A Washington correspondent says: "There is good authority now for the statement that, since his election as President, Governor Cleveland has not invited a living man to Albany with any view to the construction of his Cabinet. Mr. Bayard's visit was of his own seeking, as was that of Senator Garland. The report is that, without any authority, Mr. Dorsheimer, of New York, told each they would be welcome visitors and upon such assurances both made a trip to Albany."

The comptroller of New York City has just paid to John Baird, the assignee of the claim of Jose de Navarro for \$700,000 for 10,000 water meters furnished the city under a contract entered into during the days of Tweed, the sum of \$1,400,595.65, which represents the original amount, with accrued interest. The contract in question was made in 1871. When the Tweed ring was broken up Comptroller Andrew H. Green refused to pay for the meters, on the ground that the contract was a fraudulent one. The claim was taken into the Courts, and was finally decided against the city. The city will now use the meters.

The San Francisco newspaper have entered on a crusade against an iniquitous practice, just discovered, of mothers selling their illegitimate babies to the Chinese. Inquiry shows that a systematic traffic in them has been going on for a long time, mainly through the agency of private lying-in hospitals. Four cases of white babies in the possession of the female proprietors of Chinese brothels have already been discovered, and there are good grounds for believing that there are hundreds of others, but the Chinese, fearing discovery, have hidden them out of sight. It is asserted, on excellent authority, that these female children are purchased by Chinese speculators and sent to China, where they are raised until twelve years old, when they are sold to rich Chinamen for large sums, to be placed in their harems.

Yesterday's New York Herald cablegrams from Europe contained the following relative to Mrs. Dudley, the young woman who shot O'Donovan Rossa: The officials at the Chelsea Hospital, where soldiers' widows are trained as nurses, express surprise at the statements cabled from New York that Mrs. Dudley, who shot O'Donovan Rossa, claimed to have graduated as a nurse at that institution. They say no woman of her name or description was ever trained there. The only nurse graduated at the hospital who has left England for America, so far as the officials know, went a year and a half ago. Examination of the police reports in the Worship Street Police Court reveals the following:

Lucilla Dudley, a ladylike looking person, aged about twenty-four years, who described herself as a governess, charged with attempting suicide. A porter on the Great Eastern Railway deposed that on the arrival of his train at Liverpool Street, London, he saw the prisoner, Mrs. Dudley, in a first class carriage apparently asleep, with a handkerchief over her face; removing the handkerchief, the witness found her to be insensible; she was holding a bottle labeled "Poison." Mrs. Dudley was removed to a hospital; witness stated that nobody else was in the railway carriage.

The surgeon who attended Mrs. Dudley at the hospital deposed that she was suffering from the effects of chloroform. Witness said she became sensible after remaining unconscious eight hours. Mrs. Dudley denied that she had taken anything of a poisonous nature. When taken into custody Mrs. Dudley was detected in the act of trying to swallow a white powder.

A jailer at the police station where Mrs. Dudley was imprisoned deposed that she expressed regret at having failed to accomplish her purpose. The magistrate ordered Mrs. Dudley to be remanded to allow an examination of the powder. When the examination of the prisoner was resumed an analyst deposed that the white powder Mrs. Dudley attempted to swallow was opium. Another packet of opium was found sewn in her clothes. Mrs. Dudley stated in court that she had no relatives living, and that she had been a governess. She also described herself as a hospital nurse, but her appearance seemed to contradict this statement. She refused to give an account of her self. Five letters were found in her possession, but they furnished no clue to her identity. She said she was driven to attempt suicide by the loss of her child, which was one year old. A pair of child's shoes and gloves found in her possession tended to corroborate this assertion.

The magistrate said that in view of the fact that the chaplain of the House of Detention stated that the prisoner refused to promise not to repeat the offence he was unable to set her at liberty without two sureties of £25 sterling each for her good behavior for the six months. Mrs. Dudley smiled at this announcement. She left the court room quietly.

The chaplain of the prison in which she was confined has been advised of Mrs. Dudley's attempt to kill Rossa, and has taken passage on one of the outgoing steamers for New York. Much sympathy is expressed for Mrs. Dudley and many subscriptions are offered to a fund to aid in defending her. The Irish nationalists are circulating a report here to the effect that Mrs.

Dudley was in the pay of the English government, and that she was sent to New York by the London police. The London News, in its evening edition of today, contains the following statements about Lucilla Knows:—"I have known Lucilla Dudley for some time. She was born October 1, 1860. She is of medium height and she has a full nursemaid-like face and dark brown hair. She wore blue spectacles. I can't say that I know her character very well. It would be difficult to give a decided opinion thereon. Some persons who know her assert that she is insane. They say this because she once attempted suicide, and was arraigned therefor before a magistrate. I never noticed any signs of insanity in her. I should rather say that she is eccentric, owing to her wonderful sensibility of feeling and the intensity of her nature, than insane in the true sense of the word insane."
