IN CONGRESS YESTERDAY.

SENATE.
WASHINGTON, December 22.—The Chair laid before the Senate a message from the President, transmitting a supplementary report of the Gun Foundry Board. Referred to the committee on Military Affairs.
Several petitions, numerous signed, were presented, remonstrating against the ratification of the Spanish treaty.

There was so little Monday business to be transacted that by quarter-past 12 o'clock the Senate had disposed of all that was offered and proceeded to its calendar of cases not objected to, which are subjected to the five-minute limitation in debate.
Private pension bills that had already passed the House were taken up and a number of them passed.

Mr. Blair called up the bill providing for a commissioner to examine into the liquor traffic. He said it was a bill already passed four times by the Senate but not acted on by the House. The motion was opposed, but the bill was ordered to be taken up and was passed—yeas 24, nays 16. Before voting, Mr. Vest (who opposed the bill) remarked that he did not propose to be placed by his vote in an attitude of hostility to temperance; but he regarded the subject matter of the bill as one belonging exclusively to the States, and there was no evidence that States Governments were not entirely competent to deal with it. The vote in detail was as follows:

Nays—Bayard, Beck, Butler, Cockrell, Gibson, Hampton, Harris, Jones, Jones, of Fla., Maxey, Morgan, Pugh, Slater, Vest, Voorhees and Walker—16.

Mr. Hale, from the committee on Appropriations, reported with amendments, the House bill making temporary provisions for the naval service—the thirty-one day bill.
Mr. Hale explained that the Senate committee had amended that bill by substituting for it provisions of the regular annual appropriation bill for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1885, precisely as the House had passed it at the last session, but modified so as to cover only the remaining half of the fiscal year, the amendments formerly inserted by the Senate relating to iron clads and steel cruisers being stricken out. The bill, he said, so far as the amendments went, stood precisely on the basis on which the House had passed the original appropriation for the year. In that, Mr. Hale added, the Senate maintained its attitude of considering this year's propositions and not those of the former year. He said he would call the bill up to-morrow morning.

The Senate then went into executive session, and when the doors were reopened, adjourned till to-morrow.

County Commissioners.

The Board met in adjourned session yesterday afternoon.
J. W. Perdue, having received a majority of all the votes cast, was declared duly elected Standard-Keeper of the county for the ensuing two years.
The contract for furnishing medicine to the out door poor was awarded to James W. Conoley, at 13 cents per prescription: being the lowest bid for the ensuing two years.

The contract as Superintendent of the County Poor House and House of Correction was awarded to John H. Savage for 22 1/2 cents per head, per day, for the ensuing two years, his being the lowest bid.

The contract for furnishing coffins for the county poor and burial of the same, was awarded to John S. Gibson at \$1.20 per coffin and \$1.40 for burial of the same (total \$2.60) for the ensuing two years.

It was ordered that the county tax on the skating rink to be opened by Chas. E. Wilson be reduced to \$10.

Justice J. C. Mills submitted his annual report of fines and forfeitures, amounting to \$15, which was received, ordered entered upon the record of official reports and filed.

It was ordered that Wm. Solomon and J. H. Hankins be relieved from the payment of poll tax on account of physical disability.

It was ordered that Henry Mumford be exempt from paying poll tax for the year 1884, he being over age.

It was ordered that the account rendered by B. F. Hall, Clayton Giles and Donald McRae, committee on the State Exposition, for \$36.43, be allowed, and the payment of the same was ordered.

Dr. F. W. Potter was elected County Superintendent of Health for the county of New Hanover for the ensuing two years, commencing January 1st, 1885.

The Board adjourned, subject to the call of the Chairman.
