Mr. Wm. H. Vanderbilt, the millionaire, predicts the election of Cleveland. He thinks that the Independents have become so very independent that no politicians could control them, hence he firmly believes that Grover Cleveland will be the next President of the United States.

The Autocrats, a labor organization of Indianapolis, support Cleveland and Hendricks. Four years ago the same organization supported Garfield. The laboring classes are rallying gradually to the support of the laboring man's friends, Cleveland and Hendricks.

Mr. Alexander Sullivan, President of the Irish National League of America, has received in Chicago a cablegram that Thomas E. Sexton and John E. Redmond will come to this country and attend the League Convention at Boston on August 13, as representatives of the Irish parliamentary party. It is the sense of the party that Mr. Parnell should not leave Ireland at the present time.

The railroad is generally regarded as a great civilizer. It may also be looked upon as a great starvation disperser, so it seems to be regarded in India. The British government, on the advice of the committee of the House of Commons, have agreed to loan the Indian government \$140,000,000, for the purpose of making extensions of their railway system. Fire at Magnolia.
We are sorry to hear, as we do through a special telegram to the DAILY REVIEW, that the thriving town of Magnolia has been again visited by a disastrous fire. Between 3 and 4 o'clock this morning flames were discovered issuing from the store of Messrs. Scott & Matthews. The fire spread rapidly until the stores of Messrs. S. M. Beaseley and C. W. Hoilingsworth were consumed, together with that of Messrs. Scott & Matthews. By hard work on the part of the citizens, the destruction was confined to these establishments, although several other buildings made a narrow escape. There is no report as to the origin of the fire.

Politics in the East.
Wade Harriss, while in this section last week, took a few notes on the political situation and here is what he found it to be, as reported by him in the *Charlotte Observer*:
During a recent visit to New Hanover and Brunswick counties, an *Observer* representative felt the political pulse of that section and found it to be at fever heat. The interest being manifested in the probable result of the coming nomination of this Congressional district, is something surprising. There is great opposition to the nomination of Judge Bennett and Mr. Waddell is in high favor. Prominent Democrats openly avow that though they will support the nominee, danger of defeat will come if Bennett is nominated. In Robeson county the feeling is strongly in favor of Rowland and his friends are working hard. The interest manifested in the eastern counties over the coming nomination is in strong contrast to the indifference manifested in the western section of the district. Waddell will come before the convention with a strong backing and his friends are hopeful. If they see that there is no chance to secure his nomination, the probabilities are that they will throw their influence in favor of Rowland. They are warm, and unless Bennett is nominated on the first ballot, there will be some lively times during the subsequent proceedings.
