The completion of the Mackey-Bennett cable makes the total length of submarine cables, according to *The Electrician*, about sixty-eight thousand miles. Each cable contains an average of forty strands of wire, so that together there are over 2,500,000 miles of wire used in their construction, or ten times the distance from the earth to the moon. Practically, all this has been laid within the last twenty five years; the greater part within a decade.

Natural gas still makes the problem of existence in Pittsburgh and Allegheny a little more uncertain than elsewhere. It keeps on exploding on the most unlooked-for occasions and in the most unlooked-for places. The citizens of Allegheny City, who object to being unceremoniously blown through the roofs of their residences without warning, are petitioning the council to prohibit the laying of gas pipes except under the supervision of the city officials. If they must be blown up they want to be sure it is done according to law.

The New York *Tribune* gives the following interesting figures: "While there is discussion over the grant to be made to Prince Albert Victor of Wales, it may be remembered that the royal family of England gets probably a smaller revenue from the kingdom, in proportion to its wealth, than any other in Europe. Parliamentary allowances to all members of the family aggregate about \$2,685,000, and the receipts from the dukedoms of Lancaster and Cornwall swell this to say \$3,300,000, which represents their total public income. The revenue of the empire is probably something more than \$1,000,000,000. So the royal income is only about three-tenths of 1 per cent. of the State funds. Compare these figures with those relating to the Czar. That monarch receives \$12,250,000 out of a total national revenue of only a little more than \$500,000,000 a year. Take another example: The little principality of Montenegro appropriates \$20,500 out of his nation's \$300,000—not far from 7 per cent. And in addition to that he gets \$24,000 a year from Russia and \$15,000 from Austria."

The process of combination or consolidation of great trade and manufacturing interests finds its latest illustration in the establishment of a giant company to control the manufacture of stamped tinware. Last month the five largest firms engaged in this business formed an incorporation in New York State under the style of the Central Stamping Company. The five firms are James E. Aikman & Co., E. Ketchikan & Co., F. Habermann, the Lalance and Grosjean Manufacturing Company and the St. Louis Stamping Company. Factories will be operated in Newark, N. J., Brooklyn, Woodhaven and St. Louis. The consolidation is said to have been brought about by the common embarrassment of over production. How it will affect the smaller concerns, scattered over the country, it is not easy to foresee. The stamping business has revolutionized the tinware trade within a few years. A hundred articles of kitchen furniture, which used to be the common work of every journeyman tinsmith, are now bought from the stamping factories, where they are made better, cheaper and more shapely than in the old way. The firms named above have already absorbed a great share of the trade, and the consolidation is expected to enable them to extend it by giving all the benefit of special process, patents and patterns in which each has heretofore enjoyed certain advantages.

one in every 83 merchants failed, while in 1878 the percentage was one in every 64. The enormous growth in the aggregate business capacity of the country appears very clearly by a glance at the figures. In 1878 there were 674,741 business houses; in 1884, or six years later, there were 904,756. Here is an increase of 230,015 houses, or thirty-four per cent., while the population has probably not increased more than twenty per cent. It is a suggestive fact that the greatest ratio of failures exists in those sections where the business development has been most active, namely, in the extreme West and in the Southern States. Here there was the greatest desire to extend trade, the greatest enthusiasm and carelessness, and consequently the largest number of wrecks. In steady-going Canada, on the contrary, where in the six years from 1878 to 1884 the business houses only increased a few thousands, the danger due to growth are seen at a minimum. But of the two it is better to have the evils of enterprise and progress than those of stagnation.
