Over thirty bodies are awaiting cremation in the furnace of the New York Cremation Society at Mount Olivet, N. J. It will be completed by March.

P. F. Reade, the suspended New York grain broker, is only twenty; a year ago was a messenger boy, has been within six months worth \$20,000, and is now cleaned out.

English towns of less than 10,000 inhabitants have scarcely grown at all in the last decade. The increase of ports and seaboard towns is much greater than that of those inland.

The ex-Khedive, who did more than any one to bring about the present deplorable plight of Egypt, is now a familiar figure—short, stout, and white-haired—in the west end of London.

The mongooses imported into Jamaica to eat up the rats having accomplished their task, the burning question now is how to get rid of the mongooses, which the blacks have a superstitious fear of killing.

The Garter of Austria is the order of the Golden Fleece. The Emperor's recent nominations bring the total number of members up to 88, of whom three belong to the house of Hapsburg and five are reigning monarchs.

The last edition of the London Weekly Echo is published on Sunday morning. It comes nearer to the Sunday edition of a New York paper than any published in England. Mr. Storey, M. P., for Sunderland, is the chief manager and controller of the paper.

The latest Virginia plan is for Senator Mahone to run for Governor this year, with John S. Wise as his mate for Lieutenant-Governor. If this combination is successful Mahone is to return to the Senate and Wise is to become Governor of the Old Dominion.

Mr. Henry George's latest recruit is Mr. Chamberlain, president of the Board of Trade and a member of Mr. Gladstone's Cabinet. Mr. Chamberlain's last speech contains the following significant sentence: "The present land system is based on robbery, and the community is entitled to restitution and redress."

Chicago received from licenses last year the sum of \$1,600,000, an excess of \$1,000,000 over any preceding year. Of the amount stated \$1,400,000 came from saloon licenses alone, as a result of the operation of the high license law; and this represents only eight months, the law not having gone into effect until May 1.

Three great musical festivals will be held in the provinces in England this year—that at Birmingham at the latter end of August, one at Hereford in September, and another at Bristol later in the year. At the first one Gonnod's "Mors et Vita" will be produced, and new works by Dvorak, Mackenzie, Stanford, Cowen, and Anderson and Prout.

The Earl of Aylesford, recently deceased at Big Spring, Texas, was only 36 years old. He was of an old stock, and left two daughters. He belonged to the set of the Prince of Wales, and had a miserable marital experience. When his wife eloped with the present degenerate Duke of Marlborough, the Earl sought solace and has found death in the wilds of America.

Lord Rossmore, the Orange champion, has been compelled to part with his racing stud. He married the daughter of Mr. Naylor, the inheritor of an immense Liverpool fortune. Mr. Naylor has no son, and the marriage would be a great thing for Lord Rossmore if his father-in-law approved of him, but it is understood that he distinctly does not.

The translation of the "Arabian Nights" by Capt. Burton, the explorer, will probably be published in part next Spring. No passages will be suppressed, as the book is specially intended for students and scholars. It will be obtainable only of Capt. Burton, Trieste, Austria. Capt. Burton has been 32 years at work on it. The special aim kept in view is to reproduce the book as originally written.

Exports Foreign.
Ger. barque *Charlotte* and *Auna*, Kruger, cleared to day for Liverpool with 1,750 bales cotton, valued at \$85,000. Ger. barque *Eintracht*, Muswick, cleared for Antwerp with 550 casks spirits turpentine and 2,960 barrels rosin, valued at \$12,500, making a total of exports foreign amounting to \$97,500. Both cargoes were shipped by Messrs Alex Sprunt & Son.

To Leave Us.
We very much regret to learn that Messrs. H. Brunhill & Bro. are to remove from this city to Richmond. The object is to consolidate the business as much as possible they having now a house in Richmond and one in Wilmington. The business here, however, will be kept up as a branch of the Richmond house. They have made all of the preparations necessary and will leave here in April.

In the removal of Messrs. Henry and Leopold Brunhill we lose two of our most public spirited, liberal-minded and enterprising citizens and it is a loss which we can ill afford at this time. They have resided here for nearly twenty years, having come to us soon after the close of the war, and by thrift, energy and enterprise have built up a large business in this city. They will leave behind them many warm friends who will part with them with great regret.

The Problems of Education.
Hon. Carl Schurz, who delivered a lecture on the above subject at the Opera House last night, under the auspices of the Wilmington Library Association, is a profound scholar, an astute logician, a critical thinker and an analytical reasoner. This was all made entirely manifest in the way in which he discussed the all-important "Problems of Education" last night. There was a good audience, although the inclement weather undoubtedly prevented many from attending who would have gladly enjoyed the rich intellectual treat. There was nothing in his lecture which called for any great exhibition of oratory, nor did the speaker make any attempts in that direction. It was the matter which was deeply interesting and instructive and not the manner of delivery, as is too often the case. His speeches always read well. Forceful, logical, incisive, argumentative and convincing, they appear on the printed page as excellent efforts. In his lecture last night, the distinguished speaker laid particular stress upon the education of girls for all the duties of womanly life and pointed out many glaring mistakes which have crept into the educational system regarding this part of our population. He was listened to with profound attention and delight by the audience.

Mr. Schurz was the guest of Rev. F. W. E. Peschau during his stay in the city, and yesterday afternoon was called upon by a committee representing our German fellow citizens, who, through their Chairman, Mr. E. Peschau, invited him to be their guest to-day. Mr. Schurz, however, on account of previous engagements, was compelled reluctantly to decline the invitation.

The Tell-Tale.
With the aid of a pair of compasses or a pencil and a bit of string, carefully draw two concentric half-circles, that is, from the same centre, and one about half an inch within the other. The size of the design makes but little difference, but the result is more easily seen if the diagram is as large as convenient. Divide this double half-circle into a number of compartments, and in each place a letter of the alphabet, a numeral, or a name, as the fancy may dictate; the object being that there shall be no possible mistaking of one compartment for another. Rule straight lines from each compartment to the common center. Now take a small button—a shoe button is as good as any—and fasten a bit of fine silk thread about eight inches long to it, making a knot in each end of the thread. Now let one of the party take the thread by the end, and hold it so far above the figure that the button shall hang about an inch and a half above the paper. Let him fix his mind firmly upon one of the compartments and then close his eyes. Very soon the button will develop a pendulum-like motion, and before long, generally in about three minutes, it will begin to move toward the compartment of which the holder is thinking. It really seems, at the first glance that the button itself is influenced by the unconscious exertion of will on the part of the experimenter. But close investigation will reveal the fact that the hand moves with a slight tremulous motion, which, being transmitted through the fine thread, moves the button. Much amusement can be had by putting the names of people in the compartments, and then see of which one the experimenter is thinking.
