The receipts of cotton at this port for the week ending with to-day foot up 9,557 bales, as compared with 8,606 bales for the corresponding week of last year, an increase this week of 951 bales. The receipts of the crop year to date foot up 32,483 bales, as against 29,924 bales to corresponding date of last year an increase this year of 2,565 bales.

**Hon. R. T. Bennett.**  
There was an enthusiastic demonstration of the Democracy of the city last night to greet and bid cordial welcome to Hon. R. T. Bennett, the Democratic candidate for Congress from this Congressional District. Judge Bennett spoke at Macumber's Store, in Harbortownship, yesterday to a large and enthusiastic audience, returning to this city in season to speak last night. The torchlight procession which escorted him to the stand, conducted by Mr. DuBrutz Cutlar, and preceded by the Cornet Concert Club, moved down Front street to the Parcel House, where it was joined by the speaker and the committee of escort, when it again took up its line of march to the speaker's stand, at the intersection of Dock and Third streets. The stand was tastefully decorated with American flags and banners bearing the inscription of "Cleveland and Hendricks." It was also beautified by an exquisite bouquet presented to Judge Bennett by the ladies of Wilmington.

After an inspiring piece of music by the Concert Club, Col. John D. Taylor appeared and introduced the speaker to the waiting and expectant throng, in a neat, graceful and appropriate speech. After another piece by the band, Col. Bennett came forward and made an eloquent, patriotic and able speech, such as has been seldom heard in Wilmington. He spoke for an hour and a half to an audience of willing, delighted and interested listeners, during which he arraigned the Republican party for its many misdeeds for the last twenty-four years and in such a bill of indictment as has seldom been drawn. It was a masterly effort, which made the speaker many warm and admiring friends and will be productive of much and decided good.

Yesterday's Herald publishes two articles from Ohio, one signed by Gov. Hoadly and the other by Senator Thurman. The former simply says that the Republican majority is about 10,000 and that it is now certain that the Democratic Congressmen have been elected to 10 for the Republicans. Mr. Thurman's dispatch is as follows:  
COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 16, 1884.—The Republican Journal this morning claims 12,000 plurality. At Democratic headquarters they concede 9,000. It will probably be between 10,000 and 11,000. The Democrats have elected eleven Congressmen, a majority of the delegation. Hurd is defeated by about 300.  
The coalition of the Prohibitionists with the Republicans and the return of the Germans to the Republicans, with the Democratic organization in Hamilton county, explains the defeat. The Democrats, though, are not disheartened, and will keep up the fight to the end.
