Raleigh Chronicle: The gin-house and press of Mr. G. B. Alford at Holy Springs were burned this morning about 4 o'clock. Two bales of cotton were totally consumed and two more burnt so as to be of little or no value. There was a large quantity of seed cotton destroyed—perhaps 30 bales. Mr. Alford's gin was new, he having bought it only a fortnight ago from Messrs. M. T. Leach & Co. of this city. The property was insured.
