A FAIR PROTECTIVE TARIFF.

The National Democratic Platform Indorsed by Grover Cleveland.

We believe that LABOR is best rewarded where it is freest and most enlightened. It should therefore be fostered and cherished.

The Democratic party insists that it is the duty of this Government to PROTECT with equal fidelity and vigilance the rights of its citizens, native and naturalized, at home and abroad.

We demand in behalf of the Democracy freedom for AMERICAN LABOR by reducing taxes to the end that these United States may compete with unhindered powers for the primary among nations in all the arts of peace and fruits of liberty.

The great issue of reform and change in administration is submitted to the people in calm confidence that the popular voice will pronounce in favor of new men and new and more favorable conditions for the growth of industry, the extension of trade, the employment and due reward of labor and of capital and the general welfare of the whole country.

In making reduction in taxes it is not proposed to injure any DOMESTIC INDUSTRIES, but rather to PROMOTE THEIR HEALTHY GROWTH. From the foundation of this Government taxes collected at the Custom House have been the chief source of Federal revenue. Such they must continue to be. Moreover, many industries have come to rely upon legislature for successful continuance so that any change of law must be at every step careful of the labor and capital thus involved; the process of reform must be subject in the execution to this plain dictate of justice. All taxation shall be limited to the requirements of economical government. The necessary reduction in taxation can and must be effected WITHOUT DEPRIVING AMERICAN LABOR OF THE ABILITY TO COMPETE SUCCESSFULLY WITH FOREIGN LABOR, AND WITHOUT IMPOSING LOWER RATES OF DUTY THAN WILL BE AMPLE TO COVER ANY INCREASED COST OF PRODUCTION WHICH MAY EXIST IN CONSEQUENCE OF THE HIGHER RATE OF WAGES PREVAILING IN THIS COUNTRY.

Nothing, says the Herald, has given Tammany Hall so much trouble in recent years as the suspicion, which ripened finally into a direct charge, that the Tammany leaders "sold out" General Hancock in 1880, and by a secret arrangement with the Republicans in that year gave the State by a small majority to Garfield.

The Tammany leaders and their organ, the Star, bitterly resented this charge of treachery to the Democratic party, and many columns of figures were published to show that it was unfounded. They felt that they could not lie quietly under the odium of a charge of treachery to the democratic party of which they have always most vigorously claimed to be an important part;

and they were right. Such treason to its party, proved against the organization, would disgrace and ruin it.

The Tammany leaders ought to understand that this year a very serious responsibility rests upon them. In 1880 party lines were very strictly drawn. There was no Republican defection; the Republicans polled their full party vote, and yet Garfield carried the State by a small plurality of only 21,033, in a total poll of 1,104,605. There is now a Republican defection in this State of such great dimensions that if the whole Democratic vote of this city is cast for Cleveland and Hendricks the Democrats will carry the State by a very large majority. This is so sure that it were not for the uncertainty which rests upon the city Democratic vote, no one, either Republican or Democrat, would to-day have the least doubt about who will carry this State on the 4th of November. There is no Democratic defection anywhere in the State outside of this city. The Butler movement is now everywhere understood to be only a Blaine diversion, and election day will show that voters who have trifled with Butler will vote for Blaine direct or go back to Cleveland, because they understand that a vote for Butler is a vote lost.

The news which comes to us from Eastern and Western States is of such a character and gives such assurances that we do not believe the loss of New York would bring the defeat of the Democratic ticket. Cleveland and Hendricks can, we believe, succeed without New York. But that does not alter the responsibility of the Tammany leaders in this election. If the Tammany voters, whatever they may do in regard to the city ticket, are loyal and faithful to their Presidential ticket Tammany will share in the triumph of victory. If the vote shows that there has been in this city a heavy Democratic defection, the Tammany leaders will be held responsible for it, and they will go down in a disgrace as bitter as that which overtook Tweed and his fellow managers of the Tammany of those days.

It is understood, of course, that Tammany's chief object is to secure control of the city. The resolutions, the banners, the speeches at the meeting last night did not disguise this. What is needed for the whole country is the defeat of Blaine and the gang of evil-doers who surround him, and the election of an upright and worthy man to the Presidency. All other interests are, we believe, insignificant beside this. Hence, whatever Tammany may do in local matters, we warn it to be loyal and faithful to the Democratic Presidential ticket. That is what the party, of which the organization claims to be a part, has a right to expect and demand of it; and if Tammany should prove faithless in this regard it will incur odium and challenge punishment which will be fatal to it.

The New York World sees the Ohio election as we saw it and as expressed by us yesterday. It is not "too sanguine" to say now, with the full results before us, that the election in Ohio was far more of a victory for the Democrats than for the Republicans. The World comments upon the returns as follows, in a double-headed editorial:

Truth will out. Even Associated Press lies vanish before official figures. According to the latest reports the elections of last week show the following extraordinary results:

1. The Republican plurality in Ohio is reduced to about half what it was four years ago.

2. The Republican majority on the State ticket is less than nothing. The Republicans are actually in a minority, while four years ago they had a positive majority of over 9,000 over Democrats. Greenbackers and Prohibitionists combined.

3. The Republicans are not only in a minority in the popular vote of Ohio, but they elect a minority of the Congressional delegation. Four years ago they elected 15 Republicans to Congress. This year they only elect 10. Four years ago the Democrats elected only 5 Representatives; this year they elect 11—a majority of the delegation.

4. The increase in the vote of Ohio over that of four years ago is 66,000. The Democrats cast 39,000 votes more than they cast for Hancock, while the Republicans, in spite of Blaine, Dudley and Corruption, cast only 16,000 more than they cast for Garfield. In other words, nearly two-thirds of the new vote since 1880 went Democratic, while a large part of the Republican one-third was unquestionably obtained by fraud and wholesale bribery in the large cities.

5. In West Virginia the Democrats have an absolute majority, over the Republicans and Greenbackers combined, nearly three times as large as Hancock's majority of 1880. They swept every Congressional district in the State, gaining one now held by a Republican.

It is this, a "victory" the Republicans are welcome to it. These figures show clearly that Blaine is much weaker than Garfield; that the popular tide is against him in spite of all he does; that he is doomed to defeat, and that if the Democrats could gain 40,000 votes in Garfield's Republican State over those cast for Hancock, they should and will gain at least 100,000 in Democratic New York, where nearly the whole respectable press, as well as the Stalwarts, Germans and Prohibitionists, are in open rebellion against corrupt Star-routism and Republicanism.

Quarantine Notice.

QUARANTINE FOR THE PORT OF WILMINGTON will be enforced from May 1st to November 1st, as follows: Pilots will bring all vessels from Ports south of Cape Fear to the Quarantine anchorage; also, all vessels which have had any kind of sickness on board during the passage or on arrival, and will cause a signal to be set in the main rigging on the port side, as soon as possible after crossing the Bar. No vessel must leave the Quarantine anchorage, or allow any person, steamer or tug boat, lighter, or boat of any kind to go along-side, unless by written authority from the Quarantine Physician; and every vessel must be anchored as far to the eastward of the channel as is consistent with safety. Regulations governing vessels while in Quarantine may be had on application at the office of the Quarantine Physician at Smithville. Applications for permits to visit vessels in Quarantine must be made to Dr. Thomas F. Wood or Dr. Geo. G. Thomas, and permits not obtained will be end result by the Quarantine Physician, if, in his opinion, it is proper and safe to allow communication with such vessels.
