Whereupon John S. James, J. P., offered, as an amendment—That the Criminal Court of New Hanover county be continued as it now is.

The following amendment to the amendment of J. S. James, J. P., was offered by E. D. Hall, J. P.

Resolved, That it is the opinion of this meeting that a criminal court is a measure of necessity for New Hanover county; but in view of the fact that all of the costs of the present court fall heavily on the tax-payers of the county, that the County Commissioners be requested to have the county of New Hanover put in a Criminal Circuit.

Carried.

J. L. Cantwell, J. P., offered the following resolution:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this meeting that the officers of the Criminal Court of New Hanover county, in the discharge of their duties, deserve and have our hearty commendation.

On motion of D. G. Worth, J. P., the resolution was laid on the table.
