In 1884 the shoe factories of Nyack, N. Y., turned out 688,434 pairs of shoes valued at \$1,400,000; over \$250,000 were paid as wages.

Col. Lamont's salary as private secretary to Gov. Cleveland was \$4,000 a year. As private secretary to President Cleveland it will be only \$3,250.

During the year 1884, 83,051 persons died in London, or 223 a day. This gloomy record is made darker still by a statement that during the same year in London the sun shone brightly on only about 65 days.

Louise Michel's volume of stories and song for children, to which she devoted the time of her imprisonment, is said to be of such a character as to controvert the belief that she is a totally wicked and worthless woman.

The official and otherwise respected gambler lives in Louisville. The chief of the fire department owns a part of one of the largest pool-rooms, his clerk has \$60,000 in "gambling property." He volunteered when about 16, was severely wounded at the age of 17, and was surrendered at Shreveport at the age of about 18.

A special committee of the New York State Bar Association recently offered a prize for the best essay on "The Doctrine of *Stare Decisis*, its reason and extent." Among the many competitors for the prize, whose names had not been made known to the committee, was ex-Governor Daniel H. Chamberlain, one of the latest accessions to the Bar in that city. His essay excited the admiration of the members of the committee, and they were unanimous in awarding the prize to Mr. Chamberlain.

A TRIPLE CRIME.

Adultery, Murder and Suicide
—A Fearful Domestic Tragedy
—An Awful Ending to Illicit Love.

On Thursday, the 29th ult., a few miles from Whiteville, in Columbus county, and near the South Carolina line, occurred one of those terrible domestic tragedies which shock the communities in which they take place and which are a legitimate ending of an unholy and illegitimate love. The facts connected with the case which terminated, so far as two of the actors were concerned, in a brutal murder and deliberate suicide on the day and at the place mentioned, are about as follows: Mr. J. P. Ward and Mr. Elisha Prince were neighbors who lived but a short distance from each other, and both were intelligent and well-to-do farmers. They were also brothers-in-law. Ward having married a sister of Prince. The relations between the two men and their families had been amicable and pleasant until about two years ago, when it was whispered that an improper intimacy existed between Ward and the wife of Prince. These rumors soon became so much of a certainty that bad blood was engendered and bitter animosity was aroused between the men. Recently Ward and Mrs. Prince eloped together and went as far as Savannah, Ga., but soon after arriving in that city the guilty pair saw, in one of their rambles, a car load of coffins, which impressed them with the idea that a terrible epidemic was in progress, and they were so much frightened that they immediately returned to their old homes in Columbus county. Upon returning home, the guilty woman, now deeply penitent and sorrow-stricken, promised anew her fidelity to her husband, soon joined the church, and was in all respects a reformed woman.

This conduct on the part of Mrs. Prince irritated and enraged the blindly infatuated Ward to that degree that he armed himself on the day mentioned with a loaded revolver, a double-barrelled shot gun, charged with buckshot, two phials of laudanum and a phial of opium, and thus prepared he went to a convenient place and hid in ambush awaiting the appearance of his wronged brother-in-law, and when the latter appeared, quietly pursuing his work, Ward stepped from his place of concealment and discharged the shot gun, the entire load, consisting of ten buckshot, taking effect in Prince's breast. The latter attempted to run to his house, but had gone only a few steps when he fell to the ground a corpse.

Ward then left and, after going a short distance, he met a neighbor to whom he stated that he had killed Prince and that he intended to kill himself by taking poison. At this juncture two other neighbors arrived and attempted to prevent Ward from carrying his threat into execution, but he held them at bay with his loaded revolver, and drained the fatal contents of the phial, after which he went to his home and slept away in a few hours a blasted, but hitherto useful life.

Mr. Prince was a quiet, inoffensive man. Both men were married and leave wives and children and both were buried on the same day, in the same cemetery. Just before his death Ward gave a long letter to his wife, to be delivered to Mrs. Prince, in which he expressed his great love for the latter and regretting that she had forsaken him.

Failed in the Attempt.
We hear of a lady in this city who this forenoon called upon one of her neighbors and while in her friend's house, looked out at the widow and noticed that one of the windows in her own kitchen was hoisted. She immediately started to see what was the matter, and just as she had reached the gate leading to her residence a colored woman ran out and dodged around a corner out of sight. The lady then entered the kitchen and found that a lot of provisions had been stolen. A further examination showed that a basket, belonging also to the lady, had been taken and placed outside the window and into this the provisions had been put, but all had been left in the hasty departure of the thief, so that the lady lost nothing except, possibly, for a few moments—her temper.

Sunday Morning's Fire.

About 2 o'clock yesterday morning fire was discovered in an unoccupied one story frame dwelling house on Harnett street, near the corner of Seventh. The alarm was sounded and the firemen were on hand with their usual promptitude, but the flames had gotten such headway that the building was entirely destroyed, and their efforts were directed to saving contiguous property from destruction. The flames ignited the small one story frame storehouse on the corner of Harnett and Seventh streets and also the one story frame dwelling adjacent on Seventh street. Both of these buildings were occupied by colored people and both were badly damaged. All the buildings were the property of Mr. S. H. Terry, of the police force. The two dwellings were insured for \$125 each and the storehouse for \$50, making an insurance of \$300, all in the Niagara Fire Ins. Co., of New York, represented in this city by Messrs John W. Gordon & Smith. The fire was undoubtedly the work of an incendiary.

The Moon in February.

The February moon tulls on the 28th at 11 o'clock in the evening, so that we come within an hour of having no full moon in February. On the 3d, three days before the last quarter, the moon is in conjunction with Uranus. This means that the planet and moon are at the time in the same right ascensions or longitude, although one may be several degrees north or south of the other. On the 13th, 18 minutes past 5 o'clock in the morning, the moon is in conjunction with Venus, and twenty-four minutes later she is at her nearest point to Mercury. On the 14th, the day of her change, she is in conjunction with Mars, on the 21st with Neptune, on the 23rd with Saturn, and on the 28th with Jupiter.

The moon occults a few small stars as she makes her monthly circuit, the phenomena being visible in this portion of the earth's territory. These occultations are interesting to watch, but the stars are so small that a telescope is required for the observation.
