Home-Democrat. As one of "the little, mean hearted fellows" referred to above we do not think it amiss to make "a few remarks" on the subject. Imprimus, then, we think that Mr. Yates (to whose pen we have seen the above article credited) is lacking somewhat in editorial courte. sy, or, rather, that he does not seem to improve much in the amenities of editoral life as he grows older. It would be hard, we think, to convince our brothren of the press in this State that to differ with Mr. Yates on any subject is a sign of either "meanness," or "littleness." On the contrary, some

might be inclined to use very different words in that connection. We will not discuss here the merits of the question as regards Holden's disabilities. Our position in that respect is well-known. They were justly imposed, after a fair and impartial trial. But even that is not the point now in view, 'Mr. Yates and a few other editors in the State are urging moval of Mr. Holden's disabilities and as sure as the sun shines severely. This means that the Constitution makes treason against the State an unpardonable sin and as there is no power in the judiciary or the Legislature to revise or review or remit the findings of a court of impeachment so there is absolutely no power whatever to

It is a fact that a great many people in North Carolina are under the impression that Holden was convicted by the Legislature. Not at all. The charges against him, that is, the articles of impeachment, were presented by a committee from the House at the bar of the Senate, and the trial was conducted before the Senate, sitting as a judicial body, and presided over by the Chief Justice of the State. The prosecution was made by a board of man agers from the House, and Holden was defended by his own counsel. To secure conviction a vote of two thirds of the Senate was required and secured. The House did not vote on the question at all, except as to presenting the articles of inpeachment, and the Senate voted only as a judicial body and not as a part of the legislative machinery of the State.
