King Humbert, of Italy, has undertaken the task of effecting a reconciliation between Pion-Pion Bonaparte and his wife.

The Governor of Michigan receives the munificent salary of \$1,000 a year while his private secretary is paid \$1,600.

House property in Paris to the value of over \$5,000,000 is untenanted; in other words, one-sixteenth part of the capital invested in houses lies idle.

The fund raised by subscription, mostly among the Spanish and Spanish-American residents of New York, for the relief of the sufferers by the earthquakes in Spain, now amounts to \$11,315.

Gen. Winfield Scott once admitted that when he was a young officer he had paraded for hours at a time before a large mirror, "but," he added, "if any one had seen me it would have killed me."

The leading military paper of Great Britain expresses the hope that a detachment of American volunteers or State militia will form a part of the American Exhibition to be held in London in 1886, as there is to be a royal military tournament at Islington that year.

General Bragg, who, became conspicuous because of a fiery speech in support of Cleveland at Chicago, addressed the Democratic legislative caucus in Wisconsin the other day, declaring that two years hence Wisconsin would elect a Democrat to succeed Sawyer in the United States Senate.

France produced 782,566,335 gallons of wine last year, 27,000,000 gallons less than 1883. With the exception of nine departments in the Northwest, wine is produced in every part of France. Owing to the ravages of phylloxera, 120,000 acres of vineyards had to be rooted up during the year.

Henry M. Stanley is pushing to its completion the manuscript of a work on his African labors. The work will bear the title "Congo, or the Founding of a State; a Story of Work and Exploration." It will consist of two good-sized volumes, and it is expected that the manuscript will be ready for the printer within a month.

The closing of 12,000 saloons in Holland does not seem to have deprived the people of that country of the right to be classed as the hardest drinking nation in the world. The New York Sun cable correspondent says that 2 1/2 per cent. of her entire population were sent to prison in one year for drunkenness, and that nearly \$18,000,000 a year is spent on whiskey.

Mr. William Walter Phelps "concedes" that Mr. Blaine will never again permit himself to be drawn into another nomination. Mr. Blaine's rivals, says the Philadelphia Record, who remember having heard something of the same sort in the winter of 1883-'4, will probably not relax their vigilance in repairing the weak places in their political fences.

There is said to be great excitement in Mexico in consequence of popular impressions that the United States is negotiating for the purchase of the eastern half of that Republic. It appears that the sensation is not the result of a panic on account of the expansion policy of Secretary Frelinghuysen, but originated from certain wild talk recently indulged in by the New Orleans Picayune, which has been translated and published broadcast by the Mexican press.

Board of Aldermen.

The Board of Aldermen met in regular monthly session last night.

Alderman DeRosset, from the Finance committee, submitted a bill to be presented to the General Assembly, for authority to issue bonds to the amount of \$100,000, for the improvement of streets and for sewerage. The report was adopted.

Alderman Dudley, from the committee on Markets, reported that the floor of the Fourth street market house needed to be renewed. On motion the committee was authorized to have the necessary work done.

A special committee on the railroad bridge reported and asked for further time. Granted.

On the claim of J. R. Turrentine, the special committee recommended the payment of \$100. Adopted. A resolution was adopted, ordering repairs to be made on Fourth street, to sidewalks, &c., between Red Cross and Campbell streets.

Alderman Bear submitted a bill to be submitted to the General Assembly, to change the registration, in regard to numbering lots, &c.

The Mayor stated that it was necessary that registrars should be appointed at this meeting for the approaching city election.

An election was ordered and W. M. Evans was elected for the Upper Division of the First Ward; C. M. Harris, Lower Division of the First Ward; J. C. Lumsden, Second Ward; A. Y. Yopp, Third Ward; E. H. Freeman, Fourth Ward; D. S. Bender, Fifth Ward.

On motion of Alderman Fishblate the Mayor was authorized to appoint the inspectors of election.

A communication was read from Mr. Wm. Lalimer, in reference to the purchase of a lot from the city for hotel purposes, asking for the extension of the time named in the agreement. On motion, the matter was referred to Alderman Fishblate, Dudley and Boney, as a special committee.

Alderman Bear submitted the following, which was adopted:

Resolved, That the petition of Maj. W. L. Young, relative to the publication styled "Semi-Tropical Area," be referred to a select committee of three, to be appointed by the chair, who shall be empowered to expend \$100; provided, the Board of Audit approve the same.

Aldermen Bear, Morton and DeRosset were appointed a committee on the above resolution.

Petitions for the use of the City Hall, free of charge, by St. Stephen's Church and Israel Tent were not granted.
