For nearly a quarter of a century the Government of the United States has been in the hands of a party which felt constrained, as far as possible, to manage the affairs of the people upon the assumption that it understood their business better than they themselves understood it. With the change which the people effected at the late election, says the Philadelphia Record, the Government will be carried on in the belief that the people can best manage their own affairs.

Two great rafts of logs were brought to Cleveland from Lake Superior last year. One covered five and the other eight acres, and contained respectively three and two millions of feet. Two weeks were occupied in the transit from a point about a hundred miles from St. Clair, Mich., to Cleveland. Being made up in sections, they were run separately through the rapids and rivers, and were united where there was plenty of room. The total distance was 600 miles. It was the first attempt to run rafts of logs through the rapids at the Sault, which are a mile long, with a descent of twenty feet.

## LOCAL NEWS.

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GEO R FRENCH & SONS—Comfortable and Stylish

The British Medical Temperance Association offer one hundred guineas for the best essay on the physical and moral advantages of total abstinence, to be written by the medical students of the United Kingdom.

A man named Senor Nicholas Ancheno, of Buenos Ayres, recently deceased, is said to have been the richest farmer in the world. He had 1,710 square miles of land, 152,000 cows, 600,000 sheep, and 5,000 horses. His assets footed up \$120,000,000.

The cost of carrying a bushel of grain from Chicago to New York by lake and canal was, in 1868, twenty-five cents, and by all rail forty-two cents. In 1882 these figures were reduced to eight and fourteen cents respectively.

Three attempts, all of which were partially successful, were made on Saturday last to wreck public buildings in London. Two of these attempts were on Parliament House and Westminster and the other was on the famous Tower. Dynamite was the instrument used and the result is that the Houses of Parliament were partially wrecked, considerable damage was done to Westminster Hall, and the "White Tower" was badly injured by the force of the explosion.

The following are some of the prices asked: Cabbage, from 10c to 20c per head; Irish potatoes, 40c per peck; sweet potatoes, 20c per peck; turnips, 40 cents per peck; celery, three bunches for 25c; chickens, from 20 to 35c each; ducks 75c per pair; turkeys, 20c per pound; eggs, 30c per dozen; apples, 40c per peck.

## Midnight Thieves.

There has been such an amount of midnight stealing recently in the Eastern section of the city that the people residing there feel that some certain method should be adopted by which the outrages may be stopped. With the present number of policemen it is impossible for that body to exercise complete surveillance over the city, and the people, aware of this fact, will feel compelled to employ a special force to look after their interests and for the protection of their property. Hardly a night passes in which some of our citizens are not visited, their premises raided and their property stolen, and it frequently occurs that two or three houses are made to contribute to these scamps in a single night. The thieves have thus far escaped with such ease and freedom that they have become emboldened in their pursuit of plunder, and they will continue to rob until summary methods shall be used to prevent it.
