By the Queen's command a large and handsome chair of polished granite has been placed by the side of a private road at Balmoral as a memorial of the late Duke of Albany. That road was one of his favorite walks.

The lovely Miss Mionehaha, White Cloud's amiable and accomplished daughter, is stopping in Chicago, and has expressed a desire to marry a white man. While in St. Louis four aspirants appeared for the honor of her hand, but her heart was not touched, and it is entirely free to open negotiations in Chicago.

Michael H. Simpson, a Boston millionaire, aged 75, died recently. Four years ago he married a young girl fifty years his junior, and his gift to her on that occasion was one million dollars in bonds. His wealth is estimated at from ten to twelve millions, accumulated in the manufacture of carpets.

The sanitary inspectors of New York have been destroying candy colored with impure and poisonous substances at the rate of about 3,000 pounds a day for nearly a week, which will give some idea of the extent of the baleful practice. They chose their time well, the manufactories having been all at work and quite overrun with orders for the Christmas season.

Mr. Davitt, in his new book, takes very reasonable and practical ground on the question of Home Rule, declaring for an Irish National Assembly, to sit in Dublin and have absolute control of local affairs. The veteran was made happy on his death-bed by the assurances of some of his friends that his family should be well cared for.

The farmers of Kansas and the adjoining States are said to be the reverse of prosperous at the present time, when in the interior towns corn is selling at from 15 to 18 cents a bushel and wheat at 27 cents a bushel. The boom in the wheat country has collapsed, and many think it will never reappear. The farms are said to be covered with mortgages, which agricultural produce at present prices will never enable them to pay off.

The publisher of the Portland (Me.) Argus, who was sued by Mr. Blaine some years ago for alleged libelous references to his domestic affairs, has sent his congratulations to the editor of the Indianapolis Sentinel. He says: "Blaine's letter attempting to cover retreat reminds me forcibly of the epistle by which he withdrew from prosecution in like case against me twenty-five years ago. Then it was trouble in regard to getting evidence—now it is trouble in regard to getting a jury; very thin pretexes, both."
