Maine is receiving a good deal of attention from our citizens and there is much speculation going on as to the result of the election in that State today.

Tammany is all right and will surely support the ticket with a heartiness that must add much to its already assured success. We asserted a month ago that John Kelly would be forced to yield.

Commander Schley's report of the Greeley relief expedition covers three hundred pages of manuscript, and will be illustrated by over two hundred photographic views. The use of photographs in official reports is a novelty, but Commander Schley said he did not want to neglect anything that could make the report clearer or more complete.

In the great English campaign of the "Fifties" a Chinese dignitary was captured and brought before the English commander after the assault on Ha Koo. With great dignity the Celestial remarked, (referring to the supposed 350,000,000 inhabitants of the Chinese Empire:) "Should the Chinamen rise and spit they would drown you English." The trouble is Chinamen do not "spit."

The publication of Mrs. Morrill's reply to the Ohio Republicans who write to request Senator Morrill (dead a year ago last January) to make some campaign speeches in that State, has fallen like an avalanche of snow on a summer landscape. The G. O. P. claim that it was a forgery but the Herald has interviewed Mrs. Morrill and the "forgery" has been repeated and added to. If this thing had come to light a week ago it might actually have reversed the Republican majority in Maine but, as it is, it will have a tremendous influence elsewhere.

The state election in Maine occurs today when governor, four representatives in Congress' legislature and county officers will be chosen, and a proposed prohibitory amendment to the constitution of the State will be voted upon by the people. For governor there are five regularly nominated candidates in the field as follows: Frederick Robie, republican, the present incumbent; John B. Redman, democrat; Hosea B. Eaton, greenbacker; William F. Eaton, straight greenbacker, and William T. Eustis, prohibitionist. The present representatives in congress are all republicans, and have all been renominated. The several candidates to be voted for are:

3. Seth L. Milliken... Daniel H. Thng.

The greenbackers have nominated Samuel Jewell in the first district and Wilder W. Perry in the second district. The State has been redistricted since the last election of Congressmen. At the election for Governor in 1882 the Republican pluralities were as follows: First district, 967; Second, 1,907; Third, 2,903; Fourth, 2,961. The vote of the State in recent years has been as follows:

There were 752 scattering votes in 1882, 545 for Governor, and 235 for the proposed amendment to the constitution of the State to be voted upon to-day provides:

"The manufacture of intoxicating liquors, not including cider, and the sale and keeping for sale of intoxicating liquors, are and shall be forever prohibited. Except, however, that the sale and keeping for sale such liquors for medicinal and mechanical purposes and the arts, and the sale and keeping for sale of cider, may be permitted under such regulations as the Legislature shall provide. The Legislature shall enact laws with suitable penalties for the suppression of the manufacture, sale and keeping for sale of intoxicating liquors, with the exceptions herein specified."
