THE YEAR AHEAD.

The curtain has fallen, the play is done, says the Herald. Its title is "1884 in Foreign Lands," and the audience, as it departs, expresses a free opinion of its merits.

England and France furnished the martial incidents. The defeat of the Arabs at Teb and Tanager, the fall of Berber, the siege of Khartoum, the murder of Colonel Stewart, the heroism of Gordon—these introduced British redcoats with a background of Orientals.

Sensational scenes were abundant. Many of them, however, were ill contrived. The explosions at the London railway stations and London Bridge, as well as the attempt on the Niederwald monument, were roundly hissed by the gallery.

There was some chance for a spectacle in the marriage of Prince Louis of Battenberg and Duke Sergius of Russia. The White Elephant led the annual procession of notabilities.

A muffled roll of drums is heard. A funeral march peals forth. Laid on a huge catafalque come the dead of the year. Dr. Edward Lasker, Keshub Chunder Sen, Abraham Hayward, Eugene Rouher, Thomas Cheney, Dr. Isaac Todhunter, Francois Mignet, the Duke of Albany, Jean Baptiste Dumas, Charles Reade, Henry J. Byron, the Duke of Buccleuch, the Marquis of Hertford, the Duke of Wellington, Marie Taghioni, Fanny Elssler, Sir Michael Costa, Midhat Pacha, Sir Bartle Frere, Professor Lepsius, Count Todleben, Earl Cowley, Rev. Mark Pattison, Sir Erasmus Wilson, Hans Makart, Paul Lacroix, A. M. Sullivan, Henry Fawcett, the Duke of Brunswick, M. Vancorbell, Bastien Lepage—see their names inscribed in letters of gold and uncover before the mighty dead.

The pageant passes. The sensational scenes are cheered. The comedy is effective. And yet the spectators are disappointed. "The piece has no plot," they say. Politically, indeed, it is naught. Has England advanced in Egypt? Has the compromise on the Franchise bill borne fruit? Has Mr. Gladstone or the House of Peers greater cause for boasting? In Spain the monarchy is tottering. In Germany the Chancellor's snarl with the clericals and Reichstag seems inextinguishable. In Russia the Czar is still fighting his secret foes. Out of all the wranglings and conferences of the year is born the little Congo State, and its god-mothers are already quarrelling round the font.

The Philadelphia Times states that a movement in the direction of cheap theatricals was made in New York last week by a half dozen managers of that city, who formed a combination to produce pleasing dramatic attractions in all parts of the country at cheap prices of admission. In each city from five to ten weeks' time will be booked and it will be filled by dramatic, operatic or spectacular combinations controlled by the syndicate. The general prices of admission will be ten, fifteen and twenty-five cents. An additional five cents will be charged for a reserved seat. It is said that time has a ready been booked in Baltimore, Chicago, Cincinnati, St. Louis, Cleveland, Buffalo, Wilmington, Del., Rochester, Syracuse and other cities. The syndicate will simply rent the houses and give two performances a day, and it is represented that a number of com-

binations of good repute have already indicated their willingness to play under the new arrangement for certainties. The success of the dime museums throughout the country, of which more than one hundred are now in successful operation, is given as one of the reasons for the proposed new departure.

New York letter: "The agitation in the Episcopal Church here with reference to the admission of the Rev. Mr. Huntington to the Order of the Holy Cross and taking upon himself the vows at the hands of the assistant bishop, promises to be even more earnest and widespread than that which recently attended the alleged unorthodox sermons of the Rev. R. Heber Newton. Leading Low Churchmen have already been in consultation about it, and have called in eminent ecclesiastical lawyers to counsel them what steps can be taken under the canons to impress the assistant bishop that there is nothing in the prescribed form for admission to holy orders which will sanction the authorization of what they call 'an Episcopal monk.' The High Churchmen of the school of Dr. Dix and Father Browne, on the other hand, are disposed to accept the thing as a disposition on the part of the Church to utilize brotherhoods, as well as sisterhoods within her pale. What the final outcome of the controversy will be remains to be seen. The assistant bishop at present is down in Florida, probably all unconscious of the storm he has raised.
