Mr. Butler called up his resolution directing an investigation into the condition of New York banks, adding to it a clause authorizing the investigation committee to sit during the recess of Congress. Referred to the committee on Finance.

Consideration of the River and Harbor bill was then resumed. The bill was passed. As originally passed by the House, it appropriated \$12,066,200. The Senate committee added to it \$1,268,000, and the Senate itself has made a further addition of \$230,500; making the amount of the bill as it now stands \$13,564,700.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Mr. Randall submitted a report of the Conference committee on the Naval Appropriation bill, announcing its inability to agree.

The Conference report was agreed to. Mr. Calkins then moved that the House recede from its disagreement to the steel cruisers amendment. Lost—yeas 90, nays 147.

A similar motion in regard to the monitors clause was also lost—yeas 85, nays 139.

The House further insisted on its disagreement and Randall, Holman and Calkins were appointed conferees.

Mr. Townsend, from the committee of Conference on the Post Office Appropriation bill, reported a failure to agree. The only points in controversy are those reducing by five percent the compensation to railroads for mail transportation; reducing to 50 per cent. of this amount the compensation to land grant roads for similar service and increasing from \$4,000,000 to \$4,300,000 the appropriation for railway mail clerks. Mr. Townsend said that it was impossible for the conferees to come to any agreement. The House conferees were willing to make a compromise, but the Senate demanded an unqualified and complete recession on the part of the House.

After further discussion Mr. Horr moved that the House recede from its disagreement to the Senate amendments touching compensation to land grant and other railroads for mail transportation. Agreed to—yeas 116, nays 102.

Mr. Horr moved to recede from the disagreement to the Senate amendment increasing the appropriation for compensation of railway mail clerks, and the motion was agreed to—yeas 123, nays 99. This disposes of the bill as far as the House is concerned.

The House then, at 4 o'clock, went into committee of the Whole. (Mr. Blount, of Ga., in the chair), on the Fortification Appropriation bill.

The clerk proceeded to read the bill by paragraphs.

Mr. Randall raised the point of order against so much of the first paragraph of the majority bill as provides for the construction of new works at deep water harbors of the country, but subsequently withdrew the point and off red the bill reported by the minority of the Committee on Appropriations as a substitute for the majority bill. On a verbal amendment to substitute ut quorum voted, and after a roll call it was agreed that the substitute should be reported to the House and a vote be taken on it tomorrow morning.

The committee then rose and the House adjourned.

Another Poor Man Struck by Fortune.

The man who has a prize in a lottery is regarded as the happiest of mortals. At the last drawing of the Louisiana State Lottery two Memphis men drew \$15,000 each. Mr. B. J. Dorsey, a foreman upon the levees along the Mississippi, has been living in humble circumstances at 33, Jackson st. An *Avalanche* reporter repaired to the corner of Jackson street, and inquired where Dorsey lived. Q. "You mean the man that drew the lottery prize?" A. "Yes." "He's moved away. He used to live in that little house over there, but he's goin' to live in a fine house in Ft. Pickering now."—*Memphis (Tenn.) Avalanche*, June 4.

STATE NEWS.

Charlotte Observer: Farmers report that wheat in the shock is sprouting and is in danger of being ruined. But very few farmers have yet been able to haul their wheat from the fields to the barns and its long exposure to the rains is resulting in the damage named.

Goldsboro Bulletin: We hear the name of J. D. Winslow mentioned in connection with the future management of the Bonitz Hotel; also that of Dr. B. F. Arrington. We regret to hear of the death of Mrs. W. H. Freeman of this place. She died at a hospital in Philadelphia, where she had been for some months past under treatment.

Asheville Citizen: Mr. L. E. Shope, of Long's, tells us that he came across a few days ago, a highland terrapin which he recognized as an old acquaintance. He first found it in 1853, marking that date on the shell. He again found and marked it in 1876 and 1878. He again finds it and turns it loose with the brand of 1884 upon the back. Mr. Shope says in all this period of thirty-one years, there is not the slightest apparent increase in size.

Newbern Journal: L. J. Moore, Esq., having recently purchased a plantation some two or three miles from Newbern, on the Trent road, is having erected one of the handsomest residences in Eastern North Carolina where, when the building is completed, he proposes to permanently reside. In order to be in immediate communication with his law office in this city he will have telephonic communication, and taking a saddle horse can reach town in twenty minutes.

Marion Lamp Post: The picturesque and growing little town of Elk Park, in Mitchell county, is called to evidence the double tragedy of Jim Greer fatally stabbing Mark Winters, and in turn Winters' brother mortally stabs Greer. As we learn Winters and Greer, both unenviable characters, drinking got into a dispute, resulting in Greer using his knife inflicting several dangerous stabs on Winters, from which he died or will die. Winters' brother, learning the fate of his brother Mark, sought hasty revenge and meeting Greer at the hotel as he came out from supper, asked him his name, and on receiving the answer, let in to fearful and determined use of his knife, soon felling his victim to the prostrate condition of his own brother, with no hope of recovery.

Waynesville News: A difficulty occurred yesterday in Crabtree township between two men named William Bryant and Manley Rease, in which the latter came to an untimely death. The two men were tenants on Kiley Ferguson's farm, and Rease had been engaged in plowing an ox, which Bryant charged him of unmercifully abusing and said that the beating of the brute had to be stopped. Rease resented Bryant's determining remark and intimated that he would exercise his own discretion about the matter, and with an interchange of wrangling controversy, they both became enraged and sought vengeance of each other. Rease attacked Bryant with a knife in one hand and a rock in the other, when Bryant raised an axe with which he had been mending a hoe, and let go at his assailant, striking him on the arm, a few inches below the shoulder, dislocating it, the edge of the axe entering the body just above the heart, inflicting a fatal wound. Rease died in a few moments.
