The bright sunsets have reappeared at Berlin.

Rev. P. J. Ryan, the newly-appointed Roman Catholic Archbishop of Philadelphia, will be welcomed to that city by a monster torchlight parade.

The nomination of Col. Alfred Rowland, of Robeson, as Presidential elector, will meet with a warm endorsement all over the district. He is a true man, tried as well as true, and will do his full duty during the campaign.

No, gentlemen. We don't propose to eat any crow this year. A distinguished Republican in this city tells us that it has a very nasty taste, and he ought to know, for he has eaten lots of it. We may vote for a man but we won't lie for him.

Speaker Carlisle, who was in Cincinnati last week, said he was entirely satisfied with the Democratic ticket; he regards it as a very strong one, and is confident of its election. In addition to the Southern States, Mr. Carlisle is confident the Democrats will carry New York, Connecticut, New Jersey and Indiana, and possibly Iowa, Massachusetts and Wisconsin.

The action of the Congressional Convention at Lumberton yesterday was not by any means in accordance with the wishes and desires of the Democrats of this section; yet it was the legitimate action of the representatives of the people, and as such must be accepted. Mr. Bennett is the nominee of the party and as such is entitled to the support of the voters of that party. That is all we have to say on the subject to-day.

Congressional Convention.
 The Democrats of the Sixth Congressional District met in Convention yesterday at Lumberton and the result of their deliberations was announced in yesterday's issue of the REVIEW.

At 12 o'clock the Convention was called to order by Chairman V. V. Richardson and on his motion Mr. D. S. Cowan, of Columbus county, was called to the chair, with T. S. Ashe, Secretary.

Mr. Cowan in a few graceful remarks thanked the Convention and declared that the meeting was ready for business.

Col. F. W. Kerchner nominated Mr. S. F. McDaniel for Secretary.

On motion of Capt. P. B. Means, the roll was called, and the usual committees were appointed.

The committee on Credentials reported that every county was represented and that there was no contest whatever. The committee on Organization reported H. C. Wall, of Richmond, Chairman, and T. S. Ashe and H. McL. Green Secretaries. C. D. Myers and J. D. Shaw were appointed a committee to sent the Chairman.

The Chairman then addressed the Convention.

Mr. R. P. Waring, of Mecklenburg, moved that the majority rule govern the Convention. His motion was seconded by Mr. J. A. Lockhart, of Anson.

On motion of Mr. Pemberton, of Stanly county, the roll was called on this motion, resulting in 261 for the majority rule, and 59 for the two-thirds.

Mr. Platt D. Walker spoke to the question of expressing the voice of the Convention before proceeding to vote on the nominations. He asked the Convention to hear the chairman of the committee on Resolutions.

This motion was adopted. The resolutions cordially approve the nominations and platforms of the Conventions at Chicago and Raleigh. Report adopted. Capt. W. S. Norment moved that the roll be called and nominations be made as called.

Capt. P. B. Means moved it be laid on the table. The Chair decided that the motion to lay on table prevailed.

Mr. J. T. Le Grand, of Richmond, placed in nomination R. T. Bennett of Anson.

Mr. Covington, of Union, seconded the nomination.

Mr. Ross Robinson, of Charlotte, addressed the Convention in some very appropriate remarks, and in the name of A. M. Waddell, asked that R. T. Bennett be nominated by acclamation.

Capt. Paul B. Means moved that the roll be called and make a lasting verdict that Mr. Bennett was voted for and nominated by the unanimous vote of every county in the District. There was some discussion, but finally the nomination was made by acclamation.

On motion, a committee consisting of Messrs. W. L. Steele, P. D. Walker, S. H. Fishplate, W. N. Bennett and W. S. Norment was appointed to inform Col. Bennett of his nomination, and to invite him and Col. Waddell and Mr. Rowland to address the Convention.

On motion of Mr. P. D. Walker the Convention proceeded to the election of the Executive Committee and an Elector for the District, as follows:
 Elector—Alfred Rowland, of Robeson.
 Executive Committee—P. B. Means, Cabarrus, Chairman; J. A. Lockhart-Anson; W. G. Curtis, Brunswick; V. V. Richardson, Columbus; E. K. P. Osborne, Mecklenburg; G. J. Boney, New Hanover; T. D. McAuley, Union; S. J. Pemberton, Stanly; J. T. Le Grand, Richmond; J. A. McAllister, Robeson.

At the afternoon session resolutions were adopted thanking the people of Lumberton and officials of the Carolina Central Railroad for courtesies extended to delegates.

Mr. P. D. Walker introduced Mr. Alfred Rowland, who addressed the Convention. He said that Robeson has started a pea patch to feed the mule of York. The Convention gave three cheers for Rowland, and after speeches by Col. Bennett and Col. Waddell adjourned.

Merely a Ripple.
 There was a ripple of excitement this morning at the foot of Market street. A dray loaded with seven trunks was coming around Koch's corner when in consequence of the loss of a nut one of the wheels came off. This threw the driver to the ground and one of the trunks falling forward on the horse he started to run. The driver held to one line and the horse made for a saloon on the South side of Market street but before he could pass the door the dray struck a post and freed the horse who dashed on up street and was soon recaptured. That is all.

The Clinton Democrats.
 In pursuance of the adjournment of a previous meeting the Democrats of Clinton township, Sampson county, assembled in the Court House on Friday evening, July 25th, for the purpose of completing the organization of a Cleveland, Scales and Green club. The attendance was large and almost every man present had his name enrolled as a member of the club.

After finishing the order of business the chair introduced as the speaker who had been invited to address the club at this meeting, E. T. Boykin, Esq., of Clinton. Mr. Boykin opened his speech by offering for adoption by the club the following, which he made the basis of a ringing ratification speech, and of a sound and solid discussion of the political issues now pending for decision before the American people—

Resolved, That we, the Democrats of Sampson county, in mass-meeting assembled, cordially endorse and ratify the nominations of Cleveland and Hendricks, the Democratic candidates for the Presidency and Vice Presidency; of Scales, Stedman, Saunders, Bain, Davidson, Roberts, Finger, and Merrimon, the Democratic candidates for the various State offices; and of W. J. Green, the Democratic nominee for Congress from the Third Congressional District, and pledge them our earnest, zealous and undivided support in the approaching political contest.

At the end of Mr. Boykin's speech the foregoing resolution was unanimously adopted, and was ordered to be spread upon the minutes of the Club. Upon motion of Mr. J. R. Beaman, Sr., the Secretary was ordered to send copies of the resolution to the Clinton, Wilmington, Goldsboro, and Fayetteville papers, with the request that it be published.

John M. Allen, the Democratic candidate for Congress in the First District of Mississippi, entered the Confederate army at the age of 14, and carried a musket for four years.

The Bartholdi pedestal committee, of which William M. Everts is president, announces that the ceremonies of laying the corner-stone of the pedestal on Bedloe's Island will take place on August 5.

It is stated that the fund of \$250,000 raised by George Jones for the benefit of Gen. Grant was placed in trust with E. D. Morgan, who invested it in Wabash securities and guaranteed 8 per cent interest for eight years, and that his estate is now being charged to make good the guaranty.

Mrs. A. T. Stewart, now summering at the Grand Union in Saratoga, has the habit of going to the hotel store-room every Saturday to be weighed, and as she always gives the storekeeper \$5 for this service he is one of the few men who believe in letting a woman have her weigh.

Capt. Sir George Nares, who commanded the Alert discovery expedition, is reported as expressing the hope that England will not be content with the second place in Arctic exploration. He says: "I shall be ready to try to carry the Union Jack further North than the Stars and Stripes whenever I am wanted."

The board of estimate and apportionment of New York city has authorized the comptroller to issue bonds for \$1,000,000, at interest not to exceed 3 per cent, for the purpose of purchasing lands and erecting and furnishing school houses. The Legislature, at its last session, appropriated \$2,000,000 for the purpose, but the board thought \$1,000,000 was as much as could be judiciously expended.
