Miss Calhoun, the American actress, has signed a contract to be leading lady of the Haymarket Theatre, in London.

The grand jury at Washington found indictments against Col. Burnside, late disbursing officer of the Postoffice Department, charging him with embezzling \$54,000.

Mrs. John Jacob Astor and Mrs. Catherine Wolfe are co-operating in an effort for the establishment of a college in Florence where American women can pursue any branch of art.

President Arthur was invited to attend the Blaine banquet on Wednesday evening. He declined, remarking in effect that he had attended one "soap" dinner, which was enough in a lifetime.

In the Russian district of Peltowa it is proposed to change the designation of every place in which there is no town hall into villages, the ultimate object being to expel the Jews, which can be done in villages but not in towns.

Mr. Gladstone attended a spiritualist seance the other night and at the close of what is called the locked state test said "bravo." He declared that forces exist of which we know very little, and he deprecated, it is said, the attitude of scientific men toward the medium's phenomena.

The coinage executed at the United States mint in Philadelphia during October amounted to 4,476,505 pieces, valued at \$1,451,000. This amount was made up of 1,300,000 silver dollars 501,505 dimes, 87,000 five cent pieces and 1,805,000 cents.

A prominent member of the Tennessee bar was arrested the other day in one of the cities of the Western portion of the State. He came in such questionable shape in the carelessness of his attire that he was taken for a tramp by one of the local conservators of the peace.

A New York letter says: "The new anesthetic which was accidentally discovered a short time since by Dr. Koller, of Vienna, has just been successfully tested in a case of double over-mature cataract, at Mount Sinai Hospital in this city. The patient, a woman of fifty, was placed upon the operating chair, and a few drops of solution were put into the eye. This was repeated three times at intervals of five minutes. The operation was completed without causing the patient, who was conscious throughout, any pain. Since that time other operations upon the eye and the mucous cavities of the nose, throat, &c., have been performed in a painless manner."

The receipts of cotton at this port to-day foot up 692 bales.

We are having another cold wave, which will probably last until Sunday.

We are beginning to feel the effects of dry weather again and rain is needed.

Paddison, chairman of the Pender County Democratic Executive Committee, has furnished us with the following official vote of that county: Cleveland, 1,207; Blaine, 1,246; Scales, 1,215; York, 1,240; Stedman, 1,213; Faircloth, 1,242; Merrimon, 1,197; Russell, 1,251; Green, 1,209; Brogden, 1,226; Bland, (Dem. for Legislature,) 1,219; Lloyd, (col. Rep. for legislature,) 1,188. For Sheriff, Ward, (Dem.) 1,422; Johnson, (Ind.) 994. For Register of Deeds, Killyaw, (Dem.) 1,197; Taylor, (Rep.) 1,260. For Coroner, Sanders, (Dem.) 1,181; Costin, (Rep.) 1,241. Surveyor, Moore, (Dem.) 1,182; Taylor, (Rep.) 1,235. This shows a Democratic gain in the county since the last election of 175 votes.
