city, will illuminate their houses in
honor of the GREAT VICTORY achieved,
and especially along the line of march.

Death of Capt. Robinson.

It is with sincere sadness that we
are called upon to chronicle the death
of Capt. Frederick G. Robinson, which
occurred last evening at his late resi-
dence on Fifth street, between Princess
and Chestnut, aged 41 years. Captain
Robinson was a native of Bennington,
Vermont, but came to this city quite
early in life and has made this his abid-
ing place ever since. He married here
and his wife with three children survive
him. These, with his brother, Mr.
Charles H. Robinson, of the firm of
Robinson & King, and his cousin, Dr.
N. Robinson, with whom the deceased
was associated in business at the time
of his death, constituted all of his near
relatives in this city, although he has a
number of kindred in Bladen and
Cumberland counties. Capt. Robin-
son entered the Confederate service as
a private at the breaking out of the war
and did a soldier's duty most gallantly
and devotedly until the surrender at Ap-
pomattox. He has always taken a
lively interest in the welfare of the fire
department of the city, of which he
was for a number of years an active
and efficient member, having been the
foreman of Wilmington Steam Fire
Engine Company No. 1, and also for one
term Chief Engineer of the City
Fire Department. In all the affairs of
life Capt. Robinson was an honorable,
honest, upright and pleasant gentleman,
whose many friends will deeply mourn
his loss while offering sincere con-
dolence and sympathy to his afflicted
family in this their great bereavement.

Registration and Vote.

At the time of the recent election
there were 7,765 duly registered voters
in New Hanover county, as shown by
the several registration books. The
total vote polled in the county for Gov-
ernor amounted to 4,630, or 135 votes
less than the number of voters regis-
tered. We take the vote for Governor
for the reason that it was the largest
vote polled, the total vote for the lower
house of the Legislature being only
3,174, or 1,591 less than the number
registered. The vote for Governor
may be called a very full vote, for there
were many causes which tended to
keep men from the polls. After the
registration is completed every change
must necessarily be to lessen the num-
ber of votes. Sickness, death, absence
from the city on important duty and
removals are constantly going on, and
in a city containing so large a number
of registered voters, the change must be
considerable, so it is perfectly evident
that very near the voting strength of
the city and county were polled.

Cotton.

The receipts of cotton at this port
for the week ending with to-day foot
up 4,959 bales as against 3,718 bales
for the corresponding week of last year
an increase this year of 1,241 bales.
The receipts of the crop year to date
foot up 56,249 bales, against 52,103
bales to November 17th last year, an
increase this year of 4,146 bales.
