German barque *Marianne*, Bradbering, cleared for Hamburg to-day with 650 casks spirits turpentine and 2,820 barrels rosin, valued at \$11,898.49, shipped by Messrs. E. G. Barker & Co.

The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Wilmington & Weldon R. R. Co., and the Wilmington, Columbia and Augusta R. R. Co., will be held in this city on the 15th inst.

We were glad to see Mr. N. Jacobi on our streets to-day, after having been confined to his house by sickness for the last two weeks. He is yet quite feeble, but is gaining strength as fast as could reasonably be expected.

His Honor Mayor Hall, has issued his proclamation closing all barrooms in the city between 6 o'clock this afternoon and the same hour Wednesday morning. It is a serious offense to violate this proclamation, under the laws of North Carolina, and we hope that it will be faithfully respected.

Statesville Landmark: The long, long drought was broken last night by a heavy rain. The weather has been threatening for some days.

Wilson Mirror: We learn from a Georgia paper that Col. Curran Battle, a native of Nash county but for a number of years a resident of that State, met death the other day under the most terrible circumstances. He was trying to fix some part of the gin when his arm was caught in the saws and so badly lacerated that he died from the effects. The Colonel was about 70 years old, and the paper from which we glean this sad news, speaks of his character in terms of highest praise, and dwells with eloquent emphasis upon that open-handed liberality and noble charity which won the friendship of every poor man in that section. Peace to his ashes.

Beaufort Telephone: On Thursday night of last week about 9 o'clock, a tenant house on the farm of Dr. Geo. N. Ennett, in this county, was discovered to be on fire and in a short time was burned to the ground. The woman of the house had just gone to Dr. Ennett's residence to get some medicine for a sick child and left two children in the house, both of whom were burned to death and their bodies almost entirely destroyed. The work is supposed to have been that of a fiendish incendiary, though the motive we cannot divine, but if so we trust he may be caught and receive the merited punishment which such a horrible crime deserves.

Hickory Press: In the Federal Court at Statesville last week, Jas. Bollinger was found guilty of passing counterfeit money, and sentenced to two years in the Albany penitentiary. Vance Hallman was convicted on the same charge but judgment was suspended until next term of Court.—Mr. T. C. Land, who went from Wilkes county to the State of Oregon in 1870, spent yesterday in Hickory on his return to the "Old North State." The vicinity in

which he lives is mainly settled by North Carolinians. He was induced to locate there by the late venerable Joseph Lane, a native of Buncombe county, who was a general in the Mexican war, and who ran for Vice President on the Democratic ticket headed by John C. Breckenridge. Mr. Land tells us that while Oregon is a Republican State, the Democrats are sanguine of success at the approaching election next Tuesday. The party, he says, was never better organized in the State in conversation with different gentlemen while passing through Indiana. He was convinced that the "Hoosier State" would roll up a handsome majority for Cleveland and Hendricks.

Asheville Citizen: Capt. Johnston has returned from his canvass of the district, in the very best of spirits. Says that the cause of Democracy was never brighter in the West, than our friends in every county aroused, and an unusually large vote will be polled.—On Thursday while the Citizen corps were enjoying a kindly remembrance sent to the office by Rev. Dr. and Mrs. Chapman, news came that the venerable man of God had passed away. Dr. Chapman had been a sufferer for months; but on Thursday felt better and was sitting up. About four in the evening while in his chair reading the North Carolina Presbyterian, he was suddenly attacked, and at once removed to his bed, breathing his last as he reached it. Dr. Chapman was about 79 years of age. Was the son of Rev. R. H. Chapman, second President of the University of North Carolina.—First married Miss Chunn, of this place, sister to Col. A. B. Chunn, and immediately afterward located in Talladega, Alabama, and entered upon the practice of the law, in which he established for himself a fine reputation, lacking but one vote on one occasion of being chosen a Judge of the Superior Court. He entered the ministry in 1835, in Alabama; in 1854 came to Asheville to live, became pastor of the Presbyterian church and so continued for eight years. In the meantime Mrs. Chapman died. Dr. Chapman since served churches in Henderson, Charlotte and Goldsboro. In 1863 he married Miss Moore, of Wilmington, who now survives him.
