The health of the Empress of Austria has so much improved that the doctors have allowed her to resume her favorite pastime of riding.

A bill introduced in the Michigan Legislature provides that the occupation and politics of each candidate shall appear on a voting paper giving the names of all candidates.

In the parish of Thornton-le-Moor, North Yorkshire, England, with a population of 625 souls, there has been only one death during the last fourteen months. No wonder England is overpopulated.

A properly developed, full-grown man weighing 154 pounds ought, according to Prof. Huxley, to consume daily 5,000 grains of lean beefsteak, 6,000 grains of bread, 7,000 grains of milk, 3,000 grains of potatoes, 600 grains of butter, and 23,900 grains of water.

It is like a story of '49 to read that at a recent performance at the Standard Theatre, San Francisco, an appreciative man became so enthusiastic over the introductory portion of the performance that he began throwing money on the stage.

London mail carriers now call at private residences for parcels, the same as do express messengers in this country. A scarlet card is furnished by the postal authorities, which, when displayed in the window, insures a call from the postman.

A pamphlet has lately been published in London advocating the fining of people who have more than three children. There is no question but that the theories advanced by Mrs. Lesant have gradually taken a very strong hold on the people of England.

A clock seven feet high has been made by a Leesville, Ohio, blacksmith with the aid of nothing but the tools of his trade. It is made, principally of steel, gives the time in eleven cities, strikes the hours and quarters, and is exhibited in a glass case where the movement can be seen.

Berlin papers report that a subscription list for contributions to the pedestal of the Bartholdi statue has been put up in the United States Consulate General in that city, in accordance with an order by President Arthur. The amount subscribed is limited to \$1, and the list is already well covered.

The lack of snow in the upper and northeastern sections of New Hampshire has caused a partial suspension of the wood and lumber business. In some places lumbermen are selling their teams and discharging their men to close operations for the season. Whatever may be the character of the weather for the remainder of the winter, the amount of timber and wood got out will be small, it is said.

Charles Westwood, of Shoreditch, being an anti-vaccinationist, evaded the English law and permitted three of his children to remain unvaccinated. They have recently died of small-pox. The Lancet says that Mr. Westbrook will have to look far back into history for any accident from vaccination to be compared with the disaster that has accrued to his home from small-pox.

Three thousand visitors a year go through the Mammoth Cave in Kentucky, but it is expected the number will be much larger this year, owing to the increased travel South to the New Orleans Exposition. The cave is on the line of the Louisville & Nashville Railroad, but ten miles from the nearest station. The cost of stopping over, including a moderately extensive exploration of the cave, is about \$10 to each person.

W. W. Ogilvie, the grain king of Manitoba, has closed his mills from inability to compete with Minneapolis millers. Since the season began 600,000 barrels of American flour have been shipped to the Dominion, principally for consumption in the province of Quebec. Grain, according to this Manitoba authority, can be had by the Minneapolis millers at 60 cents a bushel, while he has to pay 72, and even with the duty on flour at 50 cents a barrel they can still undersell him in Canadian markets.

The flexibility of itacolumite—a remarkable sandstone existing in Georgia and North and South Carolina—seems to be surpassed by that of a magnesian limestone found at entrance of the Tyne, in England. This limestone is reported to be so flexible that thin layers, three feet or more in length may be bent into a circle while damp retaining that form on drying.

The Rev. Cannon Bagot writes to the Dublin Freeman advocating growth of the tobacco plant in Ireland. At the time of the union it was of great importance as an industry, and formed the subject of a special clause in the act, but in 1831 a new act of Parliament made it penal to grow more than a very limited quantity on a farm. This led the way to its extinction, but it is believed it might be grown with considerable advantage to the farmers.

This magnificent weather, and the people have taken advantage of it during the day to come out of doors and enjoy the balmy atmosphere.

Vegetation has already taken a start. The elm trees and fig trees hereabouts and some of the rose bushes, are already in bud and the grass in some localities is springing up vigorously.

Peanut farmers complain that at present prices they do not get pay for the cost of the crop, and that, unless there is a change for the better, they will be compelled to cease their cultivation.

We regret to hear that Capt. W. M. Parker had another serious attack last night; and he is again prostrated with a sickness from which it had been hoped that he had nearly recovered.

Hidicous looking valentines begin to be seen in the shop windows. They are meaningless things and their legitimate effect will be to belittle those who send them in the minds of good thinking people.

On and after the first of February (next Sunday) the trains on the Wilmington & Weldon Railroad will be run through to Richmond in charge of the same conductors, instead of changing at Weldon, as heretofore. The distance is 246 miles, which will be quite a long run, although a quick one.

Hon. Joseph J. Davis was chosen as chairman of the convention, and B. F. Long, Esq., and Capt. S. A. Ashe as secretaries. The convention at once addressed itself to the business in hand. It was decided that the chair should appoint a committee, composed of one member from each district, to which all matters should be referred; that all resolutions, and all verbal suggestions should be considered and weighed by this committee. The following composed the committee: 1st district, C. W. Grandy; 2d, R. B. Peebles; 3d, A. G. Ricard; 4th, James A. Lockhart; 5th, C. M. Cooke; 6th, W. J. Montgomery; 7th, John S. Henderson; 8th, J. S. Adams; 9th, W. H. Malone. At large, Messrs. Argo, Battle, Long, Guthrie, Bellamy, Montgomery.

Mr. Fab. Busbee moved that a committee of fifteen, one from each judicial district and six from the State at large, be appointed to take into consideration the needed relief and judicial reform; carried; and the chair asked that the gentlemen present from the different districts should indicate the member to be selected respectively.

Committee on the formation of a State Bar Association: First district, Frank Vaughan; second district, Thomas R. Purnell; third district, Thomas W. Strange; 4th district, C. C. Lyon; fifth district, W. H. S. Burgwyn; sixth district, —; seventh district, J. S. Henderson; eighth district, B. F. Long; ninth district, W. H. Malone.

At 8 o'clock the convention reassembled and Mr. Argo, of the committee, submitted the following:

The committee on the judicial system of the State, to whom were referred various resolutions relating to that subject, respectfully report that they have considered the whole matter and recommend the adoption of the following resolutions:

1st. That the best interests of the State require an amendment to the constitution providing for the appointment of all the judges by the Governor and his council, with the advice and consent of the Senate.

2d. That an amendment to the Constitution should be submitted to the people, providing for an increase of the number of justices of the Supreme Court to five.

3d. That we recommend an increase in the number of Superior Courts in such counties as need greater court facilities, with a provision that some of the terms shall be for the trial of civil cases only, and in our opinion to meet this requirement the number of Superior Court judges should be increased to fifteen.

The resolution was adopted. Mr. T. R. Purnell, of committee on Constitution and by-laws, reported:— (The report, too lengthy for publication in this issue, will be given to-morrow.) On motion of Mr. W. J. Peele, the Constitution was adopted.

The time for holding the annual meeting of the bar association of the State was fixed on the Wednesday after the second Monday in July next, at Raleigh. J. J. Davis was requested to deliver the address at that time.

Mr. Guthrie made a motion, which was adopted, that a committee be appointed to memorialize the legislature, embodying the resolutions adopted, &c. On motion of Mr. Geo. H. Snow, Hon. Jos. J. Davis was chosen president of the bar association for the present year. On motion of Mr. W. H. Malone, the meeting formally resolved itself into "The North Carolina Bar Association." The following officers of the association were then chosen: President, J. J. Davis; vice presidents by districts, 1st, C. W. Grandy; 2d, Thos. R. Purnell; 3d, E. T. Boykin; 4th, W. A. Guthrie; 5th, Samuel H. Webb; 6th, W. J. Montgomery; 7th, John S. Henderson; 8th, J. S. Adams; 9th, W. H. Malone. Secretary, T. M. Argo; treasurer, Walter Clark.

Nor. barque Conitor, Syvertsen cleared for London with 4,516 barrels rosin, valued at \$4,926, shipped by Messrs. Paterson, Downing & Co; making a total of exports foreign amounting to \$9,164.

Live Stock Insurance. The citizens of Masonboro township held a meeting last night for the purpose of organizing a Home Mutual Insurance Company, for the insurance of horses, cattle, hog and other live stock. Nearly every white male citizen of the township was present and the meeting was entirely harmonious and quite enthusiastic upon the subject of the insurance company, which they determined to organize without any unnecessary delay. The meeting adjourned to meet again next Friday night, at which time they will elect officers and fully organize.

In Wedlock's bonds. One of the most notable events in Raleigh during the present season was the marriage, on Wednesday night last, at the Church of the Good Shepherd, of Miss Cornelia Roma Lyman, daughter of Rev. T. B. Lyman, to Mr. Robert L. Niles, of New York. The ceremonies were performed by Bishop Lyman, assisted by Rev. E. R. Rich. The Church was elegantly and appropriately decorated for the occasion, and a large audience were in attendance to witness the imposing and impressive ceremony. The happy couple left the same night for Richmond and Washington, and after a few days' sojourn in those cities will proceed to New York, where they will make their future home.

Prof. Proctor Last Night. Quite a large and appreciative audience gathered at the Opera House last evening to listen to the lecture of the distinguished English Astronomer, Prof. Richard A. Proctor. The Professor is thoroughly English in appearance and manner. He is short of stature with a handsome, genial, intellectual face. His subject was "The Life of a World" which he handled with rare skill and ability. He impresses you not only with his thorough familiarity with his subject, but that he is equally in love with it and is anxious to have his hearers become so. He possesses the essentials of a successful teacher, thorough knowledge of his subject, ability to impart, and love for his work. His style is good, diction ready and chaste, pronunciation almost faultless, and his enunciation pleasing. To say the lecture was entertaining and instructive is faint praise; it was these and more; it was elevating, inspiring, grand. The audience was in full sympathy with the distinguished lecturer, and we question if there was present an individual who did not go away feeling wiser and happier, if no better.

No one could have heard it and seen the splendid illustrations without grander ideas of God and humbler notions of his individual importance.
