An earthquake shock was felt at Wytheville, Va., Monday morning.

A rich widow, seventy-four years old has married her coachman, aged nine years, at St. Roche, P. Q.

Two men have been arrested in Montreal with a quantity of dynamite in their possession.

Minnesota has still upon her statute books a law making unjust discriminations on account of color.

President elect Cleveland is a good listener, but is said to be not very proud of his own opinions—especially on the topic of cabinet-making.

It is said that Mr. Montgomery Schuyler, of the New York Times, will succeed the missing Mr. Conant as managing editor of Harper's Weekly.

It is stated that a very extraordinary diamond, weighing no less than 457 carats, has been shipped from South America to England. The Koh-i-noor weighs 106 carats.

Senator Bowen, of Colorado, has just won a suit over the San Juan mining property, near Denver, which, he admits, affects his worldly possessions to the extent of \$400,000.

Of the four original proprietors of the London Daily Telegraph, a paper that now nets a profit of £2,000 weekly, the sole survivor, is the owner of a country weekly, and another died in a poorhouse.

Ostrich farming in South Africa has advanced with such strides that the number of tame birds there is estimated to have increased from eighty in 1865 to at least 70,000 in 1884, producing feathers for export of the value of about \$3,000,000 per annum.

A memorial stone, contributed by the State of West Virginia to the Washington monument, arrived in Washington the other day. California and Oregon are the only States from which contributed of this kind have not been received.

Col. Merrill, of the United States Engineers, in a communication to the House committee on rivers and harbors says that the Galveston harbor improvements can be completed by Government officers for \$3,000,000, a saving of \$4,000,000 on the Eads project.

A Rhode Islander proposes to found a society whose sole object shall be the amelioration of village nomenclature, or in other words, to give pretty names to those towns and places which are now unpoetically designated as "Skunk Hollow," "Bagtown," "Muckelrat," &c.

Governor Pattison, of Pennsylvania, has issued a general order granting all organized bodies of militia permission to pass through the State, armed and equipped, on their way to the dedication of the Washington monument February 21, and the inauguration of President Cleveland March 4.

Prof. Andre, of the Alpine choir in London, recently offered a guinea each to ten destitute families who were, and always had been, total abstainers from intoxicating liquor. Only nineteen applications were received from all England. After careful investigation but six of them were found to conform to the condition of the offer.

Senator Sherman wants to pension a lot of his creatures, now department clerks, by having them appointed as extra clerks in the Senate when they are reformed out of their present positions. Should he get his resolution through the Senate, he would probably have some trouble in getting the House to pass an appropriation to pay them.

**Magistrate's Court.**

Jewett, Grand Master-at Arms of the North Carolina Grand Lodge Knights of Pythias, left here this morning for Raleigh to be in attendance upon the annual meeting of the Grand Lodge which will be held in that city to-morrow. Mr. J. L. Dudley, Grand Keeper of Records and Seals, and Mr. J. G. L. Gieschen will leave for the same place and purpose to-night. The first two represent Stonewall Lodge, No. 1, K. of P., and the last named represents Germania Lodge No. 4, K. of P.

## City Court.

Beverly Scott, a colored drayman, was arrested on the 3d inst., for obstructing the crossing at North Water street and Princess street dock, and for using insulting language to the police officer after he had been repeatedly notified to move his dray. At that time Scott asked for a continuance to give him an opportunity of securing the services of a lawyer and getting his witnesses, and the hearing in the case was put off until this morning, when he was brought before the Mayor for trial. He had neither lawyer nor witnesses, and the Mayor, after hearing the testimony, imposed a fine of \$5 for the offense, when Scott appealed, but subsequently changed his mind and settled up.
